

Pastoral Ministries Program Goes Beyond Preaching

hen Fort Wayne Bible
Institute became Fort
Wayne Bible College in
1951, the course curriculum saw a number
of changes that led to the creation of a new
department that would eventually grow into
one of the largest programs at the school:
the Pastoral Ministries Department.

Previously, the administration assumed the standard bible course at the school was sufficient to give students the knowledge they needed to enter the pastorate. During the early years, only a few classes in preaching and homiletics were even offered alongside the core Bible courses. Cyril Eicher g32 taught some pastoral training courses during the 1950s along with some assistance from then FWBC President Jared F. Gerig g29. But their other administrative duties stretched them thin, preventing more courses from being offered.

Dr. Edward Simpson inherited the program in 1960. He started expanding the program by developing a new major in pastoral training. The program remained primarily focused on the standard Bible education, along with the required Greek courses. But the focus shifted toward pastoral training.

In 1966, Dr. Simpson became the

school's academic dean and passed the program on to **Dr. Robert Strubhar g36**, who became the program's first full-time professor. During his 16 years as department head, **Dr. Strubhar made his contribution by expanding the curriculum further to focus on field work.** He developed an internship program that proved to be extremely popular among students at the time.

Then in 1982, **Dr. David Biberstein g66** was appointed Director of the Pastoral Ministries program. Dr. Biberstein made significant changes to the program by focusing it into four pillars, which remained hallmarks of the program for years to come.

The first pillar, Visitation, focused on pastoral compassion-interaction with people and engaging in meaningful dialogue. The second pillar, Administration, focused on leadership capabilities and church management. The third pillar was Preaching/Teaching. The fourth pillar, Counseling, focused on solving personal and family issues on a one-on-one basis.

Dr. Biberstein expanded the entire program to include courses in Christian Worship, Evangelism and Discipleship, and Pastoral Tools. The pastoral internship program, expanded to eight credit hours, became required and grew so large that Dr.



Biberstein travelled to states as far as New York and California to evaluate interns. Another dimension was the Christian Service assignments that were required six out of eight semesters, giving students invaluable practical experience under observation and evaluation.

When Dr. Biberstein retired in 2008, the Rev. Bob Smith was appointed director. He too started to tweak the program, but the program ended the following year with the closing of the school. However, the program's legacy continues.

The Pastoral Ministries program has had a long-lasting impact in educating thousands of pastors and teachers who went through the college at Fort Wayne. At one time, as many as a hundred students were enrolled in the program, despite the fact that

the program never had more than one fulltime professor. Its impact will continue for years to come as pastors educated through the program continue to apply its pillars in churches and ministries around the world.

Role-play Activity Shaped Ministry

hen Britney (Kolkman)
Sloffer g08 went through
the Pastoral Ministries
program, she participated in a role-playing
activity in Dr. David Biberstein's g66
class that shaped the way she would view
ministry. In class, the students practiced
ministering to a cancer patient who was
angry and embittered. The lesson was this:
don't try to fix people's emotions, just meet
them where they are. It's a lesson Britney



puts into practice today as chaplain for the Visiting Nurse and Hospice Home.

"I'll never forget that," Britney shared of the lesson she learned.

"Pastors really like to fix people." But during her ministry at the bedsides of ailing people facing their last days, Britney has learned the value of listening.

Visiting Nurse and Hospice Home provides support to hospice patients in the Fort Wayne area. Britney spends time with patients in prayer, scripture reading, and hymn singing. Her church-going patients particularly appreciate this opportunity to worship from their own homes. She ensures each patient is connected to a church,

and she coordinates care with his or her pastor. To Britney, it is important that her role complements rather than replaces the church. She provides extra spiritual support during this vulnerable time in a person's life.

Her role also helps pastors in a very practical way. "For a lot of pastors, even if they're connected to a church, the hardest thing in their ministry . . . has been visiting local people and talking about death," she said. "We have those conversations that are uncomfortable, while sharing the gospel and preparing them for eternity."

This is what makes Britney most appreciate her training at TUFW. Her basic theology courses under Dr. Wes Gerig g51 and her crisis counseling courses with Dr. Michael Cook ha09 taught her principles and techniques she puts into practice today. "I have nothing but wonderful things to say about the Pastoral Ministries program," she shared. "That program developed a solid foundation for my personal theology that has really shaped my ministry."

Britney lives in the Fort Wayne area with her husband Brett g09, a worship leader at Christ Community Church, and their one-month-old daughter.

Alumnus Pastors Fight Church

to the gyms where they interact with fighters, coaches, and staff. They volunteer at MMA events, including live Ultimate Fighting Championships (UFC), to help ensure that the fighters have everything they need to compete—especially in the spiritual battleground.

"We take a very practical, relational approach," Josh said. Fight Church leaders make weekly gym visitations, hold prayer meetings, invite athletes into their homes, and publicize fighting events through social media. Similar in structure to other sports chaplaincy

programs, Fight Church is the first ministry focused on the fighting community. Josh said blazing his own trail has been rewarding but challenging,

> especially in getting churches involved.

"One of our goals in Fight Church is to educate people," Josh shared. The church tends to view combat sports negatively,

and he hopes to break down some of this resistance. But the main focus is on the athletes themselves and building relationships with them.

"Most of them are unchurched people," he said, "and obviously aren't inclined to go to church unless they have an outside person meeting them where they're at."

Josh, who used to host UFC viewing parties in his TUFW dorm, is a self-declared "super big fan" of the sport. When he moved to Las Vegas to plant a church, he got involved with Fight Pastor,

a chaplaincy program from Washington with a small-scale Vegas program. This inspired him to start his own MMA ministry. "I wanted to be a full-time pastor, and I love MMA, and I thought, 'This is a match made in heaven," he said.

That match just celebrated its three-year anniversary. In those three years, Fight Church has reached out to athletes from more than 300 local gyms, building authentic relationships and encouraging athletic aspirations. They now have five affiliates across the country and internationally.

Besides his work with Fight Church, Josh is involved with Corporate Chaplains of America, a similar ministry providing support to corporate employees. Josh lives in Las Vegas with his wife Rebecca (Startup) fs99 and their three children, Josiah, Rachel, and Joel.

Former Square Dance Caller Now a Pastor

t 38 years old,
David Craw g03
felt called to enter
the ministry. David, a square-dance
caller at the time, had not been in
school for over 20 years. There
was little in his life that could
provide a stepping-stone to the
pastorate. But when his daughter
Amy (Craw) Fuller g03 entered
her freshman year at TUFW, God
opened a door for David, too.

"When I got the call to preach, I wanted to do the best that I could for the Lord and get the best training I could find," David said. He took a discipleship

class the first semester his daughter was in school, and by spring was enrolled full-time. Initially, finances posed an obstacle. However, the university offered enough grants and scholarships to cover his full-time tution. Around the same time, he was asked to serve as youth pastor of their Losantville, Ind. church, and his calling was confirmed.

It wasn't easy. David commuted two hours each way to attend classes. He endured bad weather and a severe accident on the road, and often sat in his car between classes to do homework. But he never forgot why he was there. "He [God] keeps his promises," he said. "It was such a strain on me at the beginning.... Not only was I a new pastor, but also I was going to school full-time and had three kids and a wife. But God is faithful."

David took refuge in the students and faculty surrounding him. His fellow, non-



traditional students, "non-trads" as they called themselves, used to fellowship and pray together. For a while, he spent Thursday nights in the dorm after his evening class. His roommate Josh Arthur g01 used to stay up late with him discussing doctrine and their vision for ministry. "Staying in a dorm was quite an experience," David said, tongue-in-cheek.

David also grew close to
Dr. David Biberstein g66, who
always provided a listening ear. Dr.
Biberstein had a spare chair in his
office, where Craw sat many times to
pour out his heart. "He was such a

great help to me," Craw said. "He never let me feel sorry for myself."

The faculty also taught David by example. "They submitted themselves to us and washed our feet," he said, "and you take that lesson into the ministry." That's why the towel he received upon graduation means so much to him, even after 15 years of ministry. To David, no sacrifice is too great to follow the will of God.

"The only sacrifice that really matters is the one that Jesus made for me," he said. "God could have chosen anybody else, but he gave me the opportunity. Taylor was a great part of that, and always will be."

Craw lives with his wife Sherry in Losantville, Ind. where he pastors Antioch Christian Church. Their second daughter, Lori Craw-Current g04, also graduated from TUFW a year after her dad and sister.



Pastor Becomes Painter: Ministry Continues

The term "full-time ministry" has changed over the past few decades. It once exclusively described those in the pastorate, mission field, or mercy ministry. But today, the definition is much broader. Rick Hartsell g77 is one Pastoral Ministries graduate who embraced this change early on.

Rick had a rough relationship with traditional ministry. The nature of pastoring stifled his entrepreneurial bent. "At the root of me was a guy who just could not work for somebody else," he said. "It is just not in my blood."

After several rocky attempts at pastoring, Rick took a new direction: he started a painting business, Somerset Painting and Professional Home Improvement. "What else can a guy do with a Masters in Hebrew and Greek?" he joked.

Nearly 20 years later, Somerset has become the top-ranked company in Oakland County, Mich. Positive reviews keep pouring in on Angie's List, and Rick is enjoying success. But there is more to it than business savvy.

Rick conducts business in a God-honoring way. He is profoundly inspired by author and speaker Os Hillman, who emphasizes the businessperson's role in building the Kingdom. "I find it thrilling to understand that the 'full-time ministry' calling is for us all," he said.

For Rick, there is no distinction between business and ministry. Rather than director, he goes by the title "Servant Leader." He gives generously to missions work with his time as well as his money. He recently led a trip to Nepal, and his company painted a Detroit home for women who aged out of foster care. "Believe me, I'm in full-time ministry," Rick said.

Yet all these years later, Rick can recall the pain of his transition. "(It) really felt like a divorce," he said. It was a source of guilt, and his years of training seemed like a waste.

But many of the lessons he learned in the FWBC Pastoral Ministries program still apply. He saw love in action. He learned to study the Bible and teach it to others, as he still does in weekly Bible studies and men's ministries. Above all, he learned authenticity. "Professors would step away from the class lecture podium and speak directly from their heart," Rick recalled.

That authenticity infuses Rick's business—from rattling off his business policies on the answering machine ("At Somerset we do something very unique. Take thirty seconds and see if you agree.") to his Christ-like client interactions. "I like to work hard—with excellence," he said, "and I like to see the fruit that comes with that." And the fruit Hartsell is bearing goes deeper than Angie's List.

Storm Surprises Church Sistrunks Help Washington, IL Community Cope

Pastor Ken Sistrunk g87 will not soon forget Sunday, November 17, 2013. He was leading a congregational hymn at 11 a.m. when several members of his congregation signaled him to stop.

He was notified that a severe storm was heading toward the town of Washington, IL., where he has pastored Calvary Evangelical Church the past five years.

The church people were led into the

basement where they resumed singing and praying. Ken then began his message from John 8:12 about Jesus being the light of the world. Then the lights flickered and went out.

"It just sounded like a regular storm," said Joanne (Kingsbury) g84, Ken's wife. Then they started getting bits and pieces of information that it was far worse than they thought.

Nineteen families from among the 138 church members suffered damage to their homes. They have been displaced until the damages can be fixed or the houses rebuilt. One family lost three homes. One woman from this family had just moved into an assisted living facility. She could have been injured or killed at her previous residence.

Amazingly, only one church building in the town of 15,000 residents was slightly damaged. The rest were untouched, probably saving many

lives due to the time of the tornado.

Since the storm, Ken's role as a pastor has taken on a new, very functional responsibility: scavenging parishioners' homes, as they need someone they can trust to recover heirlooms from the wreckage, and coordinating some of the relief efforts.

"It's emotional," Ken said after sifting through the rubble. "Just like with Job's one

> friend who listened, I think that is my role, because there are no answers for this, so I try to just keep my mouth shut."

> Ken wishes he had consulted with his leadership team ahead of time to prepare for these kinds of possibilities. He never expected a tornado in November, and the issue

was never addressed.

Nevertheless, he finds guidance in something he learned at FWBC long ago. "One of the things Dr. Wes said was the difference between an educated and uneducated man is the educated man can do what he has to do when he has to do it," Ken said. "This is how I am functioning now."

Ken's hope is that the disaster will encourage unity in the congregations as they help one another. He asks for prayer that revival will come to his town. "It's not about stuff," he concluded. "I know God is in charge."

Editor's Note: Pastor Ken, a former Christian Education major who became a pastor, said they do not need more supplies. Monetary donations are encouraged for Samaritan's Purse, Red Cross, and the Mennonite Disaster Service, which is set up in his church building.



Healing Leads to Leaving Legacy

Dr. Jackie Carl g53 and Virginia
"Ginny" Lehman's g55 journeys started in
the same place: Lima, Ohio. They attended
the same high school. Their common passion
for education and the development of young
children kept their paths together at Fort Wayne
Bible College.

After graduation and further education, their careers took them to different cities and even countries, the U.S. and Sierra Leone, West Africa. However, their paths joined indefinitely when they bought a home together in the States.

Both professional educators for more than 35 years, they believe in education—especially Christ-centered education. It was for this reason that they put their home into a trust to go to Taylor University Fort Wayne (TUFW) at their passing.

Then the closure of TUFW was announced in October, 2009.

"I was extremely angry," Jackie said.
"Anything that arrived in my mailbox that looked like, smelled like, or even felt like Taylor, I would throw in my circular file."

The pain was deep. No effort on Taylor's part could heal it. "The anguish deep inside was still churning and I carried a chip on my shoulder," Jackie explained.

As representatives of the Alumni Council, Jackie attended a scholarship dinner at Taylor with Joy Gerig g51 & g66. While observing the students, Jackie began to heal. "What I observed that day changed my perception of TU," she said. "I saw students who were committed to Christ's calling and were being obedient to that call I felt God changing my heart."

Ginny made a similar emotional journey. She also was disappointed by the closure, but felt relieved when the Resource Center began taking shape. "I am thrilled by all that it is doing today," Ginny said. "I don't feel left behind anymore."

For these reasons, they reconsidered and have revised their trust to donate their home to support the Fort Wayne Alumni & Friends Resource Center Endowment Fund.

"We were looking for something to do with the money from the house that would be beneficial to what we believe," Ginny explained.

For these women, supporting the Resource Center is a heartfelt commitment. Jackie used to spend hours volunteering with Rev. Cyril Eicher g32 in the English Library Archives. And when the Resource Center moved to Brown Gables and eventually to Lillian Rolf after the closure, she helped with the transition.

"I'm convinced that it's people like Cyril and Jackie that's kept us alive," said Michael Mortensen g91, director of the Fort Wayne Alumni and Friends Resource Center.

Ginny and Jackie encourage Fort Wayne alumni, especially those in situations like theirs, to consider the Resource Center in estate plans or to support the Resource Center any way you can. "The Center is doing a tremendous job," Jackie said. With help from alumni like them, the Center will continue caring, connecting, and celebrating with alumni across the nation and abroad.
