Falcons win NCCAA Division II crown



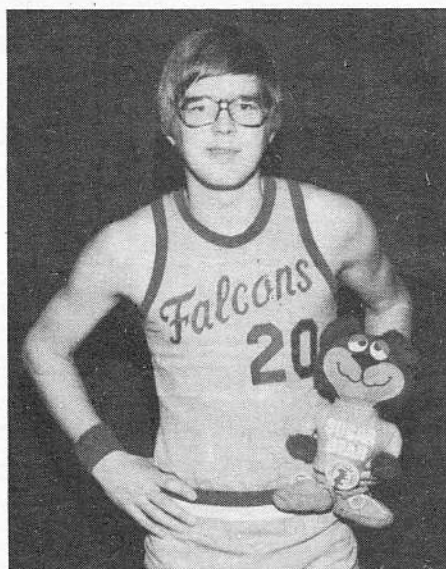

In an 81-80 cliffhanger, the Fighting Falcons of Fort Wayne Bible College edged out Baptist Bible College of Pennsylvania to capture the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) Division II Championship on Saturday, March 6.

The Falcons conquered Western Baptist on Friday night and went on to claim the national title the next night when Senior guard Scott Dell sank a shot with only seconds to play.

Senior Todd Habegger ended his impressive career at FWBC by adding still another trophy to his collection when he was named MVP of the NCCAA tournament. Todd was named outstanding Christian Athlete (Murchison Award) of the NCCAA last year.

Undefeated among the Bible Colleges of District III, the Falcons reached the national competition by rolling over Moody Bible Institute of Illinois in February to win first place in the Regional II contest. The three other regional victors who met at Clarks Summit for the national finals were: Baptist Bible College (PA) — Region I; Toccoa Falls Bible College (GA) — Region III; and Western Baptist Bible College (ORE) — Region IV.

Organized in 1968 and consisting of Christian colleges across the United States, the NCCAA functions to provide district, regional, and national basketball tournaments for its member schools. Last year, Division II of the NCCAA was instituted to give Bible colleges a separate national basketball tournament. This year's tournament in Clarks Summit was the first of its kind. It marked the completion of competition for the approximately 250 member Bible colleges.

Standard Bible Diploma program and is finding good support from the students.

The May Commencement will feature FWBC's largest graduating class with 82 receiving bachelor's degrees and 8 earning the Associate of Arts degree.

Chorale completes tour

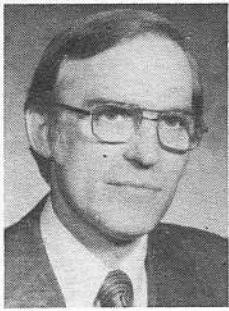

President's

perspective

Dr. Timothy Warner has served as President of Fort Wayne Bible College for the past five-plus years. Except for a three-year period spent as a missionary to Sierra Leone, Africa, Dr. Warner has been on the faculty of the college since 1953. He has been widely recognized as an outstanding leader in education.

Two especially exciting things are happening on the campus these days. One is WBCL, our 50,000-watt FM stereo radio station. Getting it on the air proved to be more complicated than we imagined, but now that it is a reality, the response is very gratifying. We have just begun to realize the potential of this new ministry, and we are looking to the future with keen anticipation.

The other exciting new dimension at the college is the development of an admissions program with the assistance of Stewart Weiner and Associates, Inc., of Chicago, professional consultants. One of the fringe benefits of the consultants' work is that we get to see ourselves through their eyes.

After their first two-day visit to the campus, Mr. Gene M. Henderson, one of their representatives, reported that they had never had a more positive initial experience with a client school. In connection with that visit, students filled out an eight-page questionnaire concerning themselves and their evaluation of their experience at Fort Wayne Bible College. When the people at the computer center began to feed the data from this survey into the computer, they encountered some difficulties knowing how to handle the frequent spiritual references. "God" had not been written into the computer program!

But when they were finished, they reported that they had never processed a set of questionnaires that were more completely, honestly, and sincerely filled in than those from our students. Mr. Henderson, in reporting the results of the survey to me, said that he could hardly believe the positiveness of the attitudes everywhere on campus.

This is his first experience with a Bible college, and his response so far is one of personal excitement. Other visitors to the campus, as well as those serving us in other professional capacities, report similar reactions.

There is evidence of God's leading and provision in the new admissions program, and we are expecting many positive results from it. The goal is not simply more students; it is to more successfully achieve the purposes for which Fort Wayne Bible College exists.

Thank you for your prayerful interest in this exciting phase of the Lord's work.

Rich Cook serves on the Education Committee of the Business Government division of the Chamber.

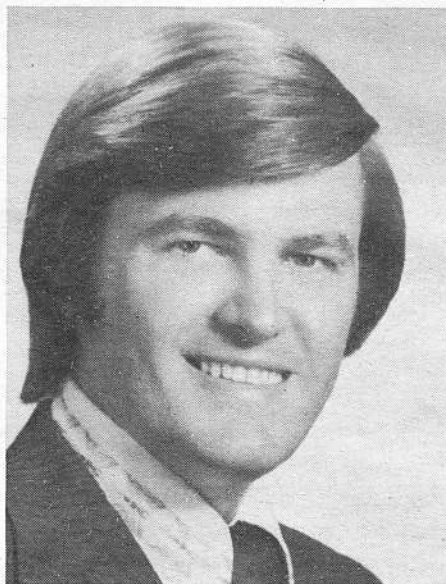
Suzuki Violinists to perform here

Dr. Clyde Taylor keynotes 'Issues' talks

On Wednesday, Mr. Daryl Cartmel, Chairman of the Missions Department of FWBC and citizen of Australia, challenged each student to realize the advantages of being an American citizen. To show the beauty and heritage of America, Mr. Cartmel followed his talk with a twelve-minute slide presentation accompanied by Bicentennial music.

With the entire FWBC family joining together on Thursday, faculty, staff, and students heard Dr. Warner illustrate how the Christian can become involved as a citizen. Through a slide presentation and Dr. Warner's challenge, those present heard that although each person is only one individual, there is something each one can do to shape the future of America.

FWBC receives equipment gifts

a high quality turntable, a Dolby cassette recorder, a reel-to-reel tape recorder, an amplifier, and two speakers that may be removed for wider sound coverage. The unit, which can be rolled from room to room, was greatly needed by the Department of Music for use in general music, theory, and history/literature classes.

Mr. and Mrs. William S. Mertz of Bowling Green, Ohio donated funds matched by The Andersons of Maumee, Ohio for the purchase of a fine Sohmer studio model piano. The instrument is a memorial to Fernleigh S. Mertz, who was William Mertz's father.

The third gift, a Stage brite Six solid state dimmer unit recently installed in Founders Auditorium, was made possible through a \$1,000 gift from the FWBC Student Association, a \$250 gift from the youth conference budget, and private gifts. Special features include a remote control unit, a two-scene pre-set, and a power capacity two and one half times greater than the previous system.

Youth Conference dates approach

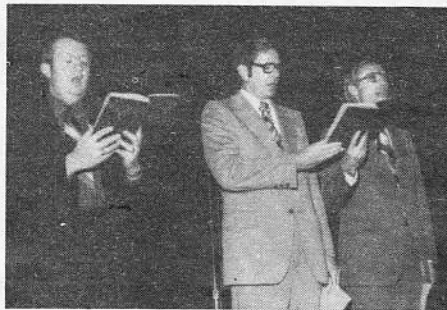

FWBC staff, students aid 'Hiding Place'

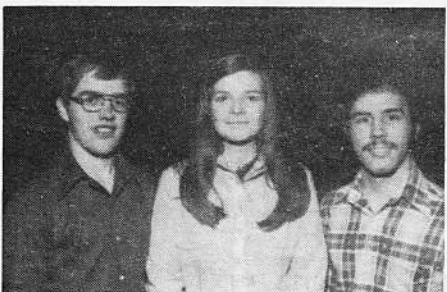

Mayor extends WBCL welcome

Well over 200 people attended the formal dedication of WBCL-FM, FWBC's 50,000-watt stereo radio station, on Sunday, February 15. Dr. Timothy Warner, President of Fort Wayne Bible College, served as Master of Ceremonies and introduced the various guest speakers.

Following the Invocation by Academic Dean Wesley Willis, The Honorable Robert Armstrong, Mayor of Fort Wayne, expressed the city's appreciation for the kind of program content scheduled for WBCL's output. Mr. Guy Ewing, General Manager of stations WFWR and WCMX-FM on whose tower WBCL's antenna is secured, added his congratulations and welcomed WBCL to the broadcasting community. WBCL Station Manager Mike Heuberger outlined the history, development, and future of the station.

D. Gene Williams, Director of Fort Wayne Bible College Fund, Inc., recognized the people who had provided much of the financial backing needed to put WBCL on the air. (The list of Co-Founders and Associate Founders appears elsewhere in this issue of PULSE.) FWBC's Chorale provided the musical highlight for the program with the selections "All Good Gifts" and "Reach Out and Touch."

The main address was delivered by Dr. Clyde W. Taylor, International Secretary of World Evangelical Fellowship and FWBC Board Member. He challenged all present to support the efforts of WBCL and to actively participate in public matters of concern to every Christian.

Led by Dr. Warner, the entire audience read the litany of dedication which committed WBCL to informing and uplifting its listeners through the scheduling of educational, cultural, news, public affairs, and inspirational programs. Further, the station is meant to share with the listeners the Good News of Jesus Christ and Christian discipleship through Biblical programming.

Following the dedicatory prayer by Board Chairman Dale O. Ferrier and the Benediction by College Relations Director Larry Miller, the WBCL staff greeted guests in an informal reception at the station studio facilities.

Dean's List taps 82 for top scholastic honors

Fort Wayne Bible College is proud of its tradition of high academic standards for its students. It is also proud of the academic achievements made by its students. At the end of each semester, the grade point averages of all students are computed by multiplying the grade numeral times the number of course credit hours, adding the total products, and dividing that total by the total number of credit hours attempted. (4 equals A, 3 equals B, 2 equals C, 1 equals D) Any student whose average is 3.35 or above (B plus) is considered to be an outstanding student and is recognized by the Academic Dean through the publishing of the Dean's List which follows. These students make up 13.75% of the current enrollment at FWBC.

At 8:00 p.m. Doug Oldham and the Speers will present a concert of inspirational sacred music.

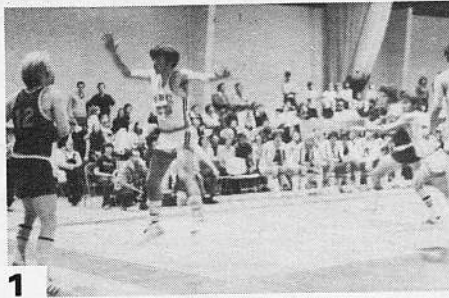

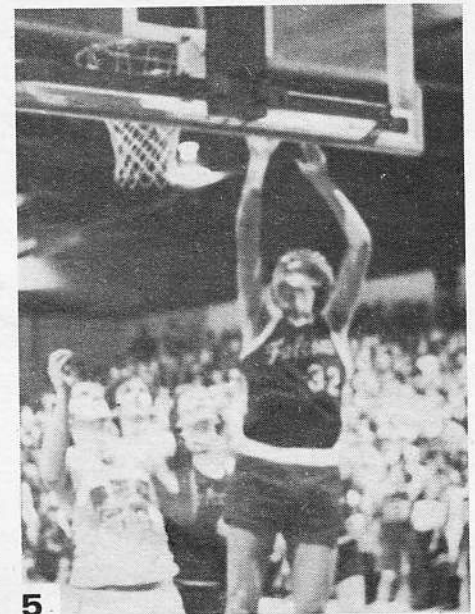

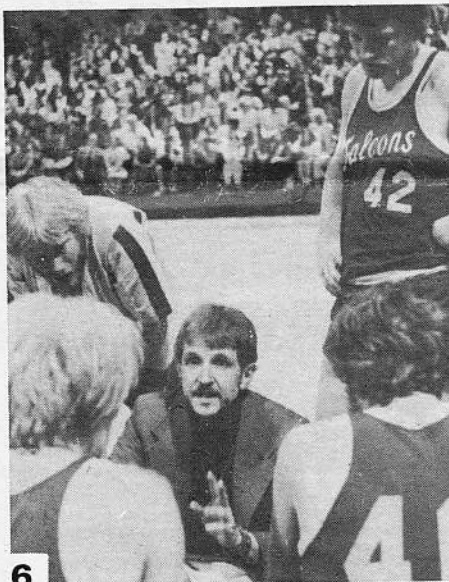
