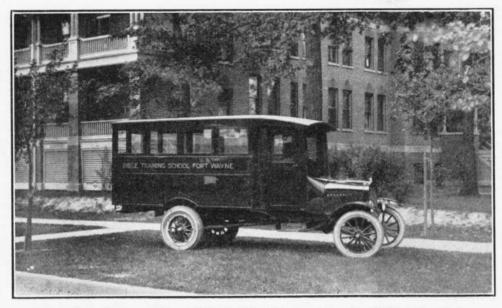

A MATERIALIZED ASPIRATION

Sometime, somewhere, someone conceived the idea of a Gospel Truck. We know not just when this happened; but in December, 1922 Miss Salome Schug received the first donation for

One year and a half later, Mr. Elton Roth, president of the Fellowship Circle, sponsored this idea and it was through his efforts that the Fellowship Circle assumed the sponsorship. He himself gave \$50 that the purpose might be achieved. In the spring of 1925, he resigned as President that he might devote more time to his duties at the Nyack Missionary Training Institute, at which time approximately one-half of the needed amount had been raised, largely through subscription among the members of the Fellowship Circle.

Last year a constribution of \$75 was made from the Gospel team fund. Mr. C. J. Gerig, presiding at the last annual meeting in Mr. Roth's absence, took pledges to the amount of \$300, which completed the drive for funds, as the total cost of the truck was about \$800.

A committee was appointed to consist of Rev. Wm. Hygema, Rev. S. A. Witmer and C. J. Gerig, which was to look after the purchase and equipment of the truck. This committee purchased a new Ford high-speed chassis, and according to plans drawn up by them, had the body made at the Kendallville Buggy works at Kendallville, Indiana.

The Gospel Truck is really a beautiful vehicle, having a gracefully sloping cowl, which eliminates the blocky appearance which characterizes most busses of this type. The interior is nicely finished, with a dome-light in the center, and well cushioned seats which run the length of the truck on both sides. The seats accommodate fifteen persons, including the driver, and the space beneath the seats may be used for carrying instrument and music cases; while at the rear is a door leading out to a platform which can be erected while the truck is at rest. The whole is embellished by large gold letters, which read—"BIBLE TRAINING SCHOOL—FORT WAYNE". The lettering is the work of Mr. Harold P. Browett.

On Thursday morning, September 17, 1925, Rev. Wm. Hygema gave the dedicatory address in our chapel hour. in which he set forth the necessity of the Gospel Truck, and the part it is to play in bringing the message of hope to hungry hearts in this vicinity. Rev. Jacob Hygema lifted our hearts heavenward in a prayer of dedication, after Rev. J. E. Ramseyer had received the truck in behalf of the school.

Already much use has been made of the Gospel Truck, and we students feel that our gratitude to the Fellowship Circle for this noble gift can only be shown in proportion as we use this gift to the honor and glory of God and the salvation of lost souls. Yet our gratitude, sincere though it be,

can never recompense our indebtedness to the Fellowship Circle; for time and eternity only will reveal what it has meant to us, and to those who come

OUR ANCHOR

"An anchor of the soul." Heb. 6:18. Many of the writers of the N. T. were accustomed to the seas and we find that nautical terms are not at all foreign to them. The 27th chapter of Acts which gives the description of the storm encountered by the shipmen who manned the ship on which Paul and others were being taken to Rome gives a wonderful array of nautical terms. The men among the apostles who were fishermen knew what it meant to cast anchor, and the writer of this epistle was not unfamiliar with the terms used in the art of sea far-

And these writers were accustomed to weave these well known experiences of every day life into the story of the journey of the soul. There is another text in this book bearing on the experience of the soul in its onward march toward glory in which the Athenian game grounds play an important part in representing the soul, speeding forward in the race toward the eternal goal. There the soul is on solid ground trying to win in the race. Here the soul is on the high seas and coming into port where it is reresented as casting anchor.

I. What is meant by the anchor here? If it were talking about an ordinary anchor such as the great ships use at sea we might describe its form. the material out of which it is made and its size. But when we talk about an anchor for the soul we are talking of something entirely different. This is not something made out of wood or metal and secured by a great strong cable. Have we considered what the writer here had in his mind? This anchor is very important to us from many different standpoints. In some way, we immediately associate the anchor of our soul with our Christ. There is no other anchor which could fill the place herein so wonderfully described. And this anchor is expressed in our text by the word "hope" Hope when rightly centered is the great anchor of the soul which this text speaks about. For the full verse reads: "Which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast, and which entereth into that within the veil." In what sense is hope the anchor of the soul? Possibly the best answer to this is found in the words of Paul in Col. 1:27, whom God would make known what is the riches of His glory of this mystery among the Gentiles; which is Christ in you the hope of glory. According to these words Christ is our But we may look at this from two different standpoints. The hope may be either subjective or objective.

1. Hope subjective. By this we mean that our hope is centered in Christ for all the good we ever expect to receive both in this life and in the life which is to come. Hope is the anchor when that hope is centered and fixed in Christ. We will readily understand this if we simply think for a moment of the many things in which mortal man does trust. He trusts in the arm of flesh for many of the solutions of the problems of life. He trusts in the material things to carry

him through crises in life, because of what it will purchase. If he may only have money then he may be able to possess many of the comforts of life that he would not otherwise have and he may be able to command the service of skill that he otherwise would have to be deprived of. He trusts in the theories of men and in his own wisdom in many, many instances to take him finally to heaven and to land him safely in glory. But as we all know these all fail, in the fateful moment and at the entrance to the port of the other world.

But should we have all the wealth and honor and skill and wisdom and knowledge that the world is able to bestow upon us and furnish us and not have our hope fixed in the one thing and the one person Christ Jesus then we are not in possession of

the right anchor of the soul.

2. On the other hand our hope may be only objective, that is having Christ as the important thing: all our hope inspired by Him. He is our hope in the sense that all the hope we have is inspired and planted in our heart because we have Him. Thus we would say Christ inspires every hope in our life, thus here hope is only objective, while in the other case we said our hope is centered in Christ in the sense that He will grant us the thing we have hoped for because the hope we have is all centered in Christ; while here Christ is the first consideration and we say all the hopes we have come from Him as the and the operator of their fulfillment. But as we said awhile ago the text in Collosians presents both sides. Christ in us is the hope of glory, then all our hope is fixed in Him and we are convinced that all our hopes will be wrought out through His life, while on the other hand if Christ instead of hope is the important thing with us then whatever hopes we have will find their origin in Him and will most certainly be fulfilled. Hope in this sense therefore, namely when it is entirely forcused in Christ or when Christ on the other hand is the inspirer and author of every hope, will truly be the anchor of the soul.

II. Where is our Anchor? This anchor has been cast and where is it cast? Some ships have had to cast anchor at sea when there was danger ahead and lest they come ashore and break the ship the anchor is cast until the seamen are able to get their bearings. On the other hand, the ship coming into port will cast its anchor to hold the ship in the proper place. Is our anchor cast away out in the seas far from land or does the Scripture teach us that our anchor is cast in the port where we expect to land? It is surely the latter. Our anchor is in a perfectly safe place. According to the context, it is within the veil. And what does the author of the epistle mean by the expression. "within the veil"? This is in the Holiest of the veil"? This is in the Holiest of all of the ancient Tabernacle. And Christ hath entered into that within the veil. That is, He has fulfilled all that was necessary and required to be fulfilled in order to enter into the heavens. For in heaven is within the veil. He entered only by first having

passed through this world and then through Paradise and then into heaven. He could only enter Paradise by dying and that the death of the cross. This was the eternal decree of God: for when sin entered into the heart of man God placed the Cherubim at the entrance gate in the earthly Paradise and put in his hand a sword which turned every way to keep the tree of life. For if any man dared to go that way toward the tree of life it meant death, for the sentence of death was placed upon all human kind, because of sin; and there was no way back to the tree of life except through death and this must be death which eliminates all sin out of life. And Christ was the only one who could do this for all men. And thus by way of death He passed into Paradise: the intermediate state and place, from there He again came forth and seen of His brethren, and then before their eyes was received up into a cloud which transferred Him to heaven; and thus He passed within the veil. This veil which had formerly stood between (that is our flesh) which was polluted with sin was torn apart and Jesus passed in. Thus when Jesus entered heaven, our anchor of the soul passed into heaven, or to that which is within the veil.

2. In this sense, therefore, He is our forerunner and will hold us secure. He is the first one to have passed every gate of entrance toward God and entered into the presence of the Almighty. He is, therefore, the forerunner who hath prepared the way, for none other could go unless He went before and prepared the way into the holiest of all. He is our forerunner into that world just as John the Baptist was the forerunner of Christ here in this world. John prepared the way for the Lord to come before the people of this world, so Christ hath prepared the way for those who place their trust in Him to also

enter in within the veil.

III. Why is this anchor of the soul dependable? There might be some anchors cast at sea that would not be entirely dependable for something might break or give way and let the ship drift. But not so with this anchor of the soul. According to the text it is sure and steadfast.

1. It is dependable therefore in the first place because it is sure, that is, it has a firm hold. An anchor for the ship coming into port when let down imbeds itself in the bottom of the sea and finds a place to lodge and hold. It may become deeply imbedded in the soil underneath. But our an-hor finds a firm place within the veil It will n the very heart of Jesus. not yield in the least its hold when once secure within the veil. The anchor of the ship at sea may pull loose and continue to float for awhile but this anchor finds a secure place in a sure soil. You may let loose your end of the rope which holds the soul se-curely but never will the anchor come loose at the other end, namely, at the end within the veil.

2. It is dependable because it is steadfast, that is, strong in itself. This is different from the other word in that it refers to the anchor itself while the former word referred to the place where the anchor found a resting place. Of course, this anchor is strong when it consists of the hope which is placed in the Lord Jesus Christ, and finds all its purposes and plans inspired by the Lord Himself.

3. It is dependable because of the two immutable things spoken of in the previous context. In the 18th verse He says, "That by two immutable things in which it was impossible for God to lie, we might have a strong encouragement . . . to lay hold upon the hope set before us: which hope we have as an anchor." The two immutable things are clearly His promises and His oath, that is His Word and His oath. The first of these is so certain that the O. T. tells us in one place that all things will be shaken and that one thing only will remain unmoved, and that is His This is so immutable that it cannot be moved or changed. It is like the law of the Medes and Persians. God hath spoken and it will come to pass; no matter what man may say or do or plan this will come to pass. it is delayed at one time it will surely come to pass at another. And all these delays brought about by the disobedience of many only tend to push the fulfillment with all its attendant blessings a little farther forward or into the future. His promises or His word are yea and amen in Christ Jesus the Lord. This anchor is sure and steadfast because His promises are immutable, that is unchangeable. Whatever Satan may do among the multitudes of men and in the armies of the angels will not prevent the things which God has promised in His word from coming to pass.

His oath is the other thing which makes it sure and steadfast. God had no greater to swear by then He swore by Himself. And it has been considered through the ages that when one swears by the Eternal One or by the God of heaven that what he says will be absolutely true as far as he knows the truth. But as we know this is not always true for some men will even perjure themselves to escape punishment and detection. But in the main the man or woman will tell the truth when under oath. And so God taking that which is by man considered the manner in which all truth may be best secured has taken an oath that he will do these things. This is what stands back of the hope which is our anchor and makes it dependable to

our soul.

IV. What does such an anchor accomplish for us? There are three things which we will mention as accomplished by the anchor of the soul which is sure and steadfast within the veil.

1. This anchor gives us assurance. When we know that our anchor is cast and our soul which is the ship in which we are traveling at the present is secure to that anchor then we may go about our duties undisturbed. There is nothing which gives more impetus to the work which we are doing for the Master than to know that we are securely anchored in all our activities to the hope safe within the veil, which hope is "Christ in us the hope of

glory". An assurance that is so glorious makes it a pleasure to do things and to go forward in our work.

2. This anchor keeps us steadfast. The anchor for the vessel that is securely fastened keeps the ship steady or steadfast. That is, it keeps it in the place where it should be kept.

How much more is this true with regard to the soul that has an anchor of hope sure and steadfast within the Too many Christians are unsteady and you are never certain just what they are going to do and whether they are going to keep in the middle of the road and move forward in the right line toward glory, or whether they are going to become side-tracked. It is a real joy and encouragement both to the Christians who are living here upon earth and to God in heaven to see a soul that is ever steadfast. If that soul has as its anchor the hope "sure and steadfast within the veil" then that soul will ever be steadfast. How can it be otherwise? It can only be let out so far. It will be so anchored that it will not strike the rocks. Its field of service will be controlled or limited by the length of the rope that stretches out from the place where the rope is tied to the anchor. This may be long or short as the Lord considers the place where the soul is stationed dangerous or safe. If God wants to give a particular soul more leaway it is possible for Him to do so by making the rope a little longer while He does not change the location of the anchor. If you have been accustomed to anchor a boat for fishing you know that sometimes it is necessary to take up the rope a little to keep the boat from drifting so much while you may in no manner disturb the anchor.

3. Your anchor brings you to shore. God no doubt will continue to shorten that rope which reaches to the soul that lives here upon earth. By following the rope which leads to the place where the rope is secure on the anchor of your soul you will finally find yourself within the harbor of heaven and yourself safe within the veil. anchor brings you home. In this respect this anchor is different from the ordinary anchor for it is ever in the same place, that is, in the inner sanctuary of heaven where Jesus has entered as our forerunner. It would seem from time to time He makes the rope just a little shorter and brings us a little nearer home and that finally He will pull us entirely to the shore. We should rejoice that we have such an anchor for the soul sure and stead-

fast and within the veil.

PAUL'S MINISTRY

I Thess. 2:1-14

Why isn't our ministry more blest of God? Is there not a pattern by which we may measure our methods of preaching? Is there not given, somewhere in the Scriptures, an ac-Is there not given, count of the methods and means that may be, and should be used in preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ? These, in substance, may have been the questions that many prayerful and con-secrated servants of God have asked themselves, after reviewing their service for the Lord in the preaching of the Word.

Let it be understood that a genuine experience in Christ, a life that is permeated with the Spirit of God, and a daily walk in prayer constitute the a daily walk in prayer constitute the foundation of all true success in ser-vice for God. But there is, in First Thessalonians 2:1-14 a detailed ac-count of some secrets of service after having taken into consideration the fundamentals above mentioned.

It is to this passage of Scripture that we shall turn our attention, and from it seek to gather a few thoughts which, we trust, shall enable us to be better, more effective ministers of the Gospel.

I. His Manner of Entrance

In verses one and two, the Apostle reveals the manner of entrance to his new congregation. The church Thessalonica is already aware of the afflictions and persecutions which Paul and his co-laborers received at Philippi.

This commends Paul, Sylvanus, and Tims commends Faul, Sylvands, and Timotheous as "good soldiers of Jesus Christ" because they are willing to "endure hardness". And today the church of Jesus Christ needs "good soldiers". soldiers" much more than she needs 'good preachers".

But there is yet another thought that grows out of these experiences

of the Lord's servants.

To whom do we go for human comfort and advice when the shadows of distress and sorrow fall across our path? Is it not to those who, by the grace of God, have weathered storms similar to the ones through which we are going? Ah, yes, dear friends, so long as there remains no known and unconfessed sin within us, these test-

ings may be the providences of God, coming to us as blessings in disguise to enlarge our sphere of usefulness. "Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and the God of all comfort; Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God." II Cor. 1:3, 4. And the Apostle's entrance was not in vain.

II. His Message

The message the Apostle preached was not man-made; it was God-given. Many sermons of the present time contain much of the spirit of man, but very little, if any of the Spirit of God. Paul's message was the "Gospel of God", vs. 2, that is, it originated with God and it belonged to Him. But God allowed Paul "to be put in trust with the Gospel," vs. 4, so we, brethren, are trustees of the Gospel, "holding forth the Word of life." May Jehovah keep us all true to "the good old Gospel to the end". We have no other message; we want no other message, and lost humankind needs no other save "the Gospel of Christ;" "for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth".

III. His Method of Preaching

Negatively.

Paul's "preaching was not grounded on a delusion," vs. 3, (Weymouth's). but it was sound doctrinal preaching. After considerable contact with those who have been puzzled by the many "isms" of the day, it is the writer's strong conviction that the people need to be shown what the Scriptures teach. By this, we mean the preaching of Bible Doctrine in the power of the Spirit, always with the view of it becoming practical in the lives of be-We, as ministers of Christ, lievers. should do our best to lead people out of the maze or "isms" into the clear light and glorious liberty of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Concerning Paul's life it was not of "uncleanness", vs. 3. This word "uncleanness" in the original refers to the moral life. In other words, the Apostle did not lead a double life, but was

morally upright.

As to his motives, they, too, were pure, for his exhortation came not in

'guile", vs. 3.

Paul was not a "man-pleasing" preacher for concerning his loyalty to God, he says, "so we speak: not as pleasing men but God, which trieth our hearts," vs. 4. It is quite evident that some have lost their spiritual power because they have catered to the whims of worldly men. Brethren, shall we not, like Peter and John say, "Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard." Acts 4:19, 20.

"Neither at any time used we flattering words," vs. 5. And here is where some have failed, for to flatter is to tell an untruth. If flattery, on the part of a friend, destroys confidence. then how much more quickly will it do so when used by the servant of God?

With reference to financial rewards,

Paul's ministry was "not in covetous-ness," vs. 5. He desired not theirs ness," vs. 5. He desired not theirs but them. While it is true that "the laborer is worthy of his hire" and that God's people should endeavor to release their pastors from the cares of bread winning as much as possible, it is also true that the minister should have the glory of God and the salvation of souls first upon his heart. And when he has labored faithfully prayerfully he then can claim the pro-mise that "God shall supply all his needs".

It is sad, but true, that the desire for popularity has been the stumblingstone of many who have begun well in the Christian ministry. But con-cering it Paul writes, "Nor of men yet of others," vs. 6. Jesus said, "Beware when all men speak well of you." Often God does are Often God does cause one to have favor with many, but if that be our privilege, let us make sure that we use this influence for the glory of

God and not for any self-gain.

The "throne-room" of the Christian church is crowded. There is no place for those who would "lord it over the flock". But there is yet plenty of room for those who will be servants indeed. As an apostle of Christ, Paul might have been burdensome, but he was not, vs. 6. Blessed is he whose ministry is that of a true shepherd, who feeds the Master's sheep, regardless of circumstances, who knows when "the Chief Shepherd shall appear" he "shall receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away".

2. Positively.

Paul yearned for the welfare the Thessalonians even as a mother yearns for the welfare of her child. Because of this, his ministry was gentle and sacrificial, vs. 7, 8. It is this consuming love that will convince consuming love that men of our interest in them and sincerity towards them. God grant that every pastor shall love his flock even as Paul loved this people! Then some-thing will surely be done for the Lord.

As a servant, the apostle labored in weariness, in hardship and with perseverance, vs. 9. We are convinced that many of the serious-minded youth of today are looking for something that will challenge the best in them. not tell them, not only of the blessings and privileges of Christ service, but. also, hold out to them the challenge of a life spent for God? Certainly, the conditions and needs of humanity ought to present a very real challenge to any Christian young man or wom-an. Christ wants "warriors", not namby-pamby, rocking chair Christians. We are to "put on the whole armor of God". This means there is conflict and victory ahead.

The Word says, "Feed the flock of

God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly, not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind. Neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock. I Peter 5:2, 3. As examples. Paul calls to witness both the church and God," how holily and justly and unblameably we behaved ourselves," vs. 10. The minister's actions speak louder than his words. It is, therefore, necessary to have a "conscience void of offence toward God and toward man".

There is much preaching today that tends toward idle sentimentalism. Many sermons are preached about the love and mercy of God, but too few about the justice and holiness of God. We must needs preach a message well balanced with both sides of God's character, "Behold, therefore, the goodness and severity of God."

Now Paul not only had the gentle,

Now Paul not only had the gentle, affectionate qualities of a mother in relation to the flock, as we read in verses 7 and 8, but he also had the firm qualities of a father as we note in vs. 11. "As ye know how we exhorted, comforted and charged every one of you, as a father doth his children." A boy reared under the care of his mother alone may become effeminate. Surely he needs his mother's influence to instil within him those noble qualities of tenderness, sympathy, and chivalry. But along with this he needs the influence of his father to promote courage, conviction, and firmness. The church must likewise have a well balanced ministry of gentleness and reproof.

IV. His Marvelous Results

There are three things which manifest the results of Paul's ministry to

this people.

They received the message as the Word of God, vs. 13; they became Christians, vs. 13; and they were steadfast Christians who endured suffering

for Christ's sake, vs. 14.

What better results could any pastor desire? Shall we not, brethren, in our service, pattern after Paul, and who knows but what we, too, shall be blest with converts who will stand the tests of the storm. This is the greatest reward we can expect on this side of glory—first, the presence and approval of God and, then, converts who will be true to the Lord Jesus.

And yet so many times we have not because we ask not, or because we ask amiss as James puts it in his Epistle, or because we do not ask in accordance with the will of God. Thus we deprive ourselves of so many rich and blessed blessings which the Lord had really intended for us. But may we all as a church be awakened to our opportunities as well as our responsibilities, for they are equally great, and if we would be our best for our dear Master we must be awake.

The work here at Kalambe Station is going on as usual, with its many seasons of rejoicing as well as its many rials and discouragements. But these all come to us in any walk of life, and why not, for they were even brought to our Savior while here below, and even now He is touched with everyone that touches us? Thus He can strengthen and help us that we can be more than

conquerors. Praise Him!

Our staff of white missionaries has dwindled down from six a year ago to three; although, we expect Miss Weith, the nurse, to return soon. It is now three months that we are alone We have been looking for help from the homeland but it almost looks as though our dear people are disappointing us at that end of the line. It is very evident that the devil is working and is trying to keep a weak spot in the line somewhere, if not here then there. He knows that is the shortest way to victory for him, and on the other hand is a sad fact when we see how many victories we are winning for

him by not "letting go and letting God". May the good Lord help us all to be on the firing line not firing against the brethren, but instead firing against the enemy.

Many times we are almost at the end and do not know just what to do first. So many things are crowding in upon us, and the saddest is that the most worthy is almost always crowded out, no matter how hard we try to do otherwise. It is here we need much grace and wisdom to be our best for Him. This is what has prompted this letter, namely, an appeal to our Christian friends at home, to enter into the ministry of prayer for this needy field.

We find it very difficult to lead these people to the Lord, for their minds have so long been steeped in sin that it seems almost impossible for the Gospel light to break in upon them. After trying to train them again and again, sometimes it seems almost useless for the first little thing that comes up they are ready to leave and turn back. The fact of the matter is they have perhaps never been born again so what we need more than anything else is "Prayer help".

I now take this opportunity to appeal to you at home. You will no doubt say, "That is your part out there," with which we fully agree, and it is also true that we do not pray as much as we ought, for which we are very sorry, and wish our bodies were strong to do all that we are supposed to do. It is rather difficult to spend our time in prayer, look after the workmen, teach listen to a palaver, or attend to some other business which must be done, all at the same time. And having to do this all day long and many times in the evenings, we find our bodies are too tired to even pray intelligently, to say nothing of spending hours in prayer. I am not dishonoring prayer, only wish we were able to work all day and spend the biggest part of the night in prayer. We need prayer so much, and this is the reason for this letter to you at this time and this is the appeal. Since we are in such dire need of prayer and are sure that the Lord has someone to pray, we are appealing for at least five people from the Woodburn church who will enter this prayer ministry and spend at least one hour in prayer every day for this work and especially for this station. Will you do it? Or. will you be content to look on while we are pouring out our very life, trying to bring the Gospel to these people. We find ourselves so insufficient because of a lack of real prayer help. I am sure there are at least five who will take up this great part in the work of the Master, or, perhaps there are more, the more the better. Pray that the Lord might open darkened hearts to the Gospel and for the white missionaries, that they may be able to be their best.

I would like as many as will volunteer for this work to write me a letter stating that fact, as well as to begin praying at once. I will also be glad to keep you informed as to the needs as well as the victories which

we, by the Lord's help, are winning. Come on, brethren, let us go over the top for Jesus. Souls are perishing every day, and the Lord is soon coming. Will we be ready when He comes if we are not willing to take our place for Him? May the Lord help you to decide. May you all be willing to follow Him is our prayer. If this be the case, I am sure we will experience a real victory out here and souls will be born into His kingdom by large numbers, and His name glorified.
