At deadline fall enrollment stood at exactly 500. This is almost identical to fall enrollment last year, when 502 attended. Economic conditions and gloomy predictions on students unable to get summer employment led the administration to anticipate a drop in enrollment of perhaps as much as 10 percent as late as August 1.

#### College Receives First Two-Year Accreditation Renewal

The Teacher Training and Licensing Commission of the Indiana State Board of Education has renewed the accreditation of Fort Wayne Bible College as a teacher-training institution for a two-year period.

The Bible College has been continuously accredited since it began the teacher education major in 1955. Over this period the accreditation has always been on an annual basis.

During hearings in the spring the college's teacher education program was placed on temporary probation without prejudice after one of the graduates teaching in Griffith, Indiana allegedly kidnapped and attempted to murder a Chicago boy.

The commission re-examined the college in May. One member of the examining team told Dr. Timothy Warner, dean of the college, that he felt that the quality of the program was uch that it merited the two-year accreditation rather than the usual 1-year accreditation much for this type of institution. The commission unanimously passed this motion on June 15.

Nickel, chalrman of the department of teacher education, states that because of the incident involving one of the teacher-training graduates, he instituted definite procedures into the teacher selection program to insure that repetition of this type of problem will be avoided. According to Dr. Warner, the state examining team felt that the teacher selection program was very adequate and a good approach to the problem.

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

# A Bitter Pill To Swallow

B. JARLD F. GIRIC President

It was a bitter pill to swallow when a leading university professor proclaimed that "the professors were to blame for the revolu-

tion going on in the world today to blame for feeding youth sterilized facts."

The professor's explanation for the whole matter was stated as foi-



lows: 'The truth Dr. Jared F. Garig is, we professors have lost our religion. We professors do not know what to live by. Conditions of the world demonstrate the conditions of the individuals in it. Most of the people in the world were trained by teachers. We, the teachers, are most to blame for our world. If we are most responsible for it, we have failed. Right teaching would not have produced our world."

The professor is right. This modern generation is what it is because of what it has been taught. Educators fall back in retreat when they are forced to explain and reconcile the fact of present world chaos and confusion with their impractical theories and ideals.

The professor is right too when he confesses that he and his colleagues have lost their religion, and that this fact explains much of the inadequacy of modern education to deal with the real issues of life. There is nothing spiritual nor dynamic in modern education to meet human needs or to colve social, national or world problems.

Education becomes vital, applicable and meaningful only as it is integrated with the Christian philosophy of life which deals frankly and honestly with all of mankind's struggles, beartaclies, and problems.

To demonstrate how far removed we are from this high ideal for education, I quote briefly from the "Harrard Report on General Education in a Free Society" of several years ago. "Given the American scene with its varieties

of faith and even unfaith we did not feel just med in proposing religious instruction as a part of the വലാവിന്നു

Elecwhere the same source says boldly, "Whatever one's views, religion is not now for most cola practicable source of intelectual unity." In other words, it is not the sential around which to mold and build our educational structure and program.

It is this removal of the Christian heart and core which leaves our schools and their curricula without ultimate unity and final authority. Modern education is therefore left very much at sea without rudder to guide nor anchor to steady it. The ani revites or the single truth of God and the Bible, His Revelation to man, is gone from education forever. In its rejection, educators have sown to the wind and are reaping the whirlwind.

Modern academic freedom is freedom from all restraints for the teachers and what they teach. The idea of an eternal unchanging God cramps their style. The fact of a Bible which is divine revelation, absolute truth, circumscribes and restricts them. Inductrination is not education and they believe that to ask anyone to subscribe to a creed of any kind is frowned upon.

We can well be grateful for Christian colleges and particularly Bible colleges which without exception and without comprumise keep Christ at the center of their programs. Bible integration of the entire curriculum is also a prime objective.

True Christian education must also be Spirit-energized. The spirit of the learner must meet the spirit of the teacher and the Holy Spirit must impart eternal truth to the one through the other. Deep learning must be accompanied with fervent piety; intellectualism must be warmed by inspiration and devotion. These are the works of the Spirit of God.




