Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. [18] All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; [19] that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. 2 Corinthians 5:17-19

Because God has reconciled the world to Himself in Christ, we, like Paul, will promote that same message of reconciliation: If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature. The old has passed away, the new has come. As those who have been made a new creation in Christ, we will observe Martin Luther King, Jr. Day by celebrating our reconciliation with God and one another in Christ and calling others to be reconciled with God and one another in Christ. In Jesus and Him alone is true and lasting reconciliation.

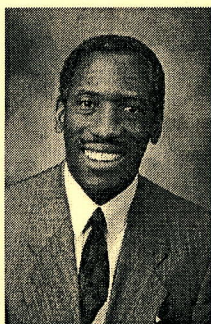

A 2000 recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian honor in the United States.

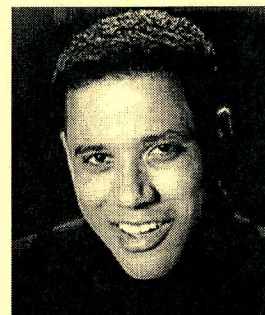
