Dear Friend:

And I have somehow felt the friendly touch as we have seen each other in passing. I have appreciated your warm spirit and contact with you.

REUNION With the Alumni at Houghton, New York, at the National Holiness Convention

Samuel Morris

The Samuel Morris booklet is still going out by the thousands, blessing lives everywhere. There lies on our desk now a copy that has been printed in the Korean language. Rev. S. M. Choi, of the Oriental Missionary Society, came on the campus, saw Sam-uel Morris Memorial Hall, then went to the grave of Samuel Morris and took along a copy of his life story. He was so profoundly impressed with it that he felt it must be put into the Korean language and put into circulation to the people over there.

From the Heart of Africa

One bleak January morning in 1885 the first party of Bishop William Taylor missionaries left New York harbor. Among that group of over forty men, women, and children was twelve year old Herbert C. Withey. On February 9, 1937, more than fifty-two years later, Mr. Withey, the last of the Bishop Taylor missionaries in Angola, Africa, peacefully went to his Heavenly reward. The

following day he was laid to rest in the Quessua cemetery close to the mound which marks the grave of Susan Talbott Wengatz (Mrs. John C. Wengatz).

Two weeks before the death of Mr. Withey, Mrs. Dodge and I had the rare privilege of spending a Sunday with him in Malange where he was translating the Old Testament into the tribal vernacular, Kimbundu, and also preaching on Sundays to the large Malange congregation. That afternoon we sat at his feet as he told us of the hardships and joys of the early years; of his relationship with Bishop Taylor; of God's blessing upon His work in Africa. It was a blessed day. We drank deeply from Mr. Withey's well of rich experience and spiritual power. That night we prayed that God would spare him until he had completed the work he alone was prepared to do, but God, in His wisdom, had other plans.

Since that intensely hot March day in 1885 when the first Taylor missionaries landed in Luanda, Taylor University has had a special interest in the Angolan mission field. She has given of her favorite children, Oliver M. and Talbott Moody Susan Wengatz, and God has accepted of her sacrificial gift for the salvation of His children of a darker hue; her graduates have given of their substances and God has sanctified the gifts and with them has extended the borders within which His name is praised; she has labored in prayer and thus her representatives in Angola have been strengthened with Heavenly wis-

dom and power.

Mrs. Dodge and I, as the only T. U. graduates on the Angolan mission field, the place of such vital associations to all Taylor students, ask a continued interest in your prayers. The task is tremendous, the climate is trying, the needs are appalling, but God is very near and precious to us and will supply that which is necessary for those he has called into his work. Pray for us.
