New Year Ushers In 50th Anniversary Of College; Jubilee Plans Announced

Outstanding Speakers Booked for 1954-55 School Year

The year 1954 brings Fort Wayne Bible College to the threshold of its fiftieth anniversary, and plans for the 1954-55 jubilee observance are already well under way. A sense of spiritual optimism keynotes the planning, and all anniversary programs and conferences will be geared to set forth the continuing growth and development of the college, and to reaffirm the faith so clearly defined by the college founders when the school was established in 1904.

The Governing Board has designated the entire school year of 1954-'55 as the jubilee year. The anniversary committee, composed of representatives

from the Governing Board, administration, faculty and staff, and alumni association, has announced six oneweek periods throughout the school year when emphasis will be given to various areas of the college operation and ministry. They are designated as follows: September 20 to 26, 1954, Evangelism; November 8 to 12, Christian Education; January 10 to 16, 1955, Christian Ministry; February 21 to 27, Anniversary Week; March 21 to 27, Missions; and April 25 to May 1, Music and Radio.

Several outstanding speakers have already been booked for a number of the conferences. They include Dr. Paul Rees, pastor of the First Covenant Church, Minneapolis; Dr. Alan Redpath, pastor of Moody Church, Chicago; Dr. Harold Mason, professor of Christian Education at Asbury Seminary, Wilmore, Kentucky; Dr. Eugene A. Nida, secretary of the Translation Department of the American Bible Society; and Dr. Olaf Christiansen, choral music authority of St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota. Other speakers and further plans for the anniversary year will be announced during the coming months.

Music Critic Acclaims College "Messiah" Concert

The "Messiah," as presented by the Fort Wayne Bible College 165-voice chorus and 26-piece orchestra on the college campus on Sunday, December 13, drew perhaps the largest attendance and won the most heart-felt praise of any previous "Messiah" presentation at the college. An estimated audience of over twelve hundred thrilled with inspiration to the interpretation of the oratorio by the group. Of particular significance was the presence of Mr. Walter A. Hansen, local music critic, who wrote a very praise-worthy review of the concert for the succeeding day's issue of the News-Sentinel.

Mr. Hansen seemed particularly impressed with the spiritual tone of the performance. He wrote, "It is uplifting to note the devotion, the reverence, and the impressiveness with which a substantial part of George Frederick Handel's Messiah was presented Sunday afternoon in Founders Memorial Auditorium on the campus of Fort Wayne Bible College." Speaking of the chorus, he said, "It delineated Han-

A Year of Jubilee . . .

with the president . . . Dr. S. A. Witmer



The year of Jubilee is before us as the Bible College enters 1954. For the Israelites the year of jubilee was a momentous celebration. Persons who, through adversity, had sold themselves into slavery were set at liberty—all claims to servitude cancelled. Land that had been leased or sold to pay off debts was returned to its original hereditary owner. The land was given rest—fallowed in order to increase its productivity for the future. Because it was a year of celebration for deliverance, it became a symbol of the Messianic year of grace (Isa. 61:2). It pointed forward to Messiah's reign when the universe with its conflicts and inequalities would be restored to its original harmony. It was a year of rejoicing as liberated slaves, adorned by garlands, rejoiced in their emancipation.

Holds Deep Significance

The year of jubilee for the College should also have deep significance. It should be the occasion to look back to the rock from whence the institution with its world-wide influence was hewn. A look at the past will disclose that it took men cast from a heroic mould to do that task. They had to be men with stalwart faith, great courage, and inspired vision to hew an institution from such an insignificant source. Frankly, I do not know how those men lived when they founded our school. I know that they worked without thought of wages. That carefully hand-written cash journal for the first full year of operation repeats the story. The Superintendent and his wife each received a \$5.00 Christmas present, and toward the end of the school year, when it appeared that the books would balance, they received a stipened of \$75.00. That was their total cash compensation above room and board. Two full-time teachers received monthly allowances ranging from \$5.00 to \$10.00. For each the total was \$58.00. But those men and women, some of whom were gifted teachers, were inspired by a great vision. For the realization of that vision they gave of themselves freely.

Occasion for Thanksgiving

The committee planning the year of jubilee wants it to serve as an occasion of thanksgiving to God and of highlighting the great verities of the Christian faith. The jubilee year should gird us with the dynamic of renewed vision by its spiritual impact. The committee wants it to be the occasion for renewed faith, for enduement of power, and a fresh dedication to the redeeming purpose of God. After all, the infinite resources above for an expanded ministry of the College will be released only through prayer and faith and obedience.

The crux of its success lies in our own hearts.

del's polyphany with clarity and thrilling richness of tone . . . the chorus paid careful attention to its diction . . . this, too, contributed in a large measure to the clear-cut character of the singing." He commended the conducting of Prof. Steiner by saying, "One could see that his lead-ership was both exacting and inspiring. It sprang from exceptional ability and reflected deep-felt devotion to the musical and the spiritual message of the great masterpiece . . . To him, Handel's Messiah, with its sublime and imperishable beauty. was all-important at the concert not the man on the podium." Concluding his review, Mr. Hansen remarked, "Mr. Steiner, the chorus and the soloists have every right to hold their heads high after their inspiring presentation of Handel's Messiah. But I am sure that they will not do so, they will continue rather to approach the great masterpiece in the genuine humility of which I was aware Sunday afternoon."

Soloists for the presentation were Mrs. Vivian Buettner Welsh, soprano; Mrs. Dorothy Lugibihl Leh-man, contralto; Ralph Nielsen, tenor; and Henry Simminger, baritone. Mrs. Robert Shambaugh was concert master, and Ira Gerig was organist.
