

T aylor University Theatre is a co-curricular educational program supporting the liberal arts mission of the University by providing a broad range of theatre experiences that span most theatrical periods, genres, and styles.

Plays that probe the human condition and reveal human action with integrity, authenticity, and a sense of "grace," provide us the opportunity to understand better what is true about ourselves and others.

While individual plays may not necessarily reflect the ethos of the Taylor community, we believe that this theatrical pursuit of truth resides at the heart of a Christian liberal arts education families, not emissaries from Rome." He believes that love, warmth, compassion and kindness are the highest values taking precedence over rules and discipline.

The situation is further complicated by another fact. The play is set in 1964 and the first black student has been enrolled at St. Nicholas. When he becomes the central focal point of the clash between Sister Aloysius and Father Flynn, his Mother is summoned to the Principal's office. She brings yet another perspective. According to Mrs. Muller, there are things that one can't know for sure. The "world is a hard place" where "things are not always black and white". The only way to negotiate the hard places is to "accept what you gotta accept and work with it." You take the good and leave the rest behind. This is what she knows, and she chooses to stand with her son and with those who are good to him.

Whatever else is true about parables, they act as mirrors in which we confront our own reflections. Our own faith journeys are unique, but we see ourselves in Sister Aloysius, Sister James, Father Flynn and Mrs. Muller. We, too, face moments of loneliness, isolation, betrayal, pain and loss. In those moments we, too, confront that most basic of all faith issues—how can we know for sure?

From the Director



John Patrick Shanley called *Doubt* a parable, and he structured Father Flynn's two sermon s as parables. The standard definition of parable is a simple story in which a moral lesson is embedded. However, parables are not always simple, and even the moral lesson can be open to interpretation.

On one level, *Doubt* is a simple story of four people who struggle with the most basic of all faith issues-- how can we be sure. What if in moments of

desperation we "howl to the sky—to God. Help me!" and "no answer comes."

On another level the story is far from simple. Each of the four have embarked on a unique faith journey and each experiences painful dissonance when their respective journeys lead them together at a powerful crossroad. Whose vision of faith will prevail? Whose will be eclipsed? Can they all be right? Or wrong?

Young Sister James, who loves teaching and seeks connection with her eighth grade students, finds herself being chastised by her Principal, and is devastated by Sister Aloysius critique of her classroom practices. She is admonished to stop "sugar coating" history lessons, to cease "performing" for her class, to develop "starch" in her character, and even to be more "skeptical of her students." Sister James tries valiantly to be obedient to this guidance as her vows require, but she finds herself feeling as though "she has lost her way" and is "less close to God."

Sister Aloysius has taken her vows long before Vatican II. She has been a teacher and a principal for several decades and has witnessed many changes in the church and the surrounding society. She is equally uncomfortable with the sense of loss technological and societal changes have brought and with those she sees happening in the church. She stresses the need to follow the Church hierarchy to Sister James, but she herself chafes at the same authority structure. It "limits her" and "favors men" who "run everything."

Sister Aloysius finds the pronouncements of the Second Ecumenical Council particularly distasteful as they are interpreted by the young parish priest, Father Flynn. He has enthusiastically embraced Vatican II. He does not believe that the clergy are profoundly different from the laity and he desires to create a "welcoming Church" where the parents and children view Sisters and Priests as "members of their
