FORTY-NINTH SCHOOL YEAR OPENS WITH GOOD PROSPECTS, ADDED COURSES

Missionary Nursing Service New Program for Girl Students

The forty-ninth school year of Fort Wayne Bible College opened on Monday, September 14, with bright prospects for one of the finest years in the history of the College. Nearly one hundred new students and a high percentage of returning students guaranteed a good total enrollment; and

a new course of study, Bachelor of Science in Missionary Nursing Service, opens greater opportunities for girls interested in nurses training.

During the first week, freshman students are being introduced to College life and activities with orientation lectures and social events, and are being given entrance examinations. Six Hawaiians are included in the new class. Returning students register on Thursday, September 17. Dormitory space for both men and women was filled several weeks ago.

In co-operation with the Lutheran Hospital School of Nursing, the College now offers a unique program in Missionary Nursing Service aimed to prepare Christian young women to minister to spiritual and physical needs on mission fields.

The Lutheran Hospital is located just seven blocks from the College, and training is taken alternately at both institutions. The first year is spent on the College campus as a full time student, the next three years are spent at the hospital taking the regular course in nursing. During this time the student continues to be identified with the College in its religious and social life. The student then returns to the College campus to complete the fifth year and to receive her degree. She is also eligible for the usual R.N. following her work at the hospital. The first girl to enroll in this course is Masako Tengan of Honolulu, Hawaii, a Freshman this year.

Following registration week, spiritual emphasis week will be held from September 21 to 25, with Mr. Tom Hare of Ireland as speaker.

Alumni Meet During YFC Mission in Japan

Several alumni of the College met recently in Japan during the Youth for Christ World Conference on evangelism in Tokyo. Included was Professor Oliver Steiner, of the College faculty, who joined the evangelistic campaign in August. Mr. Steiner's ministry took him into the southern island of Japan, where he assisted in personal work, musical ministry, and tract distribution.

FWBC alumni who enjoyed a reunion with Mr. Steiner were Howard Dunlap, pastor of the Berlin Christian Union Church, Eden, Ohio; Edmund Mills, Youth for Christ Director in Tokyo; Richard Reilly, Missionary to India; Kathleen Jacobsen, Missionary to Japan; and Berman Smith, class of '53. Henry Stout, a present student, also joined the mission.

Mission Band Books "This Gathering Storm" for Showing in Coliseum

"This Gathering Storm," new sound color film produced by Bob Pierce, UN corespondent in the far east, and presenting a story of missions in that area, has been booked by the Student's Mission Band for a showing in the Allen County War Memorial Coliseum on Monday evening, November 16. The film is expected to draw one of the largest religious gatherings ever to meet in the Fort Wayne area.

The film portrays unusual missionary data and challenges as seen through the eyes of Bob Pierce, who has spent a number of years observing first hand the war conditions of the Orient. Evangelist Billy Graham says it is "the most powerful film document I have ever seen on the mounting crisis of missions. I challenge every Christian to be stirred to action by it."

The picture is projected on a wide angle screen, twice as large as most screens currently in use. The story sets forth in vivid color the battle-grounds of Asia, the foment of India's masses, rare scenes of Hindu worship, strange temple rites and depicts the rebirth of nationalism in Japan and the resurgence of Shinto-

"Where there is no vision, the people perish."

Where there is no educational vision, the people perish.

Where there is no vision, an educational institution perishes. The framework of the institution may continue. There may be buildings and students and teachers, but the institution is lifeless and visionless. It is no longer imbued with the dynamic of vision that gave it birth. Efforts are directed toward maintaining prestige, perpetuating its traditions, and operating the mechanics of organization.

It is even possible for an institution to be completely divorced from the purpose that conceived it. In England there are churches without attendants, but clergymen, supported by endowments, regularly "say" services and perform their ritualistic duties. All of this done without any relation to the community need that led to their founding. In this country there are many colleges and universities founded by men of Christian vision which have long since been interred in the tomb of deadening secularism. Their frame of reference is this present world. Science — knowledge of things has displaced faith in eternal verities.

Fort Wayne Bible College was born of vision. Those men of God who founded it had little of this world's goods. They certainly did not have the wherewithal to establish a school to provide Christian education to thousands for the service at home and abroad. But they did have vision! They did have the spirit of sacrificial, selfforgetful service! They were willing to work long hours for the realization of that vision. There were no drones among them. They lived and worked and prayed with eternity's values in view. In their scale of values kingdom interests and the Great Commission were

In 1954-55, the College will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary a half century of fulfillment of vision. But if that observance is all that it should be, there must be a re-dedication to the "heavenly vision" now. Renewed vision is the one preparation that can make the year of jubilee a success. That means a fresh commitment to spiritual values and spiritual goals. We must see anew that spiritual preparation of students by the enduement and control of the Holy Spirit is primary; that know-how in the life of prayer and faith is indispensable; that educational programs must be geared to human need; that God's will and God's glory must be first in all plans for the future: that the College is not an end in itself but only a means toward a divinely directed end. That quality of vision will generate self-forgetful service.

May God grant to all - constituer churches, alumni, friends, board members, students, faculty, staff - Spirit-enlightening vision

for the days ahead!

"Sunrise Chapel" Adds New Stations; Stronger Short Wave Coverage

Five new stations have been added to the broadcast schedule of "Sunrise Chapel' during the summer months. The stations, which bring the total number to twenty-eight, are WTRC, Elkhart; WLOI, LaPorte; WGRY, Gary; WHOT, South Bend; and WOPA, Oak Park, Illinois.

The program, which is heard each Friday on HCJB from Quito, Ecuador, is now finding a new worldwide out-reach due to the increased technical power of the famous missionary short wave radio station. Last month HCJB increased its signals by fifteen to twenty times more effective power than in the past. New generator and transmitter facilities are now in operation. This means that the ministry of "Sunrise Chapel" is now reaching even more people than ever before.

A new "Sunrise Chapel" series will begin on WKJG in Fort Wayne October 5, broadcasting each morning, Monday through Friday.
