And God Came!

The Fort Wayne Premier performance of the Christmas Oratorio "And God Came" by our own beloved Dr. Rene Frank, will be performed on Sunday, December 10 at 3 p.m. in Founders Memorial Auditorium. Mr. Richard Elmer, Assistant Professor of Music will direct the F.W.B.C. Oratorio Chorus and Orchestra. The choir will also perform the Oratorio over WANE-TV, Fort Wayne on Thursday, December 14 at 10:30 p.m.

Dr. Frank describes this wonderful witness of our Saviour's love as follows:

"My supreme wish for this work is that it may lead contemporary men toward a more sincere devotion for our Lord Jesus Christ and that it may put before us in a new way the wonder of God coming to redeem us.

"My last several major compositions had dwelt on Christ's atoning work—the cross. Works such as the "Passion Symphony" and "Triptych of Heavenly Love" demanded not only the usual exertion of any kind of creative activity, but the tremendous impact of compassion and identification.

"There were several reasons that directed me to plan for the composition of a Christmas Oratorio, and the opportunity came during my sabbatical leave of absence in the fall of 1958.

"At the shore of placid Lago Maggiore in Switzerland the needed quiet was finally provided for the concentrated effort that resulted in this oratorio. "Its title stresses the connection with the Old Testament. While "in the beginning, God created..," He went even further when He actually came to earth. The wonder of the incarnation then is the central theme, and so John 1:1 suggested itself as the text for an opening chorus.

"As the oratorio "And God Came" is presented, may it not be said of our hearts that "there was no room" for Him!"

Unto Us A Child Is Born

Christmas comes once again and it is a privilege to wish the many friends of Fort Wayne Bible College the highest joys and the richest blessings of this glorious season.

The prophecy of Isaiah, written seven centuries or more before Christ, comes again with freshness to remind us of redemption realities. The heart of Christmas is shut up in these words, "Unto us a child is born." Someone has well said, "This Child was left on everyone's door-step." What a message this is for our day and for this generation of frightened and frustrated people. There is a Saviour! He is Christ the Lord!

What assurance comes to us in the further words of Isaiah, "The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this." All that is involved in the scheme of redemption will come to pass because God has set Himself to accomplish it. His zeal will perform it.

May Christmas mean Christ to you, and may we all with joy anticipate His coming again.

Six from Faculty Attend ICHE

Six members of the administration of F.W.B.C. attended the Indiana Conference of Higher Education at Purdue University, Nov. 8-10. This was a joint conference of the following groups: Indiana College Public Relations Association, Indiana Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, Indiana College and University Business Officers, Indiana Student Personnel Association, and the Student Health Association.

Attending were Dr. Gerig, Dr. Byrne, Mr. Eicher, Mr. Harter, Mr. Welty and Mr. Hoatson.

Enrollment Up

Enrollment at F.W.B.C. set a new record for the second year in a row. There are 379 students enrolled, up 4.7 per cent from last fall's record of 362 students. In addition, 15 are in nurses training as part of the missionary nursing program. Most of these are enrolled at Lutheran Hospital School of Nursing in Fort Wayne.

There are 301 full time students and 78 part-time students. Of these, 157

are men and 222 are women.

Of 154 new students entering this fall, 21 are transfer students from other colleges and 117 are freshmen, making the freshman class the largest in B.C. history.

Students have come from 25 states, Canada, Honduras, and Jamaica. There are 29 denominations represented: 126 are M.C.A., 54 Baptist, 31 C. and M.A., 22 Methodist, 15 Christian Union, and 10 each are Evangelical Mennonite, Mennonite

and Nazarene.

A marked upward trend is shown in enrollment in four fields. The Bible and Theology department shows a 24.4 per cent gain, the Missions department had a 13.3 per cent gain, the Christian Education department increased 24 per cent and the Elementary Education department is up 5.6 per cent. Within department there is a noticeable trend toward the longer and stronger courses. For example, more students are choosing the 5-year Bachelor of Theology program and the Pastoral Training program. In missions there is more desire for the B.S. program than the B.A. program.

The increase in enrollment has necessitated using one of the faculty apartments for a women's dorm, and moving many upperclass men and women off campus into nearby private homes. Additional classroom space was necessary, and the First Missionary Church came to the rescue with permission to use classrooms in their educational unit and the sanctuary itself for Oratorio Chorus rehearsals. This increase in enrollment points up the growing need for an expansion in facilities envisioned on South Campus. With the addition of the Administration Building we would have new classrooms available and more dormitory space for women on the first floor of Bethany Hall where administration offices are now located.

Band Concert & Recital

The Fort Wayne Bible College Band under the direction of Robert Myers, Instructor in Music, will give a concert on Friday, January 5 at 7:30 p.m. in Founders Memorial Auditorium. Also, selected student musical artists will present recitals at this concert which is open to the public without charge.

A Scholarship PLUS

The Crowell-Collier Publishing Company awarded a \$1,000 scholarship to James Huff, sophomore transfer student from Hamilton, Ohio. Mr. Frank Johnson of Colliers awarded the scholarship on Nov. 8 and then turned right around and awarded a \$1,000 matching grant to the President of the college.

James Huff was awarded the scholarship after spending the summer working with Colliers Encyclopedia college summer sales program. It was one of 14 such scholarship-grants awarded this year. Huff had the highest number of sales in

his region.

"I can certainly praise the Lord for what He has done this past summer, and say with Paul 'I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." "Huff says he would not be able to attend F.W.B.C. without this scholarship. He is a pastoral training major, preparing for youth work such as with Youth For Christ.

Year's Budget is \$1/3 Million

The Governing Board has approved a current operating expense budget estimated at \$360,686 for the 1961-62 fiscal year. This is over \$16,000 more than actually spent in the fiscal year 1960-61. Of last year's actual budget less than 11 per cent came from sources other than fees. This is very low compared with other private church-related colleges which have about 35 per cent of their current expenses met through outside sources.

In order to maintain and improve the quality of education at F.W.B.C. in the face of rising enrollment, many new contributors are sought. The Living Endowment Program has been designed to help meet

these current expenses.
