The Qualifying Factor

“Whom God calls, He qualifies; and when He qualifies, He sends.” For 75 years God has enabled Fort Wayne Bible College to serve as a qualifying factor in the preparation of men and women for Christian ministries.

In 1904 Fort Wayne Bible Training School first opened its doors. Its purpose was to provide sound biblical training and the basic skills necessary for Christian service. Times have changed since those early training school days. Kerosene lanterns, cinder trails, on-campus chicken coops, and streetcar stops are no longer a part of campus life. But Fort Wayne Bible College’s primary goals are still the same. The purpose behind the modern facilities, enlarged campus, and extensive curriculum is still the training of men and women for Christian service.

Yes, times have changed and so has Fort Wayne Bible College. But God’s call to service is still heard. Today He calls not only pastors, evangelists, and teachers. He calls computer programmers who can assist in translation work on the mission field . . . announcers and engineers who can broadcast the gospel to thousands of otherwise unreached homes . . . accountants who can keep Christian organizations operating in the black. Over the years countless new opportunities for service have opened up all around the world. Overseas outreach has expanded . . . churches have grown and taken on new responsibilities in the community . . . Christian businesses are flourishing . . .

To meet the ever-growing needs of the church, community, and world mission field, FWBC faculty and administration committees keep their eyes and ears open, continually review the college curriculum and consistently meet with the Lord in prayer for guidance and wisdom. When it comes to a

This fall the college is offering two new majors: Christian social work and business administration. Dr. Lon Randall Featured Alumnus

After graduating in 1955, Dr. Randall went from FWBC to Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana. At I.U. he earned his M.S. in Guidance and Counseling and the Ed.D. in Guidance with a special emphasis in student personnel administration.

To find an adequate word to describe Dr. Randall's experiences is a difficult task. The word "vast" only seems to tell half the story. Occupational experiences include Dean of Students at Indiana Institute of Technology in Fort Wayne, Vice President for Spring Arbor College, Spring Arbor, Michigan, and Executive Vice President of Seattle Pacific in Seattle, Washington. He has been President of Malone College in Canton, Ohio since 1972.

Other professional activities include consultant work in higher education and fund raising. He has also done extensive public speaking for religious, civic, and professional groups.

Dr. Randall's work experience has taken him throughout the United States. He has also had opportunity for extensive world-wide travel. He has made seven trips to Asia and has visited the countries of Japan, Hong Kong, Sweden, France and Bermuda, to name only a few. Through his travels, he has taken part in the ministries of numerous mission works.

During his life, Dr. Randall has been dedicated to the fulfillment of the will of God in his spiritual life, his roles of husband and father of two children, and in his work. He states, "My life decisions have been directed by God's will and the leadership of the Holy Spirit. My personal philosophy of life is to be open to God's leading to the 'area of greatest service.' If there is a place, other than where I am now, where I can be of greater service to the Kingdom, that is where I will not hesitate to go."

Fort Wayne Bible College praises God for the testimony and service of this alumnus. The Bible College takes honor in having a part in Dr. Randall's training and prays God will continue to use him in His service.

Educator, administrator, traveler and public speaker are all titles that can be appropriately given Dr. Lon Randall, president of Malone College, our featured alumnus for this issue of PULSE/LIFELINES. A 1955 graduate of Fort Wayne Bible College, Dr. Randall is highly respected for his outstanding ability in administration and contribution to higher education.

Our featured alumnus was born in Flint, Michigan but lived around the Sturgis, Michigan area most of his childhood. A pastor's son, his Christian commitment was made at an early age under his father's ministry in the Missionary Church in Sturgis.

After graduating in 1951 from Sturgis High School, Dr. Randall came to Fort Wayne Bible College. His primary reasons for choosing the Bible College as the first step in advanced education, were because of parental influence and his association with the Missionary Church. He and his wife, Jo-Ann (Benham), came to FWBC together.

While attending FWBC, one could find Dr. Randall playing on the basketball team or singing with the College Quartet or Sunrise Chapel singing groups. He was also the Mission Band songleader and in his sophomore year was elected vice president of his class.

When asked what FWBC means to him, Dr. Randall replied, "The special meaning that Fort Wayne Bible College has for me centers around the fellowship, friendships, and spiritual knowledge which remains as a current influence in my life today."

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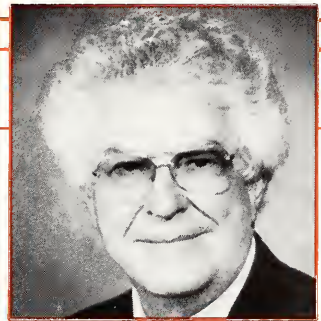

Summer Recruitment On The Road

As a rule at Fort Wayne Bible College, summer break brings a time for catching-up and reorganizing. The Admissions Department is the exception to the rule. To Admissions, summer means a three month opportunity for recruitment of new students for the new school year.

This year a summer team ministered in word and music in Missionary churches, camps, and youth conferences in Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Florida and Canada. The team consisted of Jeff Ling, Director of Admissions, Ron Mann, Admissions Representative, and Debra Lehman, an FWBC music major graduate.

It has been reported as of August 12, full-time applications are up 1.5% and enrollments are up 21.7% from last year at this time. These statistics may vary since FWBC accepts applications up to the day of registration.

The Admissions Department expresses that it has been both a successful and profitable summer. Jeff Ling, Director, comments, "We have seen scores of young people this summer who are interested in full-time Christian service vocations. A highlight for the summer team was to see so many alumni at the various places they visited."

FWBC Correspondence School: A Ministry & A Service

What has increased over ten times in size since its beginning and promises to continue to multiply in the future? No, the rate of inflation does not quite fit the description, but the Department of Correspondence Studies at Fort Wayne Bible College does!

Since its beginning in 1945, the Correspondence Department's enrollment has climbed from just a handful to over 2,000 students at present. The Correspondence School is the second largest of its kind in the country. Moody Correspondence School of Chicago ranks first.

Until 1970 the Correspondence School was a service only a few FWBC people took advantage of. In 1970, under the direction of Cyril Eicher, Fort Wayne Bible College bought out the Correspondence Department at Judson College in Elgin, Illinois for \$10,000. After only one year of expansion, the school paid the \$10,000 debt and still made a profit. The Department has continued to grow ever since. Last year the FWBC Correspondence Dept. made an \$80,000 profit. All profit is filtered back into the Bible College and put to use where needed.

The Correspondence courses are designed for students who have class conflicts or have temporarily dropped out of college, for ministers wanting refresher courses, for teachers and for anyone wanting advanced education. Students range from prisoners to housewives! The first person to complete the 32 hour Christian Worker Certificate was a prisoner from Canada. Students are located in 49 states, 10 Canadian provinces and 18 foreign countries. The department is working on recruiting one more state to make it an even 50.

The Correspondence Dept. deals with thirteen fields of study: Bible, biblical

languages, theology, Christian education, communications, history, missions, music, natural science, pastoral training, philosophy, psychology and social science. The cost is less than half of regular college tuition per hour.

Altogether there are 79 courses offered. The most popular among students are John, Old and New Testament Survey, Romans and Introduction to Philosophy. Students have one year to complete a course and all credits are transferable.



This expanding program is under the direction of Donna Lutton. Donna has been with the Bible College for 23 years and has been in the Correspondence Dept. since 1970.

As director, Donna sees the prison ministry and a greater percentage of courses completed as highlights. "Our goal is to expand and to develop even a greater outreach ministry than we presently have,"

comments Donna.

Besides Donna and four other workers, there are 14 graders who grade assignments and return them to the students as quickly as possible. The majority of the graders are professors at the Bible College.

Donna feels the efficiency of the Dept. is a key factor to its success. Course material and books are sent out to students the same day an application is received. Letters of motivation are frequently sent out to students to encourage them to keep plugging away to complete their course.

While letters are going out to students, letters are also coming in from students. One writes:

"I truly appreciate how Fort Wayne Bible College helped me to finish my college degree."

Another student states:

"I really cannot believe my correspondence course is finished. I just want to thank you for your patience and encouraging notes. The notes really helped me and meant a lot."

Letters of information about the Correspondence School are sent to colleges, churches and the armed services, but the word-of-mouth from students is the most successful recruiter of enrollments.

The Department of Correspondence Studies at Fort Wayne Bible College puts in a fine effort to serve those who for various reasons cannot attend college. It is appropriate to say, that going to college by mail at FWBC, "is the next best thing to being there!"

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Alumni To Take On Varsity In Special Game In November

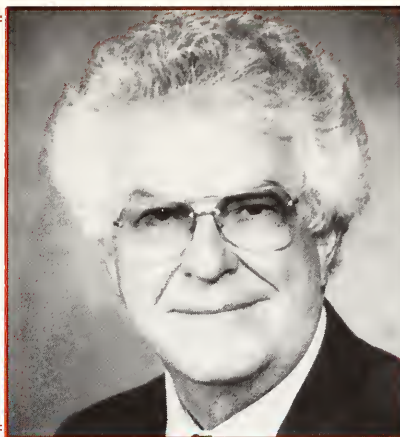

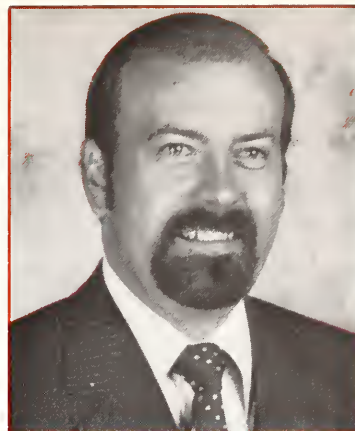

Annual Report 1979-1980

A Report To Friends and Constituents of Fort Wayne Bible College

It is with mingled feelings that I present this report to you since it marks the close of 23 years of ministry at the college, the last 9 1/2 as president. I am grateful to the Lord for the opportunity for significant service afforded by being a part of the college community. In this period of unique pressures for colleges, I believe God still has a special mission for Fort Wayne Bible College, and I thank Him for His blessing and provision during the past school year.



This past year we have been challenged by a review of our first 75 years, and now we face the years of the 80's with a renewed commitment to provide for the church and for society a continued supply of graduates who are prepared to meet the demands of this new decade.

Specialized pastoral roles have led to multiple staff churches. Missionary work has expanded to include many specializations. The Christian day school movement is mushrooming with a demand for teachers having good educational credentials plus the ability to integrate Biblical truth into the life and curriculum of the classroom. Para-church organizations have multiplied and are performing functions beyond the resources of most churches creating a demand for Christian workers with new skills.

With this in view, Fort Wayne Bible College recognizes that its role needs to change somewhat in order to keep up with the changing face of the church. Without altering the essential nature of the school as a Bible college and without abandoning existing programs,

The 1980s are suddenly upon us. Responsible elements in our society are doing hard thinking about the days ahead.

Fort Wayne Bible College is gearing up for all that this new period might call for. We have taken a look at our assets and find them to be varied and quite substantial. Our heritage as a school and our alumni give evidence of substance both in program and in product. Our faculty, staff, and student body are seriously concerned and committed to the concept of wholehearted service to our Lord and to our world. Our physical plant generally is in good condition. Enrollment is stable and budgets are under control and spartan. We have a supporting constituency that believes in us, and we have a Board of Governors with a unique combination of vision and just plain old-fashioned good business judgment. And most important, we have a clear sense of



new curricular offerings are being introduced. Christian social work and business administration majors will prepare graduates for key roles in the church and church-related agencies. Special programs in early childhood education (nursery school and kindergarten), Christian counseling, Christian drama, broadcasting, camping, youth work, and secretarial science will equip students for other strategic ministries.

So, we come to the end of this anniversary year with a forward look in terms of program development. Another significant positive

Academics

Fort Wayne Bible College completed its 75th academic year with an enrollment of 522 students. A breakdown of the student body enrollment figures showed 280 continuing students, 207 first time students and 35 former students who had returned to campus.

There were ninety-two graduates in May, the second highest number in the history of Fort Wayne Bible College, with seventy-seven students receiving Bachelor degrees and fifteen receiving Associate degrees. Dr. Louis L. King, President of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, delivered the commencement

message to the graduates. FWBC awarded Professor of Music, Ira Gerig, with an honorary Doctor of Music degree and Dr. J. A. Ringenberg with an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree; only the third and fourth honorary degrees awarded in the history of the College. During the year, three FWBC faculty members completed work on doctoral degrees. They were Robert Strubhar, Chairman, Department of Pastoral Ministry; Sterling Demond, Chairman, Department of Christian Education; and Ted Nickel, Chairman, Department of Teacher Education.

A significant event of the year occurred in

April when FWBC staged a 75th Anniversary Tribute. Presented by the Department of Music, the celebration featured a multi-media presentation, interviews with persons prominent in the history of the college, and band music and singing. The event also signaled the publishing of a history of Fort Wayne Bible College, **A Vine of God's Own Planting**, authored by former FWBC president, Dr. Jared Gerig.

The first set of students received their Associate of Arts degree in Early Childhood Education during graduation ceremonies in May. Miss Alice Joy Weddle has extended her leave of absence from the Department of Teacher Education to pursue her doctoral program at Ball State University.

Appointed as a new department chairman this past year was Professor Sterling Demond as head of the Christian Education Department.

FWBC Correspondence Studies program continued to progress successfully with 1,863 new enrollments and a net enrollment for the year of 2,156 students. A total of 1,079 students successfully completed a course of study during the year. Donna Lutton was appointed director of the Department of Correspondence Studies in January.

The Lord has given us a good balance of men and women in our student body with our major areas of study being pastoral ministries and Christian education.

Development

On March 1, 1980, Keith Vincent accepted the responsibility as vice president for development. Mr. Vincent comes to us with a sense of God's call. He was a student here in the 1960's and has spent the last fifteen years in business.

Gift Income to Fort Wayne Bible College last year amounted to \$419,367 as we added 2,162 new donors to our rolls. During the year a total of 404 members were enrolled in the Harvester Club and Ambassador Corps bringing to 1,000 the number of active members.

Renewed emphasis will also be placed on estate planning and foundation giving. We will be conducting estate planning seminars in area churches, and it is hoped that within the next year we will have the opportunity to plan at least 50 new estates.

The admissions department had an active year, visiting some 32 college fairs, 41 secular high schools and 15 Christian schools. During the year, the department made more than 3,000 phone calls to prospective students and sent out more than 35,000 pieces of mail. An ambitious advertising program on behalf of FWBC was undertaken in a number of Christian magazines resulting in a 45 percent increase in the number of student inquiries over the previous year.

A new ministry was undertaken by the college in January with the sponsorship of "The Daily Walk," a monthly devotional guide published by Daily Walk Ministries, Atlanta, Georgia. More than 2,500 subscribers now receive the devotional which provides a com-

plete overview of the Bible in just one year.

A new director of the public relations department, Robert Jones, was appointed in April replacing Joan Mayers who requested reassignment to a faculty position. A major public relations event, conducted in cooperation with WBCL, was the "Day Away" program in May. An estimated 500 women gathered on campus for all-day meetings and workshops devoted to women's interests. During the year, FWBC was featured in a major article in the ROTO section of **The Fort Wayne News-Sentinel** upon the observance of the school's 75th anniversary.

The alumni and church relations area of FWBC showed excellent progress during the past year. Total alumni giving reached a new, all-time high and more than 500 alumni attended the alumni banquet in May. There are now 5,821 alumni of the college according to alumni office records. In church relations, 30

mini-team meetings were held in Missionary Churches throughout the Fort Wayne area Dr. and Mrs. Warner, along with FWBC senior, Deb Lehman, ministered through music and testimony.

The Financial Aid picture became a bit cloudy during the past year because of drastic reductions in funds from the State Student Assistance Commission. The effect on FWBC is approximately \$94,000. A drive to make up these funds was initiated involving churches, businesses and industry. The Lilly Foundation has offered to supply matching funds of up to \$7,200 for monies raised by September 30, 1980 to help with the present financial problem. New scholarships created were a Valedictorian/Salutatorian Scholarship, an Honor Scholarship, a Leadership Scholarship, and a scholarship in honor of Dr. Ira Gerig.

Student Life

Expanding staffs and new assignments marked the year in Student Services. Denny Williams, dean of men, took on additional duties as head soccer coach, and Sharon Mejeur, a resident advisor, will take on additional duties as a teacher in the secretarial science area. Barbara Coon was appointed acting dean of Student Services. Soccer was added as a new intercollegiate sport for FWBC with a schedule of games beginning in September. The intramural program continued to grow during the year with nearly 150 men involved.

In other activity under the supervision of Student Services, a Married Students Fellowship organization was formed to meet the unique needs of married students.

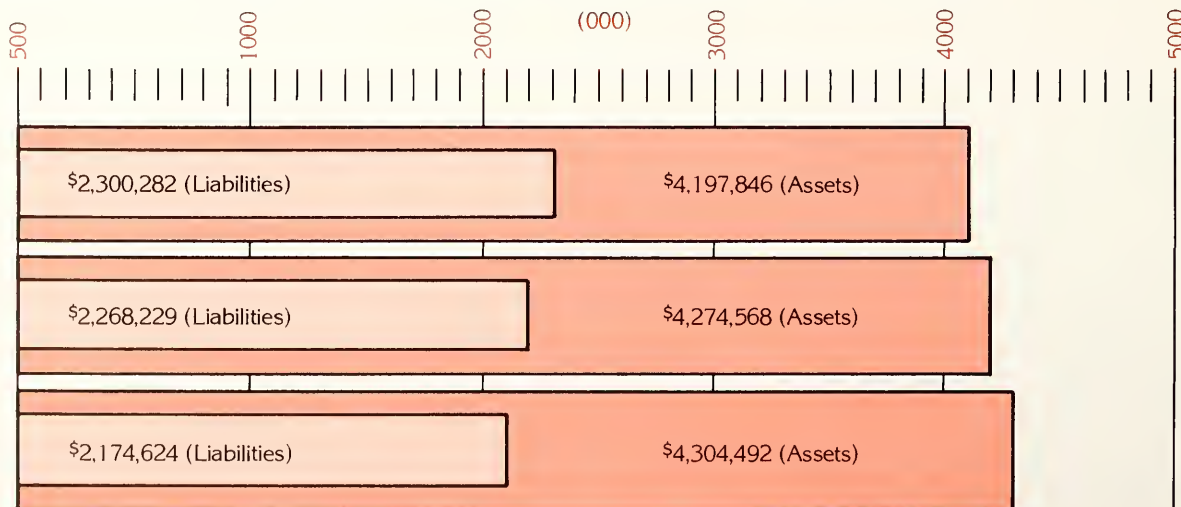
FWBC students continue to be our most effective outreach. This past year was an especially active one in the Christian Service Department as students ministered to 87 churches and organizations representing 24 different denominations. There were three performing groups during the year, plus an additional performing group, Envoy, which was co-sponsored by Student Missionary Fellowship. The groups presented 181 services and traveled more than 14,600 miles during the year.

Financial Summary

The financial status of the college continued to show improvement. Preliminary audit figures show an improvement in fund

balances of \$123,529 over a year ago. The cash flow problem has improved, but it is still a point of significant pressure. We are thank-

ful to our supporters for helping us to reduce our total indebtedness this past year by a total amount of \$93,605.
