TAYLOR'S 96TH YEAR BEGINS WELL

Editorial

"Something is on the campus these two weeks that doesn't always go with a new school year. It really came out in the open the first Holiness League meeting. The spirit of eager enthusiasm and earnest sincerity was that of a year's beginning, but a depth could be sensed that said this was not a passing fancy that couldn't wear with the months. In all the religious meetings and down across the walks of the campus, through the dormitories and in the work places we have had a new spirit to begin this new year.

"The first chapel program was a thing to impress new students and make old students glad. I can't remember what the program was. I remember that everyone entered the chapel in an attitude of quiet reverence as though this were God's Hour picked out of the day's activities. I can, with great difficulty, sometimes connect God's presence even with machinery. But not very often with noisy machinery. His presence seems to dwell in the Great Quietness of the world and in the Peace of Souls. God walks beside the lightfooted - those whose souls can travel on the stillness of the air. Usually God steps nearest to the earth in the lonely places of His Nature. But the chapel was a hush that invited Him to have a part here because conditions were of the spiritual kind that said 'Welcome' to His visiting. Other chapels have been like these two weeks and the new year is well started.

"President Stuart has expressed his appreciation of the way in which this ninety-sixth year has begun, and I believe the students can voice like sentiments, 'Dr. Stuart, we have liked the fine spirit of interest and cooperation the administration and faculty has made so manifest toward us and our problems and activities this year. Editor of Echo Writes Fine Pastor-Evangelist Leads Fall Enrollment Near Last Year's Despite Unfavorable Times

Taylor in her 96th year bids well to be outstanding. You would have to be on the campus to enjoy the delightful fellowship of staff and students. Total attendance for last year was 322. There is just one dining room table short of the number of tables used the second semester of last year. There are about twenty-five fewer students enrolled now than there were at the same time last year. The senior class of '42 will likely be the largest class in the history of the liberal arts college." The Registrar gave the president a list of sixty-two possible graduates.

There is a blessed spirit prevailing upon the campus and already young people are finding definite experiences with Christ. God is greatly using Dr. Nixon in Taylor's fall revival, now in progress.

President Schwalm of Manchester College Gives Fine Matriculation Day Address

Dr. Schwalm stated that the purpose of a Christian college should be to give the student a higher education on a collegiate level but with Christian ideals.

He stressed the point that at the heart of civilization is Christianity. The only way out for our down-trodden civilization today is the sound of a voice. We must hear that voice to save the world.

Dr. Schwalm continued by giving the tasks and purposes of the Christian college. This type of college should first find the scope in which it is to operate and then stay within that scope.

The Christian college should make a serious effort towards character education. Extra-curricular activities should contribute to the main purpose of the institution, and the ideals of the college should be implicit in the life of the school.



"Dear Dr. Stuart:


