Pinafore, Banquet cap spring events

Exposing social injustice based on an artificial class structure, *H.M.S. Pinafore* proved to be a delightful blend of music, entertainment, and social satire.

In a mockery of the custom of marital separation between social classes, Ralph Rackstraw (a lowly sailor played by Tom Nevil) is clapped in chains for trying to elope with Captain Corcoran's (Jeff Wells) daughter Josephine (Deb Lehman). When Buttercup (Gay McMichael) reveals that she, as nursemaid to both Ralph and Corcoran, switched families for them, Ralph immediately becomes Captain, and Josephine is suddenly the lower class daughter of a sailor.

With the folly of basing love on class distinction exposed, Ralph and Josephine become engaged, and Sir Joseph (Randy Grieser) chooses to wed his cousin Hebe (Flossie Johnson).

Not a melodrama at all, but rather a pleasant reality, the semi-formal Junior-Senior Banquet, titled "Impressions," took place at The Lantern. Banquet goers enjoyed a catered dinner, a slide show, and entertainment by Larnelle Harris.





Pastoral Ministries Department chairman Reverend Robert Strubhar addressed graduation candidates, parents, and friends on Sunday morning, May 15 at the annual Baccalaureate service. His topic was "God's Clouds Have Silver Linings."

Sunday afternoon's beautiful, unseasonably warm weather saw a record number of candidates receive degrees before an overflow crowd in Founders. Speaker Dr. Norman Geisler, chairman of the Division of Philosophy of Religion at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School of Deerfield, Illinois, earned the respect and admiration of all present. Dr. Geisler has received degrees from Wheaton College, Wheaton Graduate School, Detroit Bible College, and Loyola University (Ph.D.).

Mitchell assumes food management

Atlanta-born Frank Mitchell has replaced Carson Wells of Saga Food Service as FWBC's cafeteria director. Following Wells' promotion and subsequent move to Anderson College, Mitchell, who previously served Saga at Asbury College in Kentucky, took the reins at FWBC.

vania College, Mitchell taught biology for three years prior to going to work for the Ponderosa Steak House chain. Two years later (about a year ago) he went to work for Saga.

President's

perspective

Dr. Timothy Warner has served as President of Fort Wayne Bible College for the past five years. Except for a three year period spent as a missionary to Sierra Leone, Africa, Dr. Warner has been on the faculty of the college since 1953. He has been widely recognized as an outstanding leader in education.

"When I came here four years ago, I was a scared little girl. Now I have a faith that is strong and defensible and one that I can share with others," testified one of our May graduates one day in Chapel, and that is what Christian education is all about.

Many colleges today, under pressure from a society permeated by humanism, have rejected any responsibility for the lives of students outside the purely academic process in classrooms and laboratories. The idea that the college continues responsibility carried by the parents through high school for the total development of the student is generally considered passe in higher education.

I am happy to be able to say that such an idea is not passe at Fort Wayne Bible College. We still seek to relate to each student with a kind of parental concern for their growth as persons. This is not to say we treat them like children. We rather attempt to provide guidance and counsel appropriate to this stage of their growth into responsible adults.

Eighteen-year-olds are legally adults in many parts of the country today, but that does not mean they have achieved intellectual, emotional, social, and spiritual maturity. To assume that they have would be to leave many a "scared little girl" or "scared little boy" without the resources they would need at such a critical time in their lives. Since the college is an arm of the church and an extension of the family, it is our privilege to carry on the work which those institutions have begun. We have the joy of assisting the students in the maturation process and of seeing them come to the place where they are ready not only to live in the world as adults, but to minister to that world in the name of Christ.

Lest you think academics are unimportant at Fort Wayne Bible College, you would need only to talk with the students to discover that such is not the case. Even in the area of science, for example, our seniors score above the average for all college seniors across the country on standardized tests.

The father of a graduate gave a parent's view of all of this in a recent letter: "My wife and I are genuinely thankful for Fort Wayne Bible College. The atmosphere and instruction for our daughters have been everything we could have expected. God has put you in a large place. Stand firm and tall, unapologetically, as a school for the purpose of equipping youth for Christian living and ministry."

Don't you agree that this makes every investment in Fort Wayne Bible College worthwhile?



Variety of events place FWBC in news spotlight

Christian Service performing groups held an audience of about 500 virtually spellbound in a special end-of-the-year concert in Founders Auditorium late in March. Positive Side, Kindred, and Certain Sound offered selections from a broad repertoire of contemporary and standard religious music.

"Inside Out" was the theme of the 1977 Youth Conference which enrolled over 400 high school students for a weekend of fun and Christian study. Speaker John DeBrine inspired students to think seriously about turning their lives inside out in service to Christ.

Wrapping up a generally successful sports year, the athletic banquet saw awards go to more than 40 FWBC men and women who represented the college in tennis, volleyball, cheerleading, and basketball. Sophomore standout Steve Cochran received honors as MVP, best free throw shooter, best field goal percentage, leading rebounder, and leading scorer. Cochran is currently representing the college in a Ventures for Victory basketball tour through South America and the Caribbean. The crusade team plays two or three games each day for six weeks in Ecuador, Bolivia, Colombia, and the Dominican Republic. Cochran also was named to the first team in Fort Wayne All City College and District III of the National Christian College Athletic Association.

In a special ceremony chaired by Mrs. Eve Rickner, Fort Wayne Bible College received the Freedom's Foundation at Valley Forge Honor Certificate in the School Programs division of the Education category. Dr. Warner accepted the award which was presented by Mr. Dan Coats, assisted by Mrs. Harold Palmer, vice-president of the Fort Wayne Chapter.

FWBC hosted the area premier of the Francis Schaeffer film seminar "How Shall We Then Live," which was attended by about 200 persons.
