Upland, Indiana - - Representatives of the Jewish, Catholic and Protestant faiths will participate in a unique interfaith forum to be staged at Taylor University, Friday, April 1, at 8:00 p.m. in Shreiner Auditorium, President B.Joseph Martin has announced.

The topic to be discussed is "Religion: Relation of Faith and Reason."

Rabbi Boris A. Rackovsky, director of B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation at Indiana University will represent Judaism. He is currently a candidate for the D.H.L. degree at Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion of Cincinnati.

The Rev. Charles E. Sheedy, dean of the College of Arts and Letters at the University of Notre Dame, and former head of the university department of religion, will speak for the Catholic faith.

An ordained priest, Rev. Sheedy graduated from Notre Dame in 1933 and has done graduate work at Catholic University of America and the University of Pittsburgh. He holds membership in the National Catholic Education Association and American Association of Colleges.

Dr. Milo A. Rediger, academic dean of Taylor, will speak from the Protestant viewpoint.

A graduate of Taylor, Dr. Rediger holds the A.M. and Ph.D. degrees from New York University, and has done graduate work at the Biblical Seminary in New York. He is also coordinator in the North Central Accrediting Association.

Dr. Paul H. Wood, Chairman of the Division of Philosophy and Religion at Taylor, and President Martin will co-moderate the forum.

The purpose of the forum is to provide Taylor students opportunity for first-hand insight into the relationship between faith and reason as interpreted by various religious faiths.

The public is invited to the program.
