

## INTRODUCTION

On May 31 to June 3, 1995, the Association of Christians in the Mathematical Sciences held its Tenth Biennial Meeting at Taylor University. One hundred fifteen delegates attended, which is an indication of the continuing growth of interest in the ACMS. This also allowed us to have more parallel sessions and workshops. The next conference will be held at Wheaton College in 1997.

The theme of the conference was "The Christian Mathematician as Teacher". So it was especially appropriate that the keynote speaker was David S. Moore, Professor of Statistics at Purdue University and one of three professors who received the 1995 MAA national awards for outstanding teaching in mathematics. Both of Dr. Moore's talks were stimulating and full of insights into the teaching of mathematics. The other main speaker was Thomas F. Banchoff from Brown University. Dr. Banchoff was the keynote speaker at the 1989 ACMS conference. Dr. Banchoff gave two interesting multimedia presentations on Flatland, Edwin A. Abbott, and interactive computer graphics. Unfortunately, these are not in written form, so they can not be included in these proceedings. One of the highlights of the conference was the Friday afternoon discussion session with Moore and Banchoff.

The main themes in addition to mathematics teaching were statistics, computers, the history of mathematics, and service in other countries. The conference was greatly enriched by having speakers from South Africa, England, and Canada. The delegates from outside the United States were Johan de Klerk from South Africa, John M. Dubbey from South Africa, and Bill Anglin, Jan de Konig, and Glen Van Brummelin from Canada. Also, there were delegates from twenty-one states, from California to Maine.

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
