

THE 1961 THEME

The theme for the 1961 Youth Conference is centered around the verse of scripture found in Matthew 6:33: "But seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and his righteousness: and all these things shall be added unto you. A challenging question comes to mind when we read this verse. What is it I want for my life? What do I seek? As young students, we are eager to know what lies ahead in our lives. God's promise gives us the assurance that if we place Him first and live for Him, we need have no fear of what lies before us. If we seek the Kingdom of God and his righteousness above all things, He will take care of us.

To illustrate this theme, the stage backdrop and brochure cover present the basic two choices. The way of the world, which is sin, or the way of the cross which represents the Kingdom of God. We must choose at the start of life which one we want.

The various translucent shapes of blue and green, symbolize the process of seeking. The way of the cross may seem dim at times; but if we place our trust in Christ, we shall see Him in the end.

HISTORY:

A TAYLOR TRADITION

The focal point of student activity at Taylor each year is our annual Youth Conference. Today Youth Conference is a complex, finely organized, evangelistic and instructional week-end for the young people of high school age. It stands now as a composite of multiplied hours of prayer and careful planning by students spanning the years back to 1934, when the idea of such a conference was planted in seed form in the hearts of five Taylor students. It happened when Park Anderson, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Allee, Marvin Schilling and Peter Pascoe discussed the need which they noticed among youth groups which they visited while on gospel team assignments. "The picture of these youth groups, some of them evidencing very great need, made such an impact upon the members of the team that almost as from one person the ideas for the first Youth Conference took form." Such was the beginning.

From this first conference in Shreiner Auditorium, Youth Conference has grown until today on the final Sunday afternoon every available seat is taken in Maytag Gymnasium. So great is the need and so fruitful has the program proven to be, that now many other Christian colleges have duplicated this effort.

With the passing of each year, the evident blessing of God upon Youth Conference has been a wonder to behold. Today as a result of this blessing, churches, pastors, parents and youth leaders from many miles distant have by their confidence and prayers for this program become part of a Taylor Tradition.



Speakers



DR. EUGENE L. SMITH

Rev. Dr. Eugene L. Smith of New York City, chief executive of the overseas missionary program of the Methodist Church, will be speaking at Taylor University Youth Conference, 1961.

Dr. Smith has been pastor of the Wesley Methodist Church, Rosell, N. J., the Emory Methodist Church, Jersey City, and St. Mark's Church, the largest Methodist church in Brooklyn. In addition, Dr. Smith is teacher, author, and lecturer, having written several books and having been on the religious education faculty of N.Y.U.

A native of Rockwell City, Iowa, Dr. Smith attended Willamette University, Salem Oregon, Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J., and New York University. He holds the doctor of philosophy degree from N.Y.U., an honorary doctor of divinity degree from Willamette, and an honorary doctor of letters degree from American University, Washington, D. C.


Dr. Smith has traveled widely in Africa, Europe, Asia and Latin America, studying conditions under which the church is at work and meeting missionaries and leading Christian nationals, making him well qualified to bring a missionary challenge to this year's Youth Conference.

REV. EDWARD ANGELL

One of the speakers for Youth Conference will be Rev. Edward Angell, who is the pastor of Asbury Methodist Church in Wichita, Kansas. He is an extremely well-educated man who has had a great deal of experience in working with young people as an evangelist, counselor, and club worker.

Rev. Angell was a student at Miltonvale Wesleyan College in Miltonvale, Kansas, Marion College in Marion, Indiana, and Capital University in Columbus, Ohio. He earned his A.B., M.A., and his B.D. He served as professor at Miltonvale College teaching Bible, homiletics, theology and evangelism. He also taught theology and Bible at Houghton College.

For five years Rev. Angell was the pastor of the Houghton College Church, which served forty denominations. While there, he ministered to the college students as a pastor, counselor and friend. He has been the minister of Asbury Methodist Church for five years. Rev. Angell has recently completed a trip around the world primarily in the interest of Methodist missions. He has been active in youth camps, camp meetings, young people's clubs and as youth speaker. On Sunday morning he can be heard on KIRL, Wichita, Kansas.



IEEN TALENT TIME: The music co-chairmen, Jan Spitler and Frank Pyle, have announced a special youth talent audition to be held Saturday, April 15th. Two youths will be chosen and will participate in one of the Youth Conference services. If you have special talent, be prepared for the tryouts.

WHAT IO BRING: Since this is your Youth Conference, we want you to be comfortable. Bring clothes you'll feel comfortable in—both in the services and in informal social situations. Remember, you are here only two days.

BEDDING: Mattresses will be furnished. The rest of the bedding is your responsibility.

MEAL POLICY: The Friday evening meal is NOT included on the meal ticket. The ticket provides five consecutive meals beginning with Saturday morning and concluding with Sunday noon. Meals will be served on schedule.

INSURANCE: All registrants are covered by a thorough insurance policy included in the registration fee.
