The President

Evangelical Christians as well as United States citizens who cherish their liberties are heartened with the decision of the New Mexico court that ruled in favor of the Protestants who were courageous enough to protest against the encroachment of Roman Catholics in the public schools. On March 14 Judge E. T. Hensley ruled that the Federal and State Constitutions were violated in twenty-eight public schools where Catholic nuns, brothers and priests were employed as teachers.

In order to know how brazen Rome has become in this land whose liberties stem from the Protestant Reformation and where Catholics enjoy freedoms which they do not grant to Protestant minorities, it is in order to publish widely the findings of the court. Judge Hensley found that the defendants violated the Constitution because:

- 1. Religious doctrine is taught in public school classrooms.
- 2. Parochial school students are furnished with free bus transportation by the state.
- 3. Religious emblems are displayed in public school classrooms.
- 4. Public school classes are conducted in buildings owned by religious orders.
- 5. Free text books are supplied to parochial schools.

Judge Hensley ruled that "there is no separation of church and state" in twenty-eight schools of Northern New Mexico. In the three-week trial last fall in Santa Fe, testimony was given that prayers were said and the Catholic catechism was taught during school hours in schools which are tax supported.

We may well ask ourselves how long religious freedom would exist in this country if Catholics were in the majority. They certainly do not favor it in lands of Protestant minorities. Protestantism is a deadly error, according to the Catholic hierarchy, and error is not to be given the same right as truth. That is their defence.

Strange as it may seem, corrupt, liberty-denying Romanism has only broken reeds to lean upon in Catholic countries. Italy, Spain, Portugal and other Catholic lands do not add up to much in comparison to the military might of Russia. And so Rome is talking up to Russia because she is protected by the military might of countries which have been predominantly Protestant — Britain and the United States. And, unfortunately, our weak President and vacillating State Department are cordially open to directives from the Vatican.

Thank God, for Protestants like those in New Mexico, who dare to protest!

The UNITY of the SPIRIT*

"I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called, with all lowliness, and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love; endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling" (Eph. 4:1-4).

Denominationalism is a great weakness in the church. Much strength is wasted in keeping up church walls that should be used in bringing souls to Christ and building up the body of Christ. Jude writes, "But ye, beloved, building up yourselves on your most holy faith, praying in the Holy Ghost, keep yourselves in the love of God, looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life." This is our mission.

The merging of denominations is not essential, however, to the "unity of the Spirit." It is not necessary for all the people in a town to move into one big house in order to seek each other's highest welfare. So it is with regard to our church homes.

There is a difference in homes, and there is a difference in churches. Some denominations are building themselves up at the expense of other societies. This is not the spirit of Christ. It is contrary to the desire of our Lord, who prayed that "all might be one."

No one denomination is the basis for "unity in the Spirit." The basis of the oneness for which our Lord prayed is not found in any society on earth, but in the Holy Spirit. This truth strikes the death blow to denominational pride. The only ground for boasting is in the Lord.

There are several qualifications for entering into the highest fellowship of the Spirit. First, we must be in the Spirit. That means more than to be in harmony with the spirit of our society. It means to be in the element of the Spirit and in harmony with Him. We have a beautiful example of this in John on the Isle of Patmos. According to Revelation 1:10, he was "in the Spirit on the Lord's day." There he heard and saw things that only those who are in the Spirit can hear and see.

Then, we must be obedient to all the light the Holy Spirit sheds on our path.

In meeting these conditions, denominational walls that separate us will become very small, and the barturn to page 14

LOCATE OURSELVES

in the

Christian Life

There is such a thing as traveling along without knowing exactly where we are on the road. We consult the road-map to locate ourselves, and by its help, we can find the place where we happen to be. We may find ourselves on a wrong road, or that there is a better road than the one we are taking, or that we are wasting time through misdirection. There may be any number of complexities discovered by such a check-up.

This all has meaningful application to the spiritual life, and the most miserable souls to be dealt with are those who have lost their way spiritually. It is not a question of sincerity nor honesty, but a serious problem of locating themselves. Such souls confess that they are at sea, and have lost their Their uncontrollable flounderings keep dashing them upon the rocks of despair and hope-Some young people I lessness. know have reached the highest mountain-peak of danger and doubt in spiritual things. They are on the verge of losing their spiritual foothold, and plunging into an abyss of darkness and defeat. There is no apostasy in their theology or thinking, but they have lost their bearings in experience, and the maze caused by a spasmodic assurance and broken faith is keeping them bewildered and defeated.

There is no greater boon in the Christian life than a firm knowledge of the reality of great spiritual experiences in our own lives. To locate ourselves, we must begin with an examination of ourselves relative to the initial experience of salvation. The question is, "Am I doubting my present, personal salvation in Jesus Christ?" This the problem of constant, conscious assurance. If we are answering the above question in the affirmative. then we need to see that within our hearts there exists a state of uncertainty and doubt which counteracts a perfect working of saving faith. Such uncertainty and doubt will be caused by an irritating condition of self-condemnation, for "if our heart condemn us not, then have we confidence toward God" (I John 3:19-22). John in these verses is dealing with Christians who live habitually in a state of self-accusation. In spite of their sincere devotion, faithful prayer life, and deep study of the Word, they are still being arraigned before the judgment bar of their own conscience.

Such Christians need to recognize the miserable mistake which they are making in letting their own heart and conscience be the source of their assurance. They commit the wrong of studying themselves for the evidences of a right spiritual relation and condition; they test their spiritual growth by their own fickle feelings; they live in a spiritual strait-jacket which makes every move limited and painful; they weigh the measure of God's presence by the scale of their emotional reactions; they serve by means of fluctuating impulses and mental movings. What blessing comes when all such discover that the heart and inner self is not the final court of appeal nor authority, but that the heart, shaken in faith and disturbed in emotions, must find its strongest assurance "before Him. For if our heart condemn us, God is greater than our heart, and knoweth all things." Let not fall short of carrying our case into the court of heaven where "we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ, the righteous: and he is himself the propitiation for our sins." To gain heart rest, our look should pass from the inward to the upward, from self to the Saviour. Our assurance will take on stability when we realize that there is a permanence in God's acceptance of us. We have in heaven "an enduring possession. Cast not away therefore your confidence, which hath great recompense of reward."

From the problem of assurance, we pass to the problem of activity. We need to locate ourselves in relation to what we can do, and what we cannot do. There is a satanic strategy which endeavors to drive Christians to extremes. It makes of the Christian on the one extreme,

a hypersensitive, conscience-stricken, fanatical worry-wart; or if it fails in this, it will seek to dull his conscience and enthusiasm, until luke-warmness and cold indifference so color his actions that he becomes a moral gad-about whose first-love is to compromise with evil. Christian young people must find a "middle-of-the-road" course, an unfluctuating rule of conduct where they can act without hesitation and without condemnation. We have such a rule given us in I Corinthians 10:31: "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." Such a guide for action will cull out as inferior many things which we do. Many other things which we do or cannot do because of an over-conscientiousness will lose their significance in that in no way do they bring glory to God. That which will gratify the flesh, serve to conform to the will of others, lead us into temptation, go counter to the Word of God, fulfill selfish ambitions, attract our attention to earthly things, harm our spiritual influence, bedim our Christian character, silence our Christian testimony, destroy our Christian joy, interrupt our Christian fellowship, and overthrow our Christian honesty, never be productive of "the glory of God."

But there is another vital fluctuation-point in the life of the Christian where he needs to find his directions and be fully persuaded. It concerns his associations. A Christian young person will find his most aggravating temptation at this particular crossroad. Shall I go the way of the crowd, or shall I go the way of the cross? Here the Bible will challenge us again, "Come out turn to page 11



riers that divide spiritual people will disappear. We have a beautiful example of this in Peter's experience in connection with Cornelius. As the Apostle walked in the light of heaven and obeyed the Spirit's voice, the "wall of partition" between Jew and Gentile that seemed so high and strong vanished, and Peter exclaimed, "Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons."

One day while reading the Word in a train, the conductor asked me, "Understandest thou what thou readest?" A very interesting and helpful conversation followed in which we had the sweetest fellowship in the Spirit. The question was never asked, "To what denomination do you belong?"

To preserve and to strengthen this heavenly relationship we must crave to be in most intimate fellowship with the "Father and the Son" in the Holy Spirit. We must shun everything that will not aid in strengthening this oneness with our blessed Lord. Then we must be willing to minister not only to those inside our society but to those outside as well. The gifts of the Spirit are given for the edification of the whole body of Christ.

We are aware that Satan is opposed to all of the work of the Holy Spirit in the hearts of men. But he marshalls his strongest forces against the crowning work of the blessed Spirit, which is the blending together of all believers in the Holy One.
