Music Series April 28 To May I To Conclude Anniversary Events

Dr. Olaf Christiansen to Participate

A Week of Music, the last of six special weeks during the 50th Anniversary year of the college, will close the jubilee events with an outstanding program announced for Thursday through Sunday, April 28 to May 1.

A major event of the week will be the Music Festival on Sunday at 3:00 p.m., featuring three college choirs. Groups to participate will be the Valparaiso University Choir, Dr. Heinrich Fleischer, conductor; Taylor University A Cappella Choir, directed by Howard Skinner; and the Fort Wayne Bible College A Cappella Choir, Betty Stanley, conductor.

Three prominent leaders in the field of sacred music will come to the campus to participate in the events. Dr. Olaf C. Christiansen, director of the famous St. Olaf Choir and Chairman of the Division of Fine Arts of St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, will direct the choir sessions on Saturday and will be guest conductor for the combined choirs of the Music Festival on Sunday. Dr. Christiansen is also president of the Christiansen Choral School and is one of the nation's leaders in the techniques of choral conducting and performance. He will address choir leaders on Saturday afternoon and will conduct a demonstration choir rehearsal that evening with church choirs of the area participating.

Thursday's speaker will be Don Hustad, Director of the Music Department of Moody Bible Institute, Chicago. Mr. Hustad, well-known as director of the Moody Chorale and the ensemble of the ABC network hymn program "Club Time", will discuss "Spiritual Music for a Spiri-tual Church", "Music for Radio", and "Music in Worship and Evangelism". The latter, an evening pro-gram, will include demonstrations by Mr. Hustad and Ira Gerig of the college music faculty.

The speaker for Friday will be Edward A. Cording, Executive Director of the Conservatory of Music, Wheaton College, Wheaton, Illinois.

THE GOOD OLD DAYS

Vast changes have taken place in the fifty years since Fort Wayne Bible College was established. Since those horse and buggy days, an educational operation has become exceedingly complex. On every front, laws, regulations, ordinances, and controls have multiplied.

Take insurance, for example. Fifty years ago, only fire insurance was carried. Now the college carriers public liability insurance, Workmen's Compensation insurance, boiler insurance, accident insurance, food service insurance, hospitalization insurance, life insurance, etc.

Building furnishes another example. Building regulations were few and a zoning code was non-existent when our college was established. Now an elaborate building code is in effect and for more than 25 years Fort Wayne has had a zoning code. It recognized the right of colleges to develop in all districts. Recently a new zoning code was adopted which has involved the Bible College along with three other colleges of the city in a critical struggle to preserve their essential rights,—entailing litigation, time and effort.

Another area of highly complex problems is that of income and estate taxes. It takes actuarial tables, mathematical formulas, and even algebraic equations to compute some of these taxes.

And, like business operations, colleges have innumerable reports to make out—reports for the United States Office of Education and other government agencies, reports for educational associations, etc.

For times such as these, broad business experience and even legal talent are invaluable on a board of trustees. Administration has come to require specialized training. And, above all, the spiritual emphasis must be kept strong lest the things that pertain to Caesar crowd out the things that pertain to God.

It wouldn't be difficult at times to wish for "the good old days," but the challenge of the present and the future overcome any such feeling. The present in Christian education can be described in the words of the Apostle Paul: "A great door and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries." "In all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us."

School of Music Adds New Courses

Two new programs of study have been added to the School of Music curriculum beginning next school year. They are known as Bachelor of Music Education, a five-year program; and Bachelor of Science in Music Education, a four-year program. Both courses are designed to offer training for students desiring to teach public school music. The recent demand for Christian school teachers has contributed to the planning for these courses.
