Faculty Appointments Named for Fall Term

Three new appointments to the faculty of the college for next school year have been announced by the Governing Board.

Dr. Herbert W. Byrne has been named Chairman of the Department of Education. He will come to the college from his present position as director of the Department of Christian Education of Western Evangelical Seminary, Portland, Oregon. He is a graduate of Asbury College, Asbury Theological Seminary, Western Illinois State College, and has the doctor of education degree from Bradley University. Until 1952, he had been a pastor for eleven years.

Rev. Don J. Kenyon will become assistant professor of Greek and Bible. Mr. Kenyon is presently pastor of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in Windsor, Ontario, and an instructor at Detroit Bible Institute. He attended Taylor University and Southern Baptist Seminary, is a graduate of Asbury College, and has the bachelor of divinity degree from Bethel Seminary. He has also taught at St. Paul Bible Institute and the Missionary Training Institute.

Mr. Lansing W. Bulgin has been appointed to succeed the late Prof. Oliver Steiner as an instructor in

The Lord's Day

Editor's note: The following article was prepared by Dr. Witmer at the request of the Protestant churches of Fort Wayne as the first in a series designed to point up a campaign to keep the Lord's Day holy. The emphasis, launched on Sunday, April 24, is being jointly promoted by three Fort Wayne groups—The Associated Churches, the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, and the Evangelical Ministers' Fellowship. It is reprinted here as a reminder for all of us.

In our community, we Christians are becoming aware that something is happening to the venerable institution of the Lord's Day. The day which has always been regarded as different is losing its dignity and sacredness. Sunday is becoming like other days, given to shopping, working and pleasure.

We don't want Sunday to become just another day. We feel that something fine and good would go out of life if Sunday were to become like Monday and Saturday. It would be like seeing the little church by the side of the road made into a store or a barn.

But our reaction must be more than sentimental. It is time for us Christians to think deeply about this institution of the Lord's day.

We can begin with an examination of our own attitudes. What has happened to us that we are so casually permitting Sunday to become secularized? Why is it that we have so little conscience about buying and selling on the Lord's day? Is Sunday becoming secularized because we have permitted our hearts to become secularized?

Our reflections will lead us to take a fresh look at the Lord's day: It originated with God Himself, "who blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it." It was designed to meet a basic human need by providing time for the cultivation of the spiritual life. It should be used to glorify God. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ and points to life eternal.

Let us, as Christians, hallow the Lord's day and not secularize it by buying or selling unnecessarily upon Sunday.

Bulgin, evangelists of Long Beach, Calif., will teach voice and theory and is a choral conductor. He is a graduate of Linfield College (Oregon) and has the master of music degree from Indiana University. He has completed the residence requirements for the Ph.D. in music at Indiana University and is presently working on his dissertation. He has taught at George Fox College, Newberg, Oregon, and at Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho. Rene Frank, now acting director of the School of Music, will be on leave of absence at Indiana University next year to complete his doctoral studies in music composition.

O. Carl Brown, chairman of the department of missions, will terminate his teaching duties with the college this spring to leave soon for missionary service in Pignon, Haiti. He will direct the educational program of the Missionary Church Association there.

New Music Courses To Train Students For Teaching Jobs

In response to the desires of former and present music students, Fort Wayne Bible College has completed plans for two music education courses which will prepare students for teaching in public schools. The courses, to be in effect next year. are Bachelor of Science in music education (4 years) and Bachelor of Music Education (5 years).

While these courses uphold the spiritual objectives of the college, each one containing thirty hours of Bible and theology, they also fulfill the requirements of many states for choral and band directors in public schools. The music supervisor of the public schools in Fort Wayne has approved practice teaching in the city schools for students in these courses. Acceptance of the program by the Indiana State Board of Education is being sought. Job opportunities are plentiful, and already some twelve presently enrolled students have expressed their desire to take one of these courses.
