Test your team creativity and engineering with raw materials and one hour to build the best vessel. One team member boards and races across Taylor Lake. Spectators welcome.



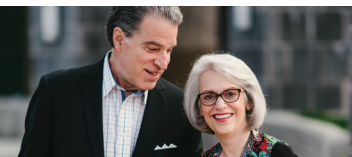
KIDS ZONE

RUSSELL BALIKIAN '09

Distinguished Service Young Alumnus

Russell Balikian served as a law clerk to Justice Clarence Thomas during the 2018-2019 Term of the U.S. Supreme Court. Prior to clerking for Justice Thomas, Russell practiced law for four years in the Washington, D.C. office of Gibson, Dunn & Crutcher LLP, where he specialized in civil appellate litigation and administrative law. He will be returning to Gibson Dunn this fall. Russell also served as a law clerk to Judge Greg Katsas of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit, and to Judge Diane Sykes of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit. He earned his J.D. from Yale Law School in 2012, and studied Political Science and Biblical Literature at Taylor University.

J.R. Briggs has three passions: to equip and invest in hungry kingdom leaders, to grow fruit on other people's trees and to collaborate with others to create good kingdom mischief. ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME RECIPIENTS



RICK ATKINSON '69

Baseball and Coaching

The 2019 campaign marked Rick's 16th overall season as assistant coach for Taylor Baseball. As a student he played for Taylor from 1966-68 under Coach Jack King, and helped the Trojans to a conference championship. Following an outstanding collegiate career as a third baseman, Rick signed a professional contract with the Atlanta Braves in 1969. He was later inducted into the Indiana High School Baseball and Grant County Halls of Fame. In 2009 he was named President of the Grant County Hall of Fame.



TYLER BEACHLER '12

Men's Soccer

Tyler was named 2011 NAIA Third-Team All-American and was a four-time All-MCC standout, including 2011 MCC Player of the Year. He was Taylor's 2011-2012 Gates-Howard Award recipient and two-time team captain. He was also 2011-2012 CoSIDA First-Team Academic All-American, the first player in TU program history to be named First-Team Academic All-American. Tyler led the MCC with 17 goals and 11 assists during his senior season (2011), scored at least 10 goals in each of four seasons and finished his career as Taylor's all-time leading scorer with 57 goals, adding 16 assists and 17 game-winning goals over his four years.

Men's Basketball

Casey was two-time NAIA Honorable Mention All-American (the seventh player in Taylor Men's Basketball history to earn multiple NAIA All-American honors) and four-time All-MCC standout (including 2009-2010 MCC Newcomer of Year). He was the 2012-2013 Taylor Gates-Howard Award recipient, and two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American (first player in Taylor Men's Basketball history to be named CoSIDA Academic All-American).

Women's Soccer

Molly was named a 2012 NAIA Honorable Mention All-American, and was four-time All-MCC selection, including two-time MCC Offensive Player of the Year. She was three-time NSCAA All-Region performer and Taylor's 2013-2014 Natalie Steele Award winner. Molly finished as Taylor's all-time leader with 59 goals and 131 points, while netting a record 19 game-winning goals. She scored at least 15 goals in three of four seasons and helped Taylor to eight or more wins in all four seasons.
