## A CAPPELLA CHOIR HOST TO MUSIC FESTIVAL MAY 10: GROUP HAS SUCCESSFUL TOUR

The A Cappella Choir, directed by Professor Oliver E. Steiner, returned to Fort Wayne Sunday, April 12, in time to present its Home Concert that evening, concluding one of the most successful choral tours in the history of the college. Singing twenty-two concerts in three states and Ontario, Canada, over a two-week period, the choir reported that a number of young

people accepted Christ as Savior, others were led to consider Fort Wayne Bible College as a place of training, and hundreds received spiritual blessing and inspiration through the excellent musical interpretations of the group. About 900 people attended the Home Concert, which was held in Founders Memorial auditorium.

The choir will participate in the College Choirs Music Festival which will be held on the campus on Sunday afternoon, May 10 at 3:00 P.M. Assisting the choir will be groups from three other colleges: Moody Bible Institute Chorale, Bethel College Choir, and the Asbury College Chorale. Each choir will present a group of selections, and will join for a combined performance to conclude the program.

#### Commencement Week Activities Announced

The forty-fifth annual Commencement Week exercises are announced for the week of May 25 to May 30.

On Saturday evening the Wiswell Speech Contest will be held. Rev. Morrow Cook, instructor in Bible, has been chosen to bring the Baccalaureate sermon on Sunday afternoon, May 24.

The senior class program will be given on Monday evening followed by the Annual Music Concert on Tuesday. The program will include the A Cappella Choir, the Chapel Singers, small groups, and individual performers. Alumni and former students will meet for their annual banquet on Wednesday.

Dr. V. Raymond Edman, president of Wheaton College, will present the commencement address on Thursday morning, May 28. Forty-five seniors will graduate.

VISION! What word strikes more vital associations among friends and alumni of the Bible College than VISION? It was vision of Christ dying on Calvary that prompted us as guilty sinners to burst forth in grateful song, "At the cross, at the cross, where I first saw the light, and the burden of my sin rolled away." It is the heavenly vision of the exalted Lord with a mission for each of us that binds us in common dedication to the fulfillment of the Great Commission. It is vision of eternal rewards and the imminent return of Christ that inspires us as "workers together with Him." It is vision of a richer Bible College fellowship, a College with increased spheres of usefulness and widening horizons of service, that gives point to our common interests. Vision alone can maintain the life of the College, for without vision, people perish. To that end, VISION is dedicated.

This is written at Phoenix, Arizona, where I have had the opportunity of engaging in a week-long Bible conference in the First Missionary Church. Here it has been my happy privilege to meet a number of Alumni. Their number in this growing community, 2,000 miles from Fort Wayne, is a reminder of the wide influence of the College. The pastor of the First Missionary Church, which bulged with an attendance of 470 Easter Sunday, is Rev. Clarence Gerig, both an alumnus and a trustee of the College. Besides Mrs. Gerig, he is assisted by another graduate and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Ogden, '51. Ralph is capable youth director and choir leader, and Miriam is organist. Frieda Rediger does double duty, serving as Superintendent of the Junior Department of the Sunday School and working at the Good Samaritan Hospital in "records." This church is also the home church of Mrs. Sylvan Hausser, '23, missionary to Ecuador, and of Dr. Clyde Taylor, trustee.

Three Bible College alumni are on the staff of the Phoenix Christian High School, a growing institution with competent leadership and high academic standards. Harry McElhone is a full-time teacher, and his wife Marie is a secretary. Harry expects an M.A. at Arizona State College in May. Bob Quay is teaching Bible and is pursuing studies at Grand Canyon College. His wife Rita is also an alumna.

Two former students are engaged in Child Evangelism work in this area—Betty Mason and Ardis Harris. Other alumni are Mrs. Samuel Schumacher, Rev. J. A. Greider, and Mr. and Mrs. William Hirschy. Rev. J. A. Greider, a graduate of the Class of 1910, is retired after a worthy record of service. Likewise, Mr. Hirschy has just retired after more than 30 years in the public schools of Phoenix.

The constructive, Christian influences that have gone out from these alumni in the Phoenix area are immeasurable. God bless them and all others in similar posts at home and abroad.

#### "Sunrise Chapel" Rallies Scheduled

New Campus Area Encourages Growth

Through a remarkable series of providences the Bible College now has a fine addition to the campus for future development. It is a single tract covering five city blocks, or fourteen acres, across the boulevard from the present campus area. It is surrounded by one of the finest residential districts of the city and is in Zone A—restricted to single family homes, churches and colleges.

Title to the property was acquired on January 26, when Miss Clara Wiebke, co-owner with Miss Emma Wiebke and Mrs. W. H. Wiebke, conveyed the deed to President S. A. Witmer, who with Mr. S. A. Lehman, represented the Governing

Board in the transaction.

The tract is entirely paid for and provides ample room for continued growth of the College. With the north campus entirely built up and with pressing needs for an enlarged libraty and living quarters, the next building development will take place on the new campus addition.

At present a three-acre tract, which has been improved for a recreational area, is used in the physical educational program of the school. A part of the campus facing Lexington Avenue is still occupied by virgin trees—stately white oaks, smooth-bark beech, maple, elm, and hickory trees. It is an ideal site for wiener roasts and similar outdoor events in the fall of the year.

At the last meeting of the Board, a planning committee was composed to give over-all study to the development of the new campus. The committee is composed of Howard Von Gunten, Superintendent of Parks in Fort Wayne; Prof. Harvey Hitchell; Rev. Jared F. Gerig; Mr. S. A. Lehman; and Dr. S. A. Witmer.
