Prof. Oliver E. Steiner


Oliver E. Steiner, director of the School of Music of Fort Wayne Bible College, passed away about 7:00 a.m. on March 8, 1955, at his home in Fort Wayne. He had been convalescing since August of last year when he suffered a heart attack

while spending the summer in Flint, Michigan.

·Mr. Steiner joined the faculty here in 1944. He was director of the A Cappella Choir, and traveled widely on annual concert tours with the group. He was an instructor in voice, music theory, and instruments.

He was well-known in the Fort Wayne area for his outstanding work as conductor of the "Messiah" performances at the college during

the Christmas season each year. His last appearance in this capacity was on December 13, 1953, and it was the eighteenth time he conducted the oratorio during his career. On that occasion, the music critic of a local newspaper attended. In his review,




in Mr. Steiner's conducting.
. . . To him, Handel's 'Messiah,' with its sublime and imperishable beauty, was all-important at the concert—not the man on the podium."

During his ten years with the college, hundreds of students were influenced by his radiant Christian testimony, his consecrated devotion to his God-given ministry, and his keen interest in their spiritual welfare. He likewise occupied an important place in

the hearts of his associates, neighbors, and many friends.

Reflections

Now that the Anniversary Week is past, there is time for a few reflections. It was a memorable event that exceeded expectations in terms of interest and attendance as well as in the number of warm, sincere congratulatory messages received.

But the event was deeply significant. There was a gracious sense of God's presence and blessing throughout. It seemed that God in His graciousness was smiling on those who assembled to join in thanksgiving for all of the blessings of the past. We believe the Lord was pleased when we honored the "faith of our fathers."

One of the little foreseen blessings was the spiritual enrichment that came to all—students and staff—by the presence of a number from the student body of 50 years ago who returned to their Alma Mater for the celebration. They were made a genuine blessing to all of us, and their living example of fidelity and devoted service will long linger as a benediction and a challenge.

The college was honored to have 21 of the 49 living members of the first student body present on "Heritage Day." They came from near and far—Kansas and California, for example. Some who hadn't visited the college for many years came with some understandable questions: Would things be so different that they would be unrecognizable? Would a person 50 years older than the students of 1955 find himself out of gear with the present generation? Is the school still spiritual?

They did find many physical changes. Remarks were also heard about the curricular changes that provide more extensive training. But how about the spiritual character and emphasis of the earlier years? Is that being maintained? We shall let this remark made by several students of 1905 answer that question: "It is just like it used to be." They had spent several days of warm fellowship on the campus. They were present on the day of prayer and were themselves refreshed by the Spirit's working in many lives.

Two servants of God were used to highlight the Anniversary Week with messages that were outstanding for their timeliness, spiritual fervor, and their ringing clarity of the truth as it is in Christ. They were Rev. Jared F. Gerig, President of The Missionary Church Association, and Dr. Thomas Moseley, President of the Missionary Training Institute of Nyack, N. Y.





Week Of Missions March 22 To 25 To Be Fifth In Anniversary Series

Dr. David Johnson, Dr. Eugene Nida Speakers

A Week of Missions, the fifth in the series of Anniversary events during the college's Jubilee year, is scheduled for March 22 to 25.

Two outstanding missions authorities will be featured during the week. They are Dr. David H. Johnson, general director of The Evangelical Alliance Mission, Chicago, and Dr. Eugene A. Nida, secretary of the translations department of the American Bible Society, New York. Rev. O. Carl Brown, chairman of the college's department of missions, is general chairman for the week's program.

Dr. Johnson will speak in morning, afternoon, and evening programs on Tuesday and Wednesday. Among his topics will be "What Constitutes a Call to Missions", "Strategic Open Doors", and "Challenge of the Unfinished Task."

On Thursday and Friday, Dr. Nida will discuss linguistics and language learning, and missionary anthropology. All afternoon sessions will be of a workshop nature. A missionary rally with Dr. Nida in charge will conclude the series on Friday evening. Films will also be shown.
