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"THIS GATHERING STORM" READY FOR COLISEUM SHOWING**Students Sponsor Indiana Premier of Vivid Missionary Documentary Nov. 16; Choir to Sing**

Fort Wayne Bible College brings a "first" in the field of religious films to the tri-state area on Monday, November 16, when the newest missionary film documentary, "This Gathering Storm," will be shown on the new wide screen dimension in the Allen County War Memorial Coliseum at 7:30 P.M. The film, shown in beautiful natural colors, is produced by Dr. Bob Pierce, United Nations news correspondent to the Far East, and is being sponsored by the Students' Mission Band of the college in the interests of interpreting to the public religious developments in the Orient. Specially designed optics in high intensity arc projection and a 50-foot wide screen will be installed in the Coliseum by

World Vision, Inc., booking agents of the film. Dr. Pierce, who is also well-known for his work with Youth for Christ, will personally accompany the film and will speak briefly at the showing. The A Cappella Choir and the Crusaders Quartet will present several musical selections during the evening.

"This Gathering Storm" is a heart-searching story of the impending storm breaking over Asia as seen through the eyes of Dr. Bob Pierce in his missionary journeys. The film has been typed by such outstanding Christian leaders as Evangelist Billy Graham, Sunday School worker and lecturer Dr. Henrietta C. Mears, Evangelist Jack Shuler and others as the most comprehensive study of missions ever released to the public. In a vital moving way, the viewer is taken along the Korean battleground with Evangelist Billy Graham preaching to United Nations troops and Korean refugees, to the masses of India and their restless search for peace, and to the shores of Japan where nationalism is experiencing a

Fort Wayne Bible College recently received in several instalments a gift of \$2,600 from Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Helrigel of Pasadena, California, in memory of their late daughter Jesse. The gift is to be used as a revolving fund from which loans are to be made to deserving students on the basis of need. It is therefore designated the Jesse Helrigel Memorial Student Loan Fund.

The Committee on Administration has appointed a committee of three to review and act upon applications for loans. It consists of the Business Manager, Arthur Dittmer; the Dean of Students, Elmer Neuenschwander; and the President, S. A. Witmer. Loans are of two types: emergency loans and tuition loans.

I should like to challenge all of us to rededicate ourselves to our essential task of educating youth for Christian service. As Christian educators our first job is not building impressive institutions. These are only means to an end and must always be kept subordinate to our first task — that of fostering the development of Christ-like, Bible-indoctrinated, Spirit-filled personalities. I am reminded of the revised scale of values that came to Dr. Charles Roberts, who gave much of his life to building Biola's wing in China, Kankow Bible Institute, and who saw that institution swept away by the Communist invasion. This is what he said in substance, "If I would have my work to do over, I would give more time to building up native Christians in faith so that more imperishable values would remain after institutionalism is destroyed."

There is a further compelling reason why Bible institutes and colleges will render their greatest service of sticking to their last. This confused, despairing generation is looking for guidance. Some, of course, are saying in the presence of grave peril and crisis: "So what? Let us eat and be merry, for tomorrow we die." But there are others who are yearning for some word of reassuring hope, some way out of the crisis unresolved by war and diplomacy. Diplomacy and military leaders have failed and modern science has no answer.

What folly modern science represents! Its supreme achievement is the splitting of the atom and the creation of the Hell-bomb, but it knows nothing of the world's spiritual need nor how to meet it. Recently when an international meeting of scientists was held at Jerusalem, the students of the Hebrew University called upon this assembly of scientists for an authoritative word of guidance. The scientists were honest enough to reply that what they were seeking was outside the province of science. They would more likely find it in religious faith.

Our schools, which are all committed to the validity and authority of the revelation of God's Word, have an indispensable educational task in this hour. The only sensible interpretation of history and current world-shaking events is found in the Bible. The only rational alternative of the insanity of hellish war is the return of Jesus Christ in power and glory.

And one more aspect to this challenge: There is only one power that can match or more than match the tremendous energy of the H-bomb: that is the dynamic of God's Holy Spirit released in human personality. In 30 A.D. the one dominant power that seemed to occupy the civilized world was the political and military might of Rome. She was the symbol of power. But in an obscure corner of the empire, a lowly Nazarene was saying to a few ordinary folk, "Tarry ye at Jerusalem until ye be endued with power from on high." What power turned out to be the most potent? Rome has long since been vanquished, but the power released in the lives of the Apostles changed the course of history and laid the foundation of the kingdom which cannot be moved.

In this day our Bible schools have an unprecedented opportunity of serving as the centers of spiritual power, revival blessing, and conservators of "the faith once and for all delivered unto the saints." May God help us to be true to our heritage, faithful to our calling, obedient to our Master, and responsive to the critical need of our generation.


Progress on Debt Liquidation
