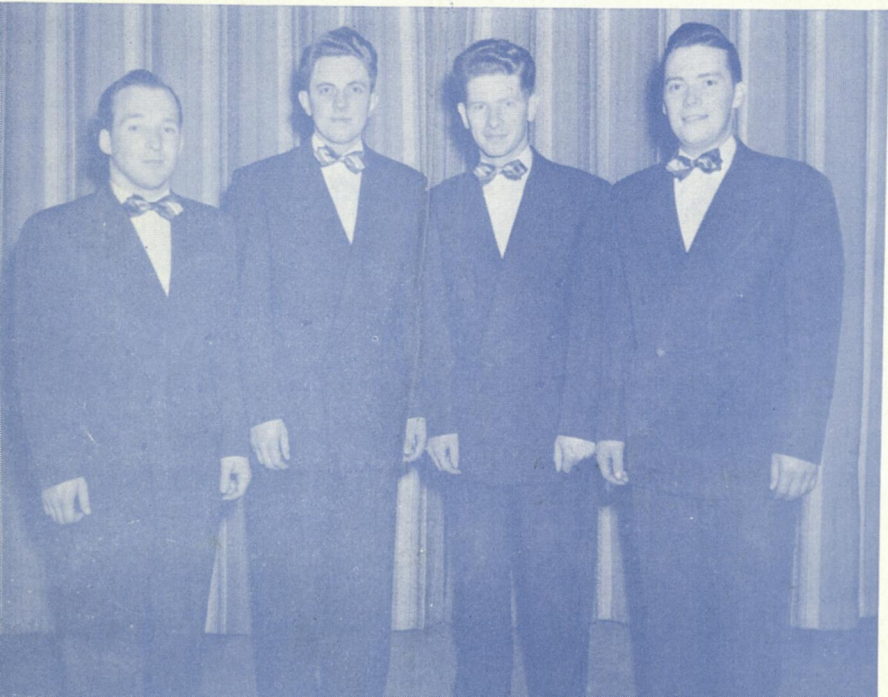

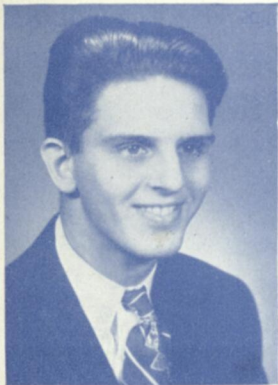

## TAYLOR SERVES THE NATION'S PULPITS

Although Taylor is a fully accredited liberal arts college preparing men and women for a wide range of vocations, almost one half of the students are being trained for some type of Christian service. This includes many who are preparing for the ministry. Over a period of years Taylor men have filled thousands of pulpits of all the major denominations. Taylor has made a great contribution toward the effectiveness of church programs by sending out enthusiastic, spirit-filled workers. Many find churches immediately upon graduation and others attend Taylor as a preparation for graduate work in seminaries. Men often serve as student pastors while working toward their degrees.
