Taylor University is proud to announce the opening of Camp Oskejo and the granting of Taylor credit for courses taken there. *The camp will be open from July 24 to August 17 to a limited enrollment of 20 men in each of two courses. Dr. Clinton J. Bushey, associate professor of zoology at Taylor, will teach a course in field biology. The second course in camp craft, organization and administration of camping will be taught by Coach Paul P. Williams, director of physical education at Taylor. Four hours credit will be given for each course at a cost of \$25 per week, the same as for summer school courses on the Upland campus.*

Camp Oskejo is located on two islands just opposite 135 feet of mainland frontage on Thousand Island Lake in the heart of the Land-O-Lakes region near Watersmeet, Mich. The goal of the camp officials is to build, maintain, staff and supervise a camp to provide wholesome out-of-door experiences for children, youth and adults and to conduct such camp activities as will contribute to the mental, physical, social and spiritual development of the campers. In order to achieve this aim the camp association employs only capable staff personnel who are vitally Christian in life and influence. In-service training opportunities for students and faculties of selected Christian colleges also are provided. Association officials, in cooperation with local churches, are making plans for gospel team work to be done in the surrounding territory this summer.

High ground, big timber, crystal clear water, numerous islands, miles of boat and canoe country and sandy beaches add to the assets of the camp. Last summer 29,700 feet of timber were cut and made ready to take to the mill. One cabin, 12' by 16' was built on the larger island; the mainland pier was cleared and made accessible to the county road system through the construction of a private road from the pier inland. Plans for this summer include the erection of a suitable main building on the larger island.

The camp is managed by the Oskejo Camp Association, a non-profit association organized under Michigan State law. Life memberships are available which entitle their holders to use of the camp's mainland pier for parking and boating privileges, special consideration for accommodations and registration, information service for the Land-O-Lakes region of Michigan's upper peninsula and an annual report of the progress and program of Camp Oskejo.

## Estimated Expenses

A boarding student taking a regular load of from six to eight semester hours will find the expenses for the summer session, exclusive of laboratory fees or charges for applied music courses, to be as follows:

Tuition .....	\$94.00
Board .....	76.50
Incidental Fee .....	10.00
Room .....	25.50
Total .....	\$206.00

Tuition will be charged at the rate of \$13.75 per hour for five semester hours or less.

If a laboratory course is chosen, or instruction in the Department of Music is included in the student's schedule, fees should be added to the above total in the amount shown in the following schedule. Laboratory fees are charged for the apparatus and purchase of supplies.

Private instruction in Music .....	32.00

Single rooms may be rented at an additional cost of \$12.50 for the summer session.

A \$5.00 application fee must be paid by all students entering Taylor University for the first time. This fee is not refundable. Every student is required to deposit in advance, an admission fee of \$10.00 which serves as a breakage and key deposit and as a room reservation for those desiring to live in college quarters. The entire deposit is refundable at the end of the session on the conditions that all keys are turned in and that any charges for breakage or fees have been satisfactorily adjusted.

A fee of \$5.00 is charged for late registration and one of \$1.00 for a change in registration.

## Further Information

The administration reserves the right to cancel all courses in which fewer than five students are registered.

The summer session offers an opportunity for guided conference and honors courses. Arrangements to take such courses may be made with the instructor and the Dean of the college.

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# Plan To Attend Taylor This Summer

**Summer Session June 7 -- August 3**

## HERE ARE THE STEPS TO FOLLOW IN ENROLLING...

1. Carefully consider whether Taylor is the type of school in which you will be happy. It is if your usual manner of life is consistent with the aims and standards set forth in the catalog.
2. Fill out completely the official admissions application blank and mail it to the Public Relations Office. Be sure to enclose the \$5 application fee (paid by every student entering Taylor for the first time) and the \$10 admission fee. The admission fee is refundable.
3. All students registering as regular or special students must submit letters of recommendation from their pastors. The pastor should be asked to send this letter to the Office of the Dean.
4. The following persons may enter the Taylor University Summer Session.
  - a. Regular College students may begin their work during the summer session. Such students should have a transcript of their high school record sent directly to the Office of the Dean, Taylor University. This transcript should show the completion of 15 acceptable units, conforming to the admission requirement as set forth in the Taylor University catalog.
  - b. Students who are regularly enrolled in another college or university may be admitted to the summer session by presenting a statement that they are students in good standing signed by the registrar of the institution in which they are presently enrolled. Should a student who is admitted on this basis wish to become a regular student at Taylor University, he will be required to present transcripts of both high school and college records before he is granted regular standing.
  - c. Students 21 years of age or older who are not candidates for degrees may be admitted to the summer session without the usual entrance units. They will be considered special students. The special student is a mature person who is not seeking a degree but who is admitted for the purpose of making a study of a definite subject or subjects for which he has adequate preparation. A letter stating that a student is applying for admission for the summer session on this basis should accompany the official admissions application blank. A full statement of background and experience which would enable the student to pursue the work which he desires to take during the summer session should be contained in this letter.
