 - a) Depression, Anxiety, Anger, Lust, Sin
 - b) Love, Sex, God, Friends, Marriage, Singleness.
 - 3. Provides wisdom for specific challenges faced in our community.
 - a) The Best answers to difficult questions.
 - b) "Why do all the bad things happen in my community?" Teen from South Chicago, July 2019
 - 4. Helps identify where we belong (e.g. the Great Tradition).
