
The Public Health Impact of Congregations



A congregation is a unique communitybased organization or community of people who come together voluntarily for worship and other religious activities at a particular location and who share identity with one another (Yancey, et al, 2022).



Impact of the Pandemic on Congregations




- 87% of congregations report members testing positive for the virus (2021, Dec).
- Approximately 200,000 church members died due to Covid-19 in the US.
 - Hartford Institute for Religion Research (Dec. 2021)

Capacities & Community Resilience



Community (Congregational) Resilience a process of linking capacities/resources to adaptation after a disturbance or adversity (Norris et al, 2008).

Economic Development

- Congregants contributing financially, online giving.
- Economic stability (low job loss, or pay cuts) (Pew, 2020)
- Active in the local community

Social Capital

- Significant lay involvement, volunteering
- Good at incorporating new people

Critical Capacities




Information and Communication


- A clear and compelling vision/narrative.
- A trusted source of information "Clergy have the authority and trust of their members" (Pew, Oct, 2021).
- Effective use of technology

Community Competence

- Innovative and open to change
- Vibrant, contextual worship
- Strong, adaptive leadership that fits with participants

- happiness and life satisfaction;
- health, both mental and physical;
- meaning and purpose;
- character and virtue; and
- close social relationships

Congregations & Neighborhood Flourishing

- 74% of churches reported offering some form of community service or ministry (2021).
- Nearly two-thirds began a new ministry during the pandemic.
- Outreach to elderly shopping for/with them, rides to medical appointments, and technological support.



Pandemic related health ministries

- Roughly 20% of churches engaged in pandemic-related ministries - making masks, hosting vaccine clinics, testing, support to medical workers.
- Churches hosted health fairs, blood drives (one church hosted 22 in 2021).



Financial assistance

- 21% of congregations expanded or started a ministry of financial assistance. Examples included:
 - "Rental assistance for farm workers",
 - \$40,000 in restaurant vouchers for small businesses,
 - Funding a food truck as a food center for a low-income community.



■ In 2019, Christian Assembly partnered with RIP Medical Debt to cancel over 5 million dollars in medical debt for nearly 5,000 households in the LA area.

In 2020, CA partnered with churches in 10 cities to cancel \$20 million in unpaid medical debt.
