PREMIERE SHOWING OF FILM PRODUCTION SET FOR MAY 10

"Bridgebuilders" Chosen Name of Sound-Color Motion Picture Story of Fort Wayne Bible College

"Bridgebuilders", stirring narrative-dramatic sound-color film production of Fort Wayne Bible College, is scheduled for its premiere showing in Fort Wayne on Monday evening, May 10, after more than a year of planning, filming, writing, and production. The exact location for the showing has not been determined, but will be announced soon.

Actual production has been done by Missions Visualized, Inc., of Hollywood, California, with Lloyd Young, executive producer, and Kenn Carmichael, writer-director. Coordinating committee for the college was Dr. S. A. Witmer, president; Richard Gerig, director of promotion; and Elmer Neuenschwander, dean of students.


Primary objective of the film is to show the value of a Bible-centered college curriculum. Along with this emphasis, all areas of student life and ministry of Fort Wayne Bible College are shown.

The story of the film is based on the life of Jake Schierling, alumnus of the college who is now serving as a missionary to Sierra Leone, West Africa. Jake is seen as a football hero in his home state of California, as a student at Fort Wayne Bible College, and finally as an African missionary.


The major part of the film was made on the college campus over a two-week period last October. Sets were constructed on the auditorium platform, and a large number of students participated in the scenes. Other footage was made in Africa and California, with brief scenes from China, India, the Philippines, and Hawaii. Mr. Schierling returned to the states in October to make the film, in cooperation with the Foreign Department of the Missionary Church Association.

Nearly twenty-five organizations in Fort Wayne assisted in the production by loaning props and other facilities needed.

An outstanding program is being planned for the premier showing, and further plans will be announced in the May issue of the VISION.

The Double Cure

In the New Testament the twin truths of salvation—the death and resurrection of our Lord—are inseparable links. Each Gospel gives a detailed account of both. The central message of Apostolic preaching was, "The God of our fathers raised up Jesus, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree." In the Epistles one is regarded as a necessary complement to the other: "Christ was delivered for our offences, and was raised for our justification."

Both death and resurrection are absolutely essential to our salvation. In a very real sense Christ died for our sins at Calvary, but death was not enough. Had Christ not risen, the demons of hell would have sung in glee. An unemptied tomb would have announced to the world that evil was victorious over righteousness. The only perfect man that ever lived succumbed to evil and death. But, thank God, after evil had done its worst, Christ rose triumphantly to become our all-conquering Saviour.

Even with the Cross an accomplished fact, it could not save us without the resurrection. Paul emphatically declares, "If Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins." Without the resurrection we would have no interceding High Priest at the throne of grace, no living Saviour to walk with us along the pathway of life. We need Christ as our resurrection as well as our death, for we need not only pardon but life. We need transformation as well as forgiveness. The Cross provides the one and the resurrection the other.

It is a deplorable fact that many have not passed from Calvary to resurrection. They are living on Saturday between Good Friday and Easter. They confess their sinfulness again and again, but they experience nothing more than a continual round of sinning and confessing. They are still dead in their sins because they have not been raised with Christ in newness of life. But there are also genuine, born-again Christians who are not fully identified with Christ's resurrection life. Some of the graveclothes of the old life still cling to them. What is needed is a full measure of the double cure for sin. "Reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord." "As Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life."

The abundant release of life from the risen Lord is the only answer to the dead orthodoxy and neo-intellectualism that are blighting evangelical, fundamental Christianity. It is also the only answer to regaining the onward stride of victorious conquest in our mission of evangelizing the world.
