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Committee Announces New Plans, Goals For Patrons Council Fund Drive

The Patrons Council Planning Committee announces new goals designed to substantially increase the supporting interest of friends and constituencies of the college on the national level. Plans call for a goal of at least one thousand patrons who annually make an investment in the operational program of Fort Wayne Bible College. The committee hopes to achieve its goal by early next fall, which is the start of the fiftieth anniversary school year of the college.

To be designated a patron, the donor makes an annual gift to the college of not less than ten dollars. He becomes a member of what is known as the Patrons Council, and receives a membership card. Each member is regularly informed of the work and ministry of the college, and receives reports of its educational and financial operations. Membership may begin at any time, with the anniversary date being the first of the month following the date of the subscription.

To expedite the new drive, prospective donors in all areas of the college constituency will be invited to become patrons. A special letter will be sent to parents of students during March. All friends who are included in the college mailing list will receive a letter of invitation during April. The Alumni Association is organizing plans to contact all alumni. Church constituencies will be approached during the late summer. The plan is to bring all friends of Fort Wayne Bible College into a working, cooperative group, supporting the cause of the college with regular prayer and investments.

Members of the Patrons Council Planning committee are Dr. S. A. Witmer, president of the college; Dr. Milo Rediger, trustee; Mr. Arthur Ditmer, business manager; Prof. Morrow Cook, faculty representative; Rev. Harlan Wright, president of the Alumni Association; and Mr. Richard Gerig, director of promotion.

Who Supports the Christian College?

It is coming to be recognized that private, independent colleges not only need help, but they are indispensable institutions. In a free society they are a must. For the Christian church, the Christian college is indispensable to produce the necessary leadership for its mission of world evangelism.

Last year half of the independent colleges operated in the red; the average deficit was \$51,200. An industrialist, Robert E. Wilson of Standard Oil, said recently: "If present conditions continue, we face the very real danger that many of these fine independent colleges, which have contributed for more than their proportionate share to the intellectual, religious, and scientific leadership of the nation, will be forced to close their doors just before the unprecedentedly large wave of prospective students, now sweeping through the public schools, reaches the colleges."

But whose responsibility is it to support private colleges? Several years ago President Sparks of Wabash really sparked a movement when he said, "The corporations." Now corporation heads are making it an act all over the country by saying: "That's right. We do have a social responsibility. Industry owes much to these colleges for they have produced 71 per cent of industry's leaders. Both industry and colleges have a stake in the free enterprise system."

This method of tapping the resources of corporations presents problems to the Christian college with Biblical convictions.

Why is industry asked to support colleges? I think the principal reason is that it represents wealth. Large corporations are able to help. But whose responsibility is it? It may well be that segments of society have a responsibility to share the cost of educating their leaders, but when we come to the genuinely Christian college, the real responsibility does not belong to industry. It belongs to the Christian public. Christians have not only a privilege but a responsibility to support Christian education. In the setting of Fort Wayne Bible College, it is just as necessary to prepare a missionary, for example, as to send him to a foreign land.

However, relatively few Christians and few churches have such a sense of responsibility. The blame perhaps rests on educational leadership rather than upon churches and individuals, who have not been informed and challenged. Robert E. Wilson can again be quoted: "Let me express the conviction, that while we may hope for and reasonably expect this type of giving (corporation) to increase, it can be no substitute for individual giving. It can supplement but never replace the individual concern and individual sacrifice through which an institution draws vitality and gains stature."

Specifically, Fort Wayne Bible College needs 1000 Patrons to back the College with their prayers and annual support. The Patrons' Council presents an inviting challenge to every friend and alumnus.

Our Hearts Say Thanks!

In the last *Vision* it was reported that \$634.07 in 79 gifts had been received from November 20 to December 15 toward the debt of \$14,200 on the food service improvement. Now the goodness of God is acknowledged for the gifts received between December 15 and January 14, including one gift of \$1,000, another of \$1,300, and another of \$2,000. A total of 20 gifts were received during the month amounting to \$5,687.00. This brings the total received for the reduction of the debt to \$6,321.07, leaving a balance of \$7,878.93. Notes in the sum of \$6,000 were paid off on January 1. Again, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow."

The College is also grateful for a gift of \$2,000 from one of the trustees for the new South campus building project, which is in the early planning stage.

It is earnestly hoped that the remaining indebtedness of the College—the \$7,878.93 on the food service improvement—will be completely wiped out by the time the building campaign is launched.

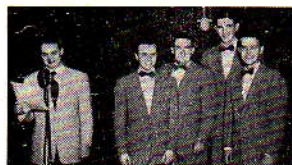

New Folder Describes Nurses Training Program

An attractive brochure which describes the new cooperative nurses training program has just been prepared by the Promotion office and printing department of the college. Illustrated in blue, black, and white, the folder relates in detail the program of study now offered jointly by Fort Wayne Bible College and the Lutheran Hospital School of Nursing. Pictures of both schools are included.

The plan makes it possible for girls to complete a standard three-year nurses training program along with two years of Bible college education. The first year is taken at Fort Wayne Bible College, the next three at the school of nursing, and the fifth at the college. The student becomes eligible for both the R.N. and the Bachelor of Science degree in Missionary Nursing Service.
