## Wanted: More Men for Macedonia!

T WAS NIGHT in an ancient seaport town of Asia Minor. During the late afternoon a small party of pilgrims had arrived in the town. Despite the fact that the greatest preacher the world has known since the time of Christ was in that group, their coming was unannounced. For them there was no official welcome, no royal banquet, no de luxe suite at the city's first hotel; theirs it was to lodge in some obscure inn, or, perchance, out under the stars. Walking along the harbor as the setting sun cast its shimmer of gold upon the Aegean Sea, these men looked across the Hellespont and spied in the distance a land which they had not as yet visited. When, finally, the sun set behind Mount Athos, at least one man of the four retired to his rest with the image of that unreached land indelibly impressed upon his consciousness, and with the thought of an untouched pagan world haunting his last waking moment.

During the night there appeared to this man an epoch-making, map-changing vision, "There came a man of Macedonia, standing beseeching him and saying, Come over into Macedonia and help us!" For that party of pilgrims that vision led to a change of plans and a re-direction of effort; for a continent, it meant a change of destiny. In that night vision the apostle Paul recognized the personification of human need. In the plea of "the man from Macedonia," he recognized the plaintive voice of a sin-sick continent calling for the Great Physician, the prayer of a pagan world for reality. The man of Macedonia represented the Europe of A. D. 50!

What? Did Europe need the Gospel? Beyond the Aegean Sea lay two of the greatest nations of antiquity: Greece, the home of art, sculpture, poetry, and philosophy; and Rome, the center of law, government, and commerce. Had not Greece already given to the world Homer, its greatest poet; Aristophanes, its greatest comedian; Sophocles and Euripides, its greatest literary artists; Scopos, Praxitiles, and Lysippus, its great-

est artists; Thucydides, its greatest historian; Lysias and Demosthenes, its greatest orators; Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle, its greatest philosophers; and Alexander and Xenophon, its greatest military strategists? What other nation of the world could boast of such a galaxy of stars? And had not Rome already given to the world the greatest canons of law and the finest governmental machinery that men had ever known? Had not Julius and Augustus Caesar solidified the greater part of Europe into one vast empire? Did not all the principal roads lead to Rome? And, further, had not Rome already given to the world such immortals as Cato, Cicero, Pompey, Antony, Octavius, and Tiberius? And of

the writers, Vergil, Horace, Ovid, Strabo, and Livy?

Yes, Greece and Rome had already given to the world a rich culture embracing literature, art, philosophy, sculpture architecture, law, and government, civilizations, in fact; they had already given to the world the majority of its seven ancient wonders. And besides, Greece and Rome had religions of their own, gods and goddesses aplenty. What need had such a Europe for Christ and the Gospel?

But Paul had not yet heard of the "Laymen's Commission" with its surveys and findings, and he therefore believed that Greece and Rome with all of their wisdom were yet ignorant of the true God, and that their religions were only mirages in the desert which mocked and deceived the souls of men. He was convinced that he carried in his heart the secret for which philosophers had long and wistfully sought. Paul recognized in that night vision a divine summons, and the very next day he and his comrades took ship for Macedonia. He had hoped to penetrate Asia, but God changed Paul's plans and conferred upon Europe a blessed priority. The destiny of the western world was determined when Paul and his party crossed the Hellespont. The Lord of the harvests had found men for Macedonia!

The modern world is only another Macedonia magnified and modified, There is still a need in the human life that no amount of culture can ever satisfy. In times past the human heart was not satisfied by the musings of a Plato, by the dialectic theorizings of mediaeval schoolmen, nor yet by the trappings of a carnal ecclesiastical organization. Neither can one hope to find full satisfaction today in the philosophy of a Spinoza; the hypotheses of a Darwin or Huxley; the panaceas of a Karl Marx; the cynicism of a Clarence Darrow or a George Bernard Shaw; the free and easy license of a Bertrand Russell; no, nor yet in the creations of scientific genius; and cer-

## Editorials

"And Enoch walked with God," Gen. 5:24

In the midst of a "crooked and perverse generation" Enoch walked with God. No matter what the rest of the world thought of him, "he had this testimony, that he pleased God." No doubt he encountered many unpleasant experiences in the way of jeers and ridicule for his Godly walk. But he remained unshaken in his faith in God, for to have God's approval upon his life was worth far more than all the acclaim and commendation of the world. His primary concern was not. "What will others think?" but, "What will God think of me; am I pleasing Him?" And so Enoch walked with God for 365 years until one day "he was not, for God took him" to where their communion could never be broken.

The relation between Christ and His true church is very beautifully portrayed in the life and walk of Enoch. Our Lord is looking today for professing Christians everywhere to step out of the crowd, throw off their worldliness, and enter into a close walk with Himself. Mouth confession has its place, but a holy life is far more important. The closer our walk with the Lord, the more Christ-like we will become, which should indeed be the goal of every child of God. We, too, may have a testimony that we please God, if we pay the price as Enoch did. What of it, though we do suffer ridicule and unjust criticism at the hands of others? He gives assurance in our hearts that we please Him. That is enough, But even more wonderful than that-one of these days our walk with Him will take us out of this life into the light of His glorious presence, there to enjoy His blessed fellowship forever. But let us rethere, we must walk with Him here."

tainly not in that piece of sheepskin, embellished and decorated with Latin phraseology, commonly called a diploma! The sorry state of our civilized world at thi very moment, with all of its cultural and scientific achievements, is a testimony to the sheer stupidity and futility of attempting to transform life by recreating environment. Men need culture, but there is a need that neither culture nor philosophy can satisfy. The modern world needs the same Christ and the same Gospel that Europe needed in A. D. 50.

Then, too, every forward step in the triumph of the Gospel has involved the invasion and conquest of pre-occupied territory. Every new field has been a Macedonia which some one has entered in obedience to a heavenly vision. Certain intellectuals are now telling us that what the world needs is not a distinctive Christian message, but a syncretistic religion which will conserve the elements of truth and beauty which may be found in all

religions—a crazy-patch quilt of some ort! It is enough to recall that if syncretism could have saved humanity, Paul would never have gone forth on his hazardous missionary journeys, for the Mediterranean World of the first century was literally overrun with syncretistic and mystery religions.

But what has all of this to do with the Christian youth of today? Simply this: We are today facing a new frontier of human need. We are confronting a disillusioned humanity. Recent experiences have stripped the modern world of the robes of its academic self-sufficiency, and uncovered a heart that is aching and sick. We are facing a world situation which is itself an admission that the modern man has lost his way in the labyrinth of his own civilization; and that his philosophy, his art, his culture, and even his religion are not enough. He tried to bow God and His Word out of the home, the classroom, the nominal church, and out of the universe a few years ago. The result of this colossal human folly was the World War and now the depression. And unless our modern man repents, something worse will follow. We are indeed facing a difficult future in this modern Macedonia; but I am nevertheless convinced that this very situation offers the greatest challenge to the Gospel of Christ within the past hundred years. Young people, ours is the privilege of going forth into this dizzy world with a Gospel that restores moral and spiritual equilibrium; into this impoverished world with a Gospel that shares the infinite riches of God's grace with ruined men; into a world that is satiated with the husks of human philosophy and rationalistic theories, with a Gospel that offers to all the very bread of heaven, and into a world that has lost its way in the gloom and twilight of a glorified and deified humanity, with a Gospel that unveils the dawn of redeeming grace and brings man back to God. God wants more men for Macedonia. Will you be one to answer: "Here am I, Lord, send me"?

## Soul Winning

"He that winneth souls is wise," Prov. 11:30.

The bringing of a soul to Jesus is the highest achievement possible to a human life. Lyman Beecher said: "The greatest achievement in life is not that one should be a scientist, important as that is; not that one should be a statesman, vitally important as that is; not even that one should be a theologian, immeasurably important as that is; but that greatest thing of all is for one human being to bring another to Jesus Christ."

Many Christian workers have lost the vision of soul winning. Their ambition is to preach and teach but they have never led a soul to Christ. They do not know what it is to deal definitely with a soul concerning salvation.

The writer went to Ft. Worth, Texas, last October to attend a conference of soul-winning at the First Baptist church of that city and was privileged to attend and study the methods of the largest Sunday School and probably the largest soul-winning church in the world. This Sunday School has an enrollment of close to 5000 and an attendance from 3200 to 4600.

This great soul-winning organization is a result of 25 years of effort on the part of the Pastor of the church, Dr. J. Frank Norris, and his staff of 200 Sunday School teachers.

Rev. Louis Entzminger was also used of God to build up this great work. Mr. Entzminger is a great Sunday School man and it was a great privilege for the writer to sit at his feet every day for two weeks and listen to him expound the Word and tell about his methods of work.

With a few words I will give the gist of Mr. Entzminger's message.

- 1. All Sunday School literature was discarded and the Bible only was substituted. A course taking the student thru the Bible in six years was outlined. It was Mr. Entzminger's conviction that the Sunday Schools were not getting the Word of God and that the International lessons were not meeting the need.
- 2. He trained his teachers. He met with the teachers once a week to show them how to teach the lesson. He said that many strangers came to the school once or twice and then never came back because they got nothing. So he sought to make a real Bible teacher out of every

teacher. This could only be done by careful training. He had every one to get, besides a good Bible, a Bible Dictionary and a Concordance. The teacher must be a careful student of the Word, he must saturate his soul with the Word during the week,

3. He taught his teachers how to win souls. Teachers must not only teach but must keep in touch with the scholar. The one great aim of the school is to land every soul in the Kingdom. The children's homes must be visited and many of the unsaved parents were thus reached. Every worker must be able to make the plan of salvation clear to the seeker. The Gospel must be carried to the darkest nook and corner of the great city of Ft. Worth. The teacher must be a gospel messenger and willing to become all things to all men so that they may win some.

Mr. Entzminger as well as Dr. Norris were the best examples as soul winners. Often after a busy day of preparation for the Sunday work, on Saturday night they went out together to some poor home to win them for Christ and the church.

This soul-winning spirit was demonstrated again and again during the conference. When the minister was in the midst of his message a worker would bring in an unsaved man. Everything came to a stop in order that this man could get thru to God. After the shoutings and tears of joy the message was resumed

To hear these instructors, to be in the midst of a revival spirit and to see precious souls get thru to God is an inspiration never to be forgotten.

God wants to open our eyes that we can see the vast possibilities within the reach of all our Sunday Schools. Because we are living in perilous times, and it is getting hard to reach the unsaved many of us are content to go along in our church work teaching and preaching and do not even expect souls to be saved. May God forgive us.

May the Lord thoroughly arouse us and may we humbly beseech Him to show us just how to proceed in this great work. May we in all simplicity ask Him to guide us, to open doors, to direct our footsteps and He will surely enable us to win some.

#### A Word From India

(Note: The following excerpts are taken from a letter to the Editor from Rev. and Mrs. A. C. Eicher, both of the class of '31.).

Mission House Jalgaon, E. K. British India.

We both so much enjoy getting the Bulletin, that the very enjoyment of it (even though I haven't paid our dues yet, the more our shame!) is inspiring me to take my pen in hand to write this letter!

Christmas has just come and gone and the last fellow to come around for a Christmas bakshush has, I hope, come and gone—just this minute! His sole supporting argument for his request that I give him a present was that my predecessor had done so! Custom is a great factor in Indian life.

At present Artimese is in Mukti Mission in Kedgaon. You remember that it was founded and then run for many years by that wonderful, iron woman, Pandita Ramabai. There is in Mukti a good language school pandit for Marathi. Artimese is enjoying the work tremendously and is gaining very fast the last strip of the track prior to jumping the hurdle of the second exam.

I was up at Mukti for five days at Christmas time and had the great privilege of preaching on Sunday morning in the Marathi service. It was inspiring to see so many clean-faced, well- (at least cleanly) dressed, happy girls and wom-As usual, they pitch their songs up so high that the muscles of my throat ache from trying to reach them. It would take a tenor that could hit b-flat with ease to sing Indian songs comfortably! Just the other day, when I was annoyed more than ordinarily at a wedding processional band here in Jalgaon-it had kept up the weirdest, shrill, cackling, tooting music for hours-the lad who tries to cook my food came bounding in and asked me if that weren't marvellous music. I told him that if I weren't afraid of hitting the musician while I did it, I'd aim a bullet straight at the offending oboe that the fellow was playing. I do fear, I haven't yet a very adequate appreciation for Indian band music. Some of the hymn tunes, however, are exquisite.

But I was telling you about Mukti. One evening we went out to see Ramabai's simple grave-stone in the lonely little graveyard in the middle of a field which belongs to Mukti. All in one morning we went around to see the printing presses, painting and art work, sewing, washing.

It was good to meet Miss Elda Amstutz, whom many of the friends remember.

I hope to go on tour in two or three days. Tomorrow I have to go to Pachora (where Emery and Eva Masters are at present), and preside at a meeting of correction and chastisement, as well as give Communion to the Pachora church. Please remember us in prayer. It is a great battle, but He is victor!

# Liquidating the Debt on Bethany Hall

The 1934 Conference of the Missionary Church Association appointed a committee to seek to liquidate the indebtedness on Bethany Hall in cooperation with the Trustees. Gratitude is hereby given to God for enabling us to make some definite progress toward that goal.

#### Reduction in Bonded Indebtedness

The bonded indebtedness on August 1, 1934, stood at \$13,982.50. Against this sum there was a cash balance on hand of \$1,287.60. The interest rate was 634%.

From August 1, 1934, to February 1, 1935, the following contributions were received:

\$ 515.28 (outright gifts) 1000.00 (annuity plan)

1515.28 total

With bal. 1287.60

\$2802.88 total

With this sum on hand we have lately been able to retire \$2732.50 in outstanding bonds. The indebtedness has therefore been reduced to \$11,250.00

#### Reduction in Interest Rate

A reduction in the interest rate has been made possible in the following manner: The trust officer who has been servicing the bonds is Mr. E. C. Miller, Receiver of the Old-First and Tri-State National Bank, the institution which held the mortgage and issued the bonds. For servicing the bonds the trust officer received 34% and the bondholder received the remaining 6%.

By means of a legal petition and a court order Mr. S. A. Lehman has succeeded Mr. E. C. Miller as the trust officer for these bonds. Mr. Lehman now holds the mortgage in behalf of the bondholders and will hereafter "service" the bonds. He will do this without compensation, and so the ¾% service charge is eliminated. This will mean a saving of \$84.37 per year in interest.

At the beginning of the Conference year interest on the bonded indebtedness totaled \$78.65 per month. Through the reduction of the interest rate and the retirement of bonds it is now \$56.25.

### How You May Help

- 1. By prayer. God must be first in every undertaking of this kind. Will you take this matter anew upon your hearts in believing prayer?
- 2. By cash contributions. Small as well as large gifts are gratefully received. A modest gift may seem insignificant to the size of the debt, but let us remember that Bethany Hall would not be standing today if it were not for the many smaller gifts for there have been few really large ones. "Every little bit helps."
- 3. By the annuity plan. In this form of giving a rate of interest which is determined by the age of the annuitant is paid during the life of the donor. Correspondence from interested Christian people is invited.
- 4. By investment. Occasionally a bondholder wishes to cash in his bonds when there are no funds on hand to retire them. In that case the Committee would be glad to resell them to some one who would consider an investment at a lower rate of interest than 6%. These bonds have been considered an Al investment. In fact, the issuingbank sold some of them at a premium. They have never defaulted.
- 5. By subscriptions. Some who have not given for this worthy work, or some who have pledged and paid their subscriptions in full, may wish to help with the remaining indebtedness. For convenience, a form is added which may be filled out and mailed to the Treasurer of Bethany Hall, Bible Institute, Fort Wayne, Ind.

It is our purpose to keep you as the constituency fully informed and to carry out your desire to liquidate the debt as soon as possible. We need your continued help.
