The Xerox Corporation has donated two sets of books to the Fort Wayne Bible College library with a combined value of \$1,600.

"The March of America" is a basic library of 100 significant books for the study of the New World. It begins with the 1493 letter of Columbus which was the published account of land beyond the ocean sea and continues

## We're #

The Fort Wayne Falcons chalked up a record season and earned a berth in the National Christian College Athletic Association tournament by taking first place in the North Central Christian Athletic Conference.

The Falcons shattered 13 team records and eclipsed nine individual marks. Six more season records were on the line as the hardboard five headed toward Bethel for regional title and then to Chattanooga, Tennessee on March 11-13 for a bid at the national crown.

**BULLETIN** — The Falcons beat Bethel 85-71 on March 2, clinching a berth in the NCCAA tournament March 11-13 in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

Ending the regular season tied for first place in the western division of the conference, the Falcons downed Detroit Bible College 77-70 in the opening game of the NCCAC tourney at Owosso, Michigan. Then in the final game of the two day series, they played cat-and-mouse with Michigan Christian College and ended regulation time tied 69-69. In overtime, the Falcons took the lead by two points, and with 15 seconds to go were again tied. Then Tim Erdel swished a 15 foot jump shot to score the winning basket and end the game 75-73.

Here are new single game records set: Points scored — 131, points scored in one half — 71, field goals attempted — 102, field goals — 53, field goal percentage — 74.1%, rebounds — 89, assists — 43, lowest score by opponent in one half — 20.

New season records set are: Assists — 445, rebounds — 1281, most games won — 18, fewest games lost — 7, winning streak — 9.

Individual records set by Tim Erdel for field goals — 51; to Erdel for rebounds — 12; and to Doug Masopust for field goal percentage — 74.1%.

Masopust set a new individual record for



bounds and a career record by getting a total of 838 rebounds. Erdel also earned a career record — 187 assists.

Strubhar, a freshman, erased the season scoring barrier set by

Mickey Mills five years ago by earning 585 points. He has averaged a whopping 23.4 points per game! Strubhar could top one more record by adding only 5 more field goals to his total of 229.

Tim Erdel, a sophomore, could grab a record with 14 more assists, and the post-season NCCAA tourney should provide him with that opportunity.

The Falcons also have a good chance at establishing a new defensive average record. Falcon opponents are averaging 71 points per game, five points shy of the limit the Falcons allowed previously. If

## A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

# Bible Colleges — The Hope of the Church

Two well-known evangelical leaders who travel widely have recently made statements to the effect that Bible colleges are the hope of the church in the immediate future.

A few years ago the president of a leading evangelical seminary said in my hearing that, although it should not be so, the primary source of missionaries in this decade would be the Bible colleges.

These statements are not made to attack other types of institutions, but simply to state what seems to be a fact of life in our day. Another church leader said that his denomination is in the process of founding its fourth wave of Bible colleges to train their church leaders. A sister denomination has recently begun a new Bible college and its leaders are amazed at the enthusiastic response by students and churches.

What features of Bible colleges put them in this position? One is clarity of objective. They exist to prepare young men and women for vocational Christian service. Faculty, staff, and students are chosen in the light of this purpose. Courses are taught with this in mind. The temptation to try to become all things to all men is avoided.

The Bible college is openly and unashamedly evangelical in its commitments. It does not feel obliged to impress the intellectual world with its relativism. It is not

embarrassed to acknowledge that there is such a thing as revealed truth and that this truth provides answers to the basic human problems.

Truth, however, is not something to be talked about but something to be lived out in life, and the Bible college balances the theoretical and the practical.

Many colleges are saying that what the students do in their private lives is no concern of the school. The Bible college says that the whole man is its concern. We exist to help our students find God's answers to life's problems and then to equip them to do the same for others. The world is still looking for such Christian servants.

The Bible college makes certain that its students acquire actual experience in doing the job as well as pursuing the academic side of it. Academics are given their proper place, but study and experience are kept in balance.

Finally, Bible colleges are the hope of the future for the church because we are seeing a rise of the evangelical church to a place of leadership. There is a new confidence in the Gospel as the answer to human needs. This Gospel may not always be in the same garb as in the past, but the saving message of Christ is being presented without apology and is changing lives.

Fort Wayne Bible College is committed to this forward look of the church, and we rededicate ourselves to the high calling of preparing leaders for the evangelical awakening in our day.

## Test Scoring Computer Given



A small, sophisticated but disarmingly simple test-scoring computer valued at \$2,195 has been donated to the college by Mr. H. Keith Sidebottom, president of Business Communications Corporation, Fort Wayne.

Known as the Datronics 400, this optical test-scoring machine has but two switches. One turns on the power. The other you switch first to program the computer and then to score the tests.

To program the computer a teacher simply marks an answer sheet with the correct answer, filling in the rectangular block. The computer then "memorizes" the correct answers to each of 20 true/false or four-choice multiple choice questions. This takes just one second.

Tests are then fed through the computer and, in only one second, each wrong answer is marked and the score is imprinted on the test or answer sheet.

One value of the Datronics scorer is its small size. It can be taken into the classroom and students may have an immediate scoring on their examinations. This will enable them to re-inforce correct answers. While the computer is still programmed, the student may be permitted to then erase wrong answers and correct them, or make a second choice. This is then fed back through the computer for a re-scoring.

The computer uses sophisticated fiber optics and photo transistors and the most advanced space-age integrated circuitry. It will become an effective tool to benefit both teachers and students. The college is grateful to Mr. Sidebottom for this fine and useful gift.

## Little Chosen Commencement Speaker

Mr. Paul E. Little, assistant to the president of Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship and Associate Professor of Evangelism at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, Deerfield, Illinois has been chosen to address the graduating class at commencement. The public is welcome. The commencement program begins at 10:30 a.m., Monday, May 31 in Founders Auditorium.

Mr. Little says his topic will be "The Effective Christian in this Generation."

Mr. Little was director of the IVCF Urbana Conference at the University of Illinois during the Christmas vacation period. He is a well-known campus speaker and author.

A graduate of the Wharton School of Finance of the University of Pennsylvania, Mr. Little holds the M.A. degree in Biblical literature from Wheaton College, has done graduate work at Chicago Lutheran Seminary and is a candidate for the Ph.D. degree in religious education at New York University.

## "Required" is a Hang-Up Word

"Christian service is required at Fort Wayne Bible College!" **Required** is a hang-up word to some people. And yet when you consider the implications, should it be a hang-up?

Who would give consent for an operation by a surgeon who hadn't first spent a period of **required** internship in surgery? Who would allow his child to be taught by teachers who hadn't completed the **required** supervised student teaching? And would you want your child's eternal welfare left in the hands of someone who had never been **required** to serve an "internship" in some form of Christian work?

The answers to these questions seem obvious. It is for these reasons the Christian Service Department at Fort Wayne Bible College not only requires Christian service, but conducts an in-depth observation and evaluation program to help students become well-prepared Christian leaders, more skillful and effective. The program is similar to the supervised student teaching program required for certification as a public school teacher. Under the supervision of the Christian Service Director, qualified staff members and senior Christian education majors serve as observers.

A primary objective of the program is to observe, evaluate and counsel all sophomores and juniors within the school year. However, this does not necessarily exclude other students. After the proper notifications and arrangements have

been made, the observer is sent to be with the student for a three-to-five week period.

The observer considers the audience to whom the student is communicating, the physical setting for the learning experience as well as the student's appearance, his preparation, presentation, and genuine concern for individuals in his audience. He investigates to be sure that the student is cooperative with co-workers and superiors.

He notes areas that can be improved such as gaining audience participation, handling discipline problems, speaking on the proper age level and accomplishing a specific aim. During the following week the observer meets with the student in an evaluation and counseling session, sharing strengths, weaknesses and ways of making his Christian service more meaningful to the audience and more rewarding to the student himself.

Student reaction to this program has been very positive. "He pointed out things that I was doing that I hadn't even realized." "Without his help and encouragement, I'm afraid I might have become discouraged," said one.

All Bible colleges require Christian service. That is one of the distinctives of Bible College education. Fort Wayne's five-man Christian Service Department gives such individual attention to each student's Christian service program and spiritual growth that FWBC has become known as "the Bible College of Distinction."

## Future Enrollment Prospects

A report to Dr. Warner from the Office of Admissions for January shows a pronounced increase in applications. Though enrollment was down slightly last fall, prospects for the coming year are encouraging. Over 14.8 percent more applications have been approved than at the same time last year. In addition 7.5 percent more applications are pending than were at this time last year.

Mr. Charles E. Belknap, Director of Admissions, says that applications are still being accepted for

fall enrollment. He points out that the Bible College uses a "rolling admissions" policy, meaning that as soon as an applicant's forms and recommendations are received the admissions committee will consider the application and notify the student of their decision immediately.

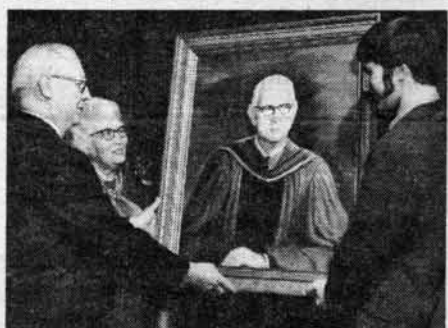

## Slightly Overdue

Recently a graduate of the college who insists on remaining anonymous was cleaning out his library and found a Fort Wayne Bible College library book. Horrified, mortified, embarrassed, he promptly returned it.

Your Vision editor decided to have a little fun with the item and therefore wrote the alumnus the following letter. The name has been changed only to protect the guilty!

Dear Mr. Burghle,

Thank you for the return of the overdue library book, *Parliamentary Law* by Roberts. We are returning it to the select list of books used by the department of communications.

According to our calculations, this book is now overdue by 3,537 days. Since the fine for overdue books is .03 per day, the fine would normally be \$107.91. However, in this case an interest penalty of 1½% per month has been added after the first 60 days overdue bringing your total bill to \$248,738.

For 40 years, a \$1.4 million Student Union will be named in your honor.

And finally, if you choose to help in a significant way, keep the book for 50 more years and a brand new \$3.9-million campus named the Burghle-Parliamentary Law University will be founded in your honor.

## Serving God Through Youth For Christ

Ron Yount, 67, wrote a fine letter some time ago. We thought you might like to share it.

I recently attended the Mid-winter Convention for Youth For Christ in Atlanta and was amazed to count the number of full-time YFC men and women who are graduates of Fort Wayne Bible College. In conversation with them we decided that Fort Wayne was supplying more YFC personnel than any other Bible College that we are acquainted with. I sure was proud to be part of that group.

My wife and I have been here in Birmingham since June, 1969 and have had a ministry with teens like we've never experienced before. We started one club with 18 teens and only one of them was a Christian.

We now have approximately 70 teens meeting weekly and over half of them made a decision for Christ. And the important thing is that of those 30-plus decisions, most were counseled by teenagers who haven't been Christians more than three months.

God has really gotten a firm hold on some teens' lives and they are "doin' what comes naturally" and we are seeing teens and parents turning their lives over to Christ.

We have also gotten into the drug problem in some detail, meeting three and four times a week with teens who are experimenting with drugs and some who are really hooked on them. We have been given a great challenge and have seen God move three teens off the drugs just this past week.

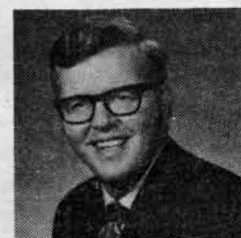

## Summer School Schedule Set

Students wishing to accelerate their program or get an early start in college will find the summer school schedule below of interest. An intersession and two summer terms will allow students to earn up to 13 hours of college credit.

Intersession is a seven day concentrated schedule allowing you to earn up to three hours of credit. Intersession is June 1-8, and includes Saturday, June 5.

It was such a well-constructed list to determine the spiritual quality of a college we publish it below for prospective students.

1. Does the college have required Bible courses?
2. Are the students required to make a profession of being born again?
3. Is a student's testimony a factor in whether or not he is accepted?
4. Is the faculty required to make a profession of being born again?
5. Is there a varied and regular Christian service program?
6. Is attendance at chapel and church mandatory?
7. How often are chapel services held?
8. Do the students hold prayer groups and Bible study groups on their own without being required to do so?
9. How many of the graduates continue in full-time Christian work?

Perhaps you have other questions you would like to share with prospects. We would be happy to receive yours.

In case you do not already know the answers to the above, here they are.

1. Fort Wayne Bible College requires 30 hours of Bible and theology for all graduates.
2. and 3. The application blank asks a prospect if he considers himself "a definitely saved individual" and on what ground he bases his salvation.
4. All regular faculty and staff members are born again and sign a doctrinal statement annually. (Copies will be mailed upon request.)
5. All students, for at least 6 of their 8 semesters, participate in Christian service.
6. and 7. All full-time students are required to attend chapel daily, five days a week. All fill out weekly reports telling what church services they attended.
8. Students who are looking forward to service for Christ naturally take the initiative to start Bible studies and prayer groups.
9. The majority of Fort Wayne Bible College graduates go into full-time Christian service or are married to those in such work.
