Commencement Speaker

Dr. Hudson T. Armerding, fifth president of Wheaton College will speak at commencement, Monday, May 28 in Founders Chapel. His topic will be "Stewardship of the Truth."

Dr. Armerding graduated cum laude from Wheaton with a major in History. He earned the masters degree in international affairs at Clark University and holds the Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago. He has also done graduate work at Harvard University.

Dr. Armerding served as Commander of the Naval Reserve Officer's School in Forest Park, Illinois and has been director of the North Conway Institute which promotes research and study of alcoholism.

He was dean and acting president of Gordon College where he also taught history. In 1961 he returned to Wheaton as professor of history. In 1963 he was elected provost of the college, serving in that capacity until his inauguration as president in 1965.

Dr. Robert J. Hughes, III, assistant professor of science at Fort Wayne Bible College has been selected by the graduating class to deliver the Baccalaureate sermon on Sunday, May 28, at 3 p.m. in Founders Auditorium.

Dr. Hughes has announced that his topic will be, "The Goal of Goals."

Dr. Hughes earned the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine Degree at Texas Agricultural and Mechanical University. He graduated from Moody Bible Institute and earned the Bachelor of Divinity degree and Master of Theology degree at Fuller Theological Seminary. He has also pursued graduate study at Wichita State University and Talbot College.

Dr. Hughes practiced Veterinary medicine and served as a veterinary meat inspector for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. He taught at Kansas City Bible College where he also served as acting dean and registrar. He was appointed superintendent of Berean Academy and left that school in 1965 to accept the appointment to the faculty of Fort Wayne Bible College.

It has been good because of a dedicated faculty and staff. In an effort to effect budget economies, the number of faculty and staff was reduced significantly, but those who remain have taken up the slack gladly and in some instances carried a double load.

It has been good because an increasing number of concerned Christians have demonstrated their support through faithful prayer and stewardship. A developing sense of partnership with churches and individuals has been a source of genuine encouragement.

And next year will be better as together we express our discipleship and stewardship more maturely!

Fort Wayne Bible "University"?

The term "university" comes from two Latin words meaning "one truth." A university, therefore, was an educational institution with the curriculum oriented to a central core of accepted truth. In our country that "one truth" was almost always the Christian revelation. This was true not only with private schools but also with public institutions. Only in the latter case the school was neutral in relation to the various denominational interpretations of that truth.

As our society has become more secular in its orientation, however, the idea of neutrality has been applied not to the various approaches to the belief in God, but to whether there is a God. Or, perhaps more accurately, educational institutions have professed to be neutral on the whole subject of religion. They supposedly do not take a position for it or against it. But that is hardly possible.

As Jesus put it, "He that is not with me is

against me." Matthew 12:30

To educate without reference to God is to say that God is unimportant and irrelevant to life... that one can be an educated person without reference to God.

Fort Wayne Bible College takes its stand unapologetically as a "one truth" institution and in that sense we are a university. It is clear to us that a man who is created in the image of God can never be a whole person nor a truly educated person until he has a vital relationship with his Creator.

It is our goal, therefore, not only to provide an academically sound education for our students, but also to help them integrate their personal lives and the knowledge they acquire around the "one truth" of God's revelation in the Scriptures.

The end we seek is whole men proclaiming the whole Gospel to the whole world.

College Calendar Changes

A change in the college calendar will benefit students next year. The change came after detailed study by faculty and administration of a number of alternatives.

The Bible College will retain the semester system with first semester registration starting on August 31. New students begin orientation on August 29.

This early start will enable students to finish the semester on Friday, December 22. They will have Christmas vacation free of term papers and pressures of upcoming final exams. They will have two full weeks to relax and be refreshed, or to serve the Lord in such mid-winter missionary service as Operation Outreach into Mexico.

Second semester registration begins on Tuesday, January 9, 1973.

Commencement then moves up to May 6, with students able to get a running start on the good summer positions to help earn their next year's tuition. A short-term summer session may also be offered during the month of May for those

interested in accelerating their program. They will still be free by the first of June for summer employment or summer short-term missionary service abroad.

Approved Applications Up

Mr. Charles E. Belknap, Director of Admissions, reports that as of May 1, approved applications were up 10.3 per cent over a year ago.

Mr. Belknap also states that applications by those interested in the Bachelor of Science program in elementary education are running almost double a year ago. Pastoral ministries and pre-seminary studies are also showing good increases.

Applications are still being accepted for the fall. The application form is included in the back of the college catalog. Those interested in receiving a free catalog should write immediately to Mr. Belknap.

Lawanda Windom is a junior at the college studying toward the Bachelor of Science degree in elementary education. She is a very winsome girl whose effervescence is contagious. This is her testimony as given at the Curdes Avenue Missionary Church, Fort Wayne.

"Recently I was asked by my minister to go into Christian education. He wants me to be the Christian education director at my church.

We have between 800-900 members of our church and I'm the only one except the minister who has ever gone to Bible College. Everybody goes to one of the big universities. Of course there's nothing wrong with that, but I'm convinced that a Christian should look forward to and at least desire to go to a Bible college where they can learn more about God's Word because we are living in an educated world and people have questions.

We are being confronted on one side by the Black Muslims who are saying, "Well, Christianity is just a white man's religion." And on the liberal side they are saying, "You know, God died a long time ago." If we're not educated we aren't



going to know how to answer these people.

When I was in high school I thought I'd like to be a secretary. I thought I'd buy a car and a lot of clothes and just "go about and do my own thing." But we had a group from Fort Wayne Bible College come to our church and invite us to join them.

I went to Youth Conference in my junior year in high school. The theme that year was "Life with Dimension." This really puzzled me because I realized that I didn't have this "life with dimension." So, on Saturday night I told God, "Take me and use me in whatever capacity you see fit."

Since I love children I decided I would be an elementary school teacher. Now my minister has asked me to be the Christian education director, so I've decided to stay at the Bible College a little longer and get a second major in Christian education.

Within the black church we really do need a lot more Christian education.

At Fort Wayne Bible College I have grown to appreciate God's Word. When you sit under professors like Dr. Wes Gerig and learn that the Bible is the infallible, inerrant Word of God, it is really a blessing. We know that these men of God know what they're talking about and they know that they know.

I have grown to love people. I don't think I had ever loved people before coming here.

I've grown to have a fellowship with students. It's not a front. They aren't saying, "You're black, but because you're here we'd better put up with you or we won't make it through the party games." It's a genuine love. It's a love that goes deeper than color.

When a person is born again, regardless of race or color then we are soul brothers and soul sisters. I just praise God for this!"

The Women's Auxiliary of Fort Wayne Bible College awarded two \$100 scholarships at their spring meeting Tuesday, April 11.

Receiving the scholarships are Susan Ursini of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, and Kevin Eady of Akron, Ohio.

Costs Increase Modestly

A modest 5.7 percent increase in costs for the coming academic year was necessitated by increasing costs of goods and service to the college.

Since costs for the 1971-72 school year increased only \$10, the increase next fall of \$114 represents only a 3.1 percent increase per year for the past two years, far below the average increase.

Costs remain an educational bargain at Fort Wayne Bible College. Compared with five other Christian colleges in Indiana our total cost is \$493 per year less than the average and \$302 less than the least expensive of the five.

For students who will find it difficult to meet expenses, the college has financial aids and work opportunities available to help meet a substantial part of your college costs. For further information write to the Office of Admissions and ask for the financial aids brochure.

Music Professor Named



Dr. James P. Loomis of Wheaton, Illinois has been appointed assistant professor of music at Fort Wayne Bible College beginning next fall.

Born in Bowling Green, Ohio, Dr. Loomis earned the Bachelor of Science in music at Bowling Green State University and did graduate work in education at that institution. He then earned both the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees at the University of Michigan.

Assisting him will be Miss Joan Mayers, Miss Mayers has been women's counselor and instructor in psychology at Fort Wayne Bible College since 1964.

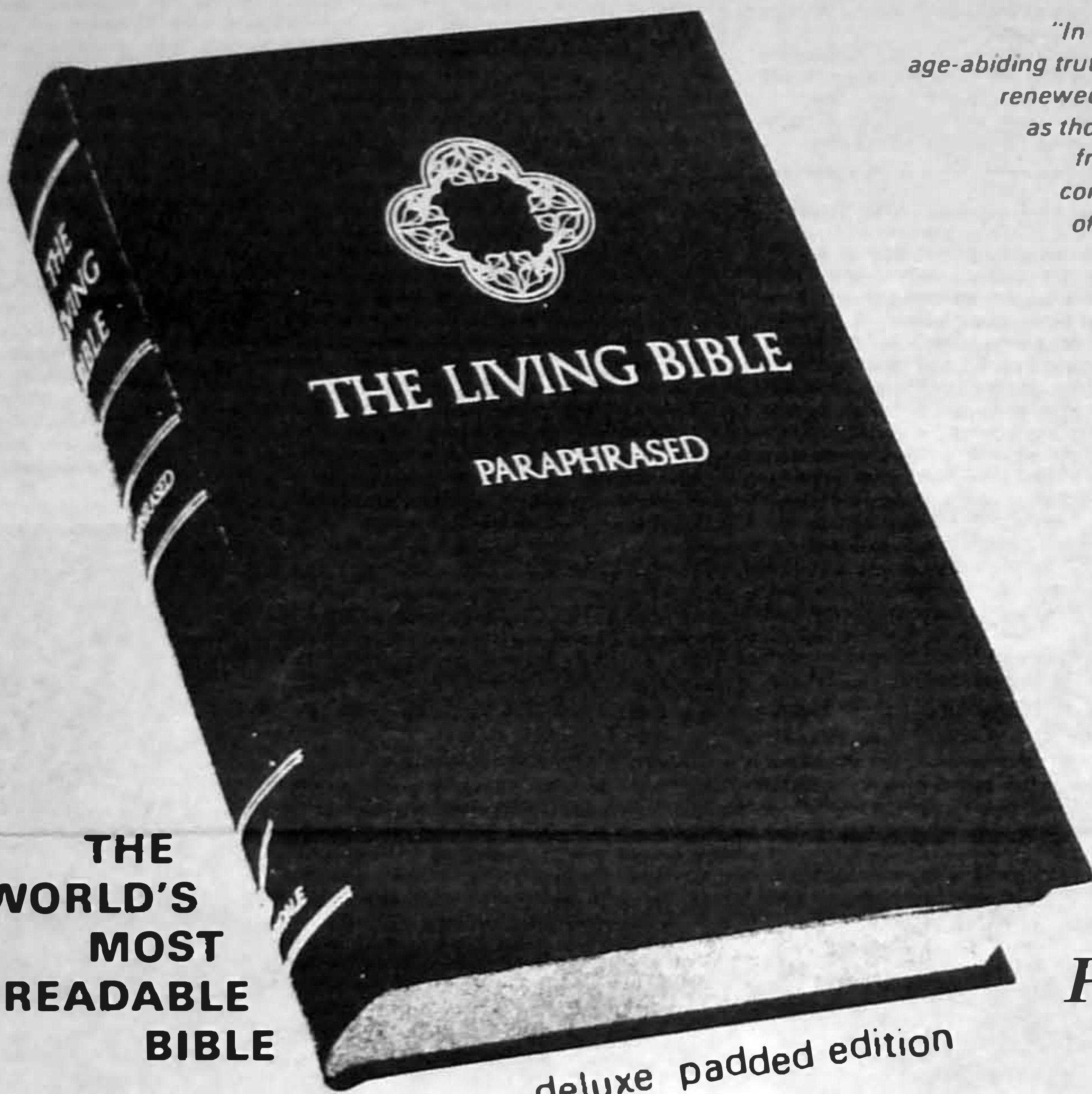

Two Bible College Players Selected for Venture For Victory Tour

Two basketball stars in the Fort Wayne Bible College Falcons team have been selected to the Venture for Victory Basketball Team touring Indonesia, Hong Kong, the Philippines and Hawaii this summer.

Bruce Masopust, a senior from Cicero, Illinois and Bob Kirby, a junior from Flint, Michigan, will play between 45 and 50 games during a whirlwind, 33-day tour of the South Pacific under Sports Ambassadors of Palo Alto, California. They leave on July 17 and return on August 22.

During the tour they will sometimes play two or three games a day against local teams. Their courts will vary from professional hardboard arenas to outdoor dirt courts with non-standard court lengths

and marking. The heat may rise to 120 degrees in some areas.

During the half-time while their opponents rest and get ready for the second half, the Venture for Victory team will be conducting services to share their Christian faith. This will be the fundamental purpose for the tour.

On one summer tour over 300,000 attended the games and heard the message of the Gospel and more than 10,000 enrolled in a non-sectarian Bible Correspondence course.

Coach Steve Morley was proud to nominate Masopust and Kirby for the Venture for Victory team since he participated in a similar tour while he was a student at Fort Wayne Bible College.

Each of the players has to enlist the support of interested individuals to raise \$1625 for his expenses. This must be raised by June 17.

Masopust, captain of the Fort Wayne Bible College Falcons, is graduating on May 29 with the Bachelor of Science degree in Christian Education. He is a

graduate of Morton East High School, Cicero, Illinois and transferred to the Bible College from Morton Junior College in Cicero. He is a member of Warren Park Presbyterian Church.

In 1969-70 and 1971-72 he was named to the Fort Wayne News-Sentinel all-city first string basketball team. In 1970-71 he was named to the all-city second squad.

In 1969-70 he was named to the North Central Christian Athletic Conference (NCCAC) second team. In both 1970-71 and 71-72 he was named to NCCAC first team and this year to the NCCAC all-tourney team.

Masopust has been sports editor of the "Student Voice," the Bible College newspaper, and is vice-president in charge of spiritual life at the local campus. He has assisted in children's church and been Lifeline baseball coach for Fort Wayne Area Youth For Christ. He also is a student advisor in the men's dormitory.

Masopust's statistical record includes a career average of 18.8 points per game,

16.3 rebounds per game and a 51.3 percent field goal percentage. During the current season he has a 60.0 percent field goal average. His game highs include 33 points, 30 rebounds and 12 assists. He has scored over 30 points in five games, over 20 points in 22 games and has had over 30 rebounds in four games. Masopust never played varsity basketball before going to Fort Wayne Bible College.

Masopust was selected for inclusion in "Outstanding College Athletes of America" for 1971.

Bob Kirby is a junior studying toward the Bachelor of Science degree in pastoral ministry at Fort Wayne Bible College.

Kirby has been voted to the Bethel Invitational all-tourney team in 1969-70, and the NCCAC all-tourney team in 1969-70.

The Fort Wayne News-Sentinel named him to the all-city second team during both 1969-70 and 1971-72.

Kirby's 71-72 statistics include a 57.6 percent field goal average, an average of 14.8 points per game and an average of 10.0 rebounds per game. His career statistics show him scoring over 20 points in 20 games. His college career highs include 33 and 31 points. His high school career high game found him winning 32 points.

Kirby is president-elect of the Student Missionary Fellowship at the Bible College. He is presently serving as prayer chairman for that organization. He is also chaplain of the junior class and a counselor of men. "Students just naturally come to Kirby for counsel," says Dean Willard Rowell.

Last summer Kirby served as a missionary in the Dominican Republic under World Gospel Crusades.

During the three years he has been at Fort Wayne Bible College he served as coach for the "Teen Olympics" program of Van Wert Area Youth for Christ and has served as Campus Life club director there.

Kirby and Masopust shared honors as co-most valuable players at the Falcon Invitational Tourney, 1971-72.

Falcons Receive NAIA Top Ratings



The Falcons basketball team captured two first-place positions in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) final statistical report for the 1971-72 season. No other college, nationwide among the 559 colleges and universities in NAIA, placed first in two categories.

The college praises the Lord for this witness for Christ. Coach Steve Morley and the Falcons have driven hard to an outstanding 21 win season out of 28 games—the best season in Fort Wayne Bible College history and the best record of any college team in the Fort Wayne area.

The Falcons took first in team rebounding by capturing the ball off the backboards from missed shooting attempts 64.2 percent of the time.

The hardboard five also took first in team defense by holding their opponents to an average of only 59.7 points per game.

In offense, Morley's men took 23rd place in team field goal shooting, sinking 51.2 percent of their attempted baskets.

The balanced offense and defense seen on the floor is beautiful to behold. It shows up on season statistical sheets as you see that five Falcon men averaged between 12 and 18 points per game. Not one became a "hot shot shooter" trying to grab the glory for himself. The averages for the leading five are: Doug Frost—12.5, Pete Snodder—15.4, Bruce Masopust—14.3, Tim Erdel—12.4, and Bob Kirby—14.8.

Off the floor these men of Christian stature exhibit the humility and grace often compromised by athletic stars on other college squads. They are deeply

involved in their Christian service outreach, in counseling, in Student Missionary Fellowship, in summer



missionary service and other activities glorifying their Lord, their church and their college.

Only Bruce Masopust and Rick Haberkamp are graduating seniors. In the wings are some promising prospects for next season with the following field goal percentages: Mike Reed, a junior with 42.6 percent, Bill Campbell, a freshman with 48.2 percent, Dan Rupp, a freshman with 50.0 percent, and Rick Matthew, a freshman with 57.1 percent shooting records.

Coach Morley is on the lookout for good prospects who are deeply committed to Christ and want their athletic gifts to be used by God. He is the first to admit that not all college stars were outstanding in high school.

An example is Bruce Masopust. He never played varsity ball in either high school or junior college. But in his three years at Fort Wayne he has rounded up an impressive record, been named to the "Outstanding College Athletes of America," to the Fort Wayne News-Sentinel All City College first team twice, and to the NCCAC conference first string twice and tournament first string once. He was voted the co-most valuable player along with Bob Kirby at the Falcon Invitational Tourney this season.

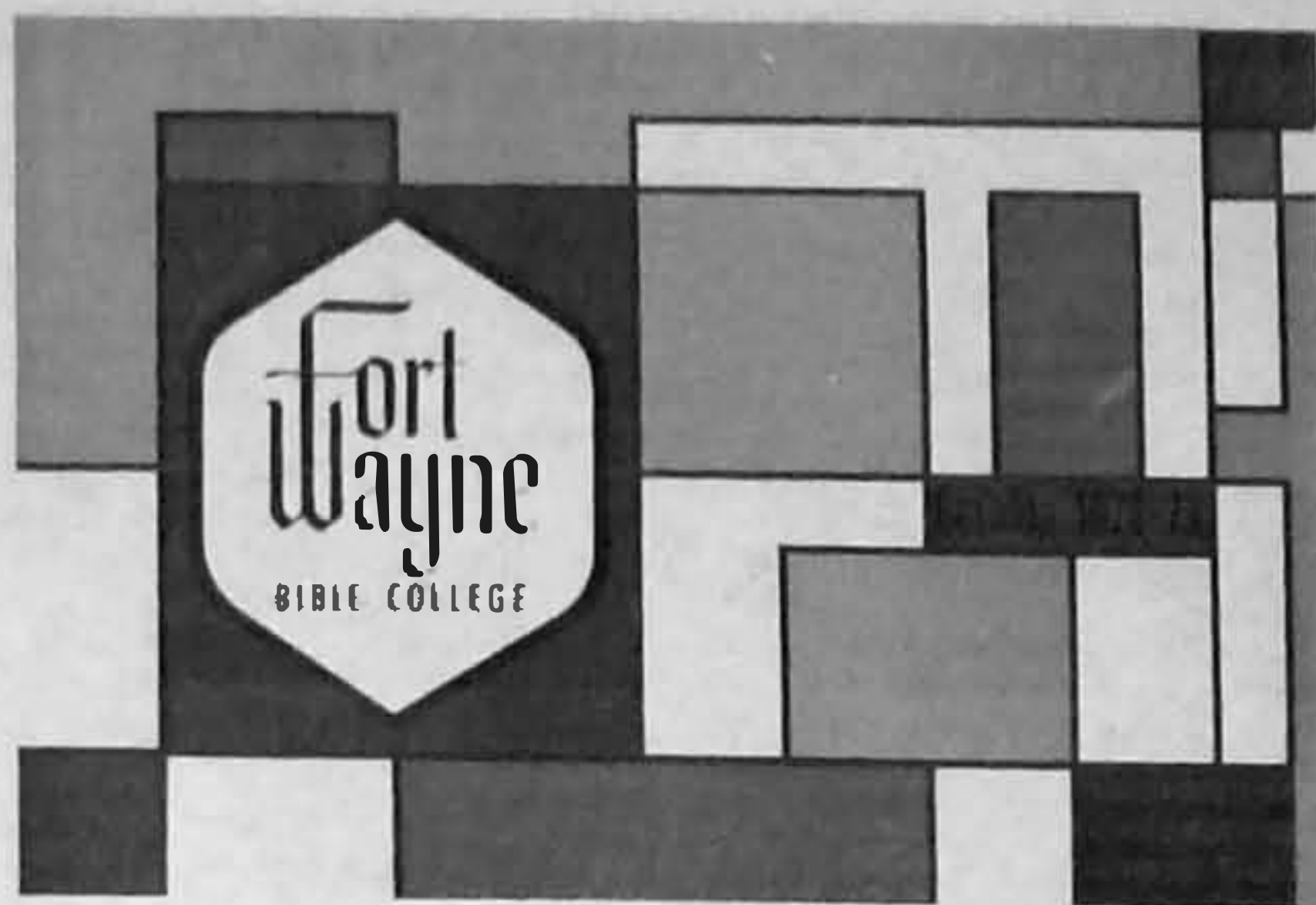
