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Better Late Than Never. . .

There's a saying that "God holds us responsible not for what we are, but for what we could be." McArthur Wagstaff is one man who decided to go for the "could be."

Thirty-six years old, the father of three sons, working the night shift at a local discount store distribution center, director of Christian education and adult Sunday school teacher at Southern Heights Baptist Church...McArthur Wagstaff has also just completed work for his bachelor's degree in Christian education at Fort Wayne Bible College.

Reared in Uniontown, Alabama, McArthur became a Christian in 1954. He had a keen interest in Scripture and a desire to attend Bible school. But the funds just weren't there when he completed high school. He went to work, and later moved to Fort Wayne and settled here with his family. McArthur was working a day job and involved in a local church when, in 1973, friends urged him to attend an adult education class at FWBC. It didn't take much to whet his appetite. After a few evening courses, McArthur decided to pursue a full college education. There were no qualms about the extra responsibility or financial burden he'd be taking on, but he was a bit apprehensive about going back to school. "I'd been out of school for 12 years, I really wondered if I'd be able to cut it."

McArthur did "cut it." He graduated this past May with his bachelor of arts degree. And he's still not ready to settle back, but is heading for seminary. His goal is a pastoral ministry in the black community. He wants to help fill the need for educated black Christians who will serve in their own communities and relate to their own people. His FWBC training can help give him that edge. "I

wish more black people would come... it's needed...we've got to get the people to realize it," says McArthur.

Although he undoubtedly had to sacrifice some time with his three boys, McArthur's family doesn't seem to be suffering. His oldest son, age eleven, is already talking about coming to the Bible College! McArthur has also done some recruiting in his own neighborhood—encouraging friends to come to the Bible College and bringing them on campus to visit.

The many responsibilities, the financial pressures, tight schedules and sacrifices have done nothing to dampen McArthur's determination and enthusiasm. "I never thought of giving up," he says, "I just can't say enough about Fort Wayne Bible College. To study the Word of God

in a systematic way...it means everything to me, to know the Word of God, knowing that it's not just something written on a page but really means something. If I had to do it over, I wouldn't regret it."

At the recent alumni banquet the FWBC Alumni Association presented awards to three "outstanding seniors"... These were students whom they felt demonstrated exceptional leadership ability, determination, concern and a desire to share the Gospel in a practical way. It's apparent the alumni did their homework—McArthur Wagstaff was one of those three students honored. It was an award well-deserved by a man who isn't settling for what he was but is still becoming what he can be for the service of the Lord.

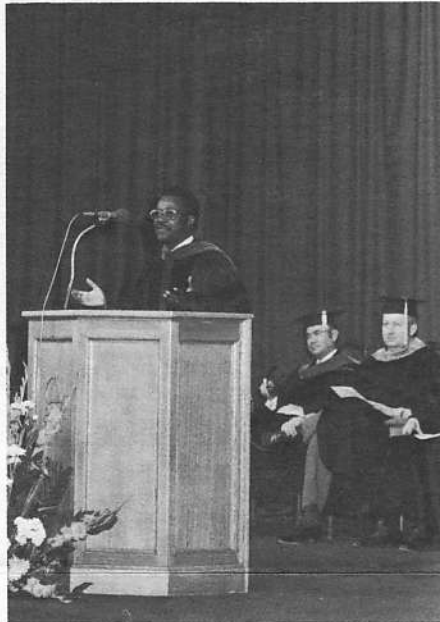

President Of First Missionary Church Of Nigeria Commencement Speaker

Dr. Jacob Bawa, the first president of the now independent United Missionary Church of Africa in Nigeria, presented the commencement address on May 13th at Fort Wayne Bible College.

Dr. Bawa, a leader in Nigerian religious education, came to know the Lord through the ministry of FWBC alumni serving as missionaries to Nigeria. He recently completed the doctor of philosophy degree at Michigan State University. Also a graduate of several other prominent colleges in the U.S. and Nigeria, Dr. Bawa supplemented his early college education with correspondence courses from FWBC.

Addressing a crowd of over 1200, Dr. Bawa said, "We are thankful to God for

giving us a school that is Christ-centered... an institution that I, personally, will never forget." He also challenged the graduating class to make a full commitment to the Lord. "You are now representatives of the Lord Jesus Christ. You are ambassadors going out into the world to put into practice what you have learned."

The inspiring words of Dr. Jacob Bawa...eighty enthusiastic graduates...a multitude of parents, friends, and faculty...and a sparkling spring day made Commencement 1979 a memorable occasion in Fort Wayne Bible College history and an occasion for new beginnings around the world.

'I Heard It In The Newspaper'

WBCL radio is pleased to be participating in the Northeast Indiana Radio Reading Service. This unique service to the blind reaches a 21-county area in northeast Indiana and northwest Ohio. It offers programs of local interest, including the reading of local newspapers from front page to back, complete with the advertisements.

The radio reading service is operated and funded by the Fort Wayne Public Library and the Anthony Wayne Rehabilitation Center. WBCL is providing the transmitter facilities and the use of a sub-carrier frequency of the station's signal. The service now operates for 10 to 12 hours each day, but future plans include 24-hour operation and additional variety in programming. With over 28,500 blind persons within WBCL's signal area, this service can have a valuable impact. Thanks to the reading service corporation, the many volunteer readers, and WBCL, listeners really are able to say "I heard it in the newspaper."

The Central District of the Missionary Church has made special contributions from the District Treasury of \$13,000 to the Bible College during the course of this school year. Ten thousand dollars of this amount came by vote of the District Conference at its meeting on May 1.



President's perspective

Dr. Timothy Warner has served as President of Fort Wayne Bible College for the past seven years. Except for a three year period spent as a missionary to Sierra Leone, Africa, Dr. Warner has been on the faculty of the college since 1953. He has been widely recognized as an outstanding leader in education.

One of my favorite activities is showing a first-time visitor around the campus, especially Witmer Hall and the library.

Unfortunately, most people do not expect us to have such outstanding educational facilities. They are surprised to discover bright, attractive classrooms equipped with overhead projectors and TV monitors. The audio visual center with its remote control video tape system always arouses interest. Television cameras can be placed in the classroom to record the student(s) in action. They can then see themselves on the TV monitor. It is a great learning tool for future preachers and teachers.

The well-equipped science lab gives evidence of creative use by the students. It is perhaps the finest lab in any Bible College in the country, and Dr. Robert Hughes has developed a science program uniquely fitted for our students. The large tiered lecture room across the hall with its multi-colored seats serves not only for science lectures but for many other classes as well.

In the music department a 12-unit electronic piano laboratory makes possible a unique teaching and learning situation. Through the use of headsets the instructor may listen to or communicate with any one or all of the students simply by pushing the right switches on the master unit.

In the library more than 50,000 volumes are available as a primary educational resource, and pleasant surroundings contribute to a positive atmosphere for study.

I guess the point to all of this is that visitors leave the campus with a new appreciation for the quality of the educational program at the college. They know that Fort Wayne Bible College is indeed a college.

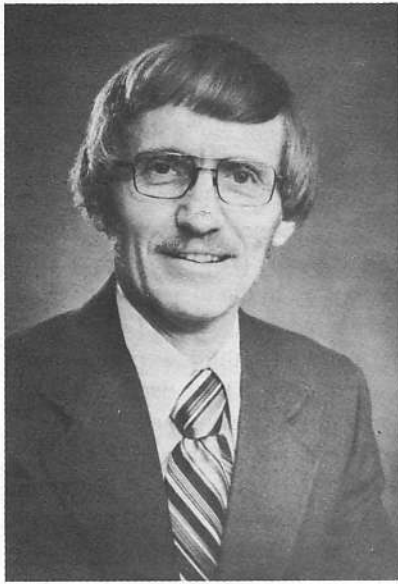

Statistics Speak For Students

Numbers may not say it all, but the statistics do say a great deal about the FWBC student body. The total enrollment for the '78-'79 school year was 565 (241 men, 234 women). Of those 565 students, 44% were in the top fourth of their high school graduating class. 173 of the students, nearly one-third, were from the Missionary Church. Other denominations with large representations included Christian and Missionary Alliance (50), United Methodist (33), and Evangelical Mennonite (30). Students also represented five foreign countries and a wide cross-section of states. Of the 23 states represented, the predominant home states were Indiana (335), Ohio (93), Illinois (31), Michigan (23), Pennsylvania (20), and Hawaii (8). So, while the numbers may not give you a personal introduction to every FWBC student, the statistics do show that they are of a consistently high scholastic caliber whatever their background.

Fall Concerts Scheduled

The FWBC Student Association promises a fall concert lineup worth singing about. Bringing a breath of fresh music to September, popular recording artist Christine Wyrzten will be in concert on **September 1st** at 8 p.m. On **September 28th** you can enjoy the southern gospel sound of The Blackwoods. And, by popular demand, the Sharretts will be back for a concert on **November 10th**. They'll be joined by David Meece with contemporary Christian music everyone can appreciate. A-V Prof And Family Experience Missions In Action

As Director of Instructional Services for FWBC, Grant Hoatson is an obvious advocate of audio-visual teaching aids. So, when Grant and his family wanted to learn more about missions, it seemed only natural to use an A-V object lesson. Rather than relying on projectors and recorders, however, the Hoatson family decided to study their subject in action! On June 9th, all five family members left Fort Wayne for two months in Quito, Ecuador where they will be working with HCJB... a group of short wave radio stations broadcasting the Gospel in many languages to all the continents of the world.

"We wanted the kids to see missions in action, and participate, so they would be more open to the call of God for full-time missionary service if that is God's will for them," Grant explained. "And the exposure to a new culture will be an enriching experience for all of us."

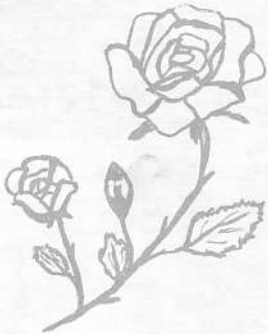
All of the Hoatson family will be actively involved in the Quito ministry. Grant will be working with Bob Weyeneth, who first urged him to come to Quito. "Bob has about two years of work for me to do in two months," Grant reported. He'll be putting his talents to use in layout and photojournalism, brochure work, slide-sets, and magazine articles. His wife, Patti, a teacher at Fort Wayne Christian School, will be doing secretarial work for HCJB. Daughter, Robin, who will be a freshman in missionary nursing at FWBC next fall, will work at HCJB's Hospital Vozandes. Sons, Kirk (15) and Todd (13), will either work at the hospital or at the HCJB complex.

The Hoatson family plan to report back regularly by mail during their two-month stay. WBCL will also be doing a telephone interview with Grant speaking live from Quito.

WBCL's second annual fishing derby was held on July 9th as a part of Fort Wayne's Three Rivers Festival Week. An estimated 4000 participants, from toddlers to teens, cast their lines in the Franke Park pond in hopes of a nibble

and a prize. The entire WBCL staff, plus dozens of volunteer helpers, oversaw the fishing derby. This annual event serves a double purpose in providing entertainment for the community and exposure for the radio station's ministry.

S A's Are Ok!

At Fort Wayne Bible College a dorm is much more than just a place to live. A carefully selected and well-trained staff makes every effort to create a home-like atmosphere, provide meaningful activities, and be available for counseling -- or just a good conversation. Each of the large dorms has a full-time Resident Adviser and several Student Advisers (SA's). Being selected to serve as an SA is quite an honor. This year 36 applied to fill 18 positions. Between now and next fall when classes begin, those who are selected will go through this process:

1. submit a written application
2. provide a reference (one each from a faculty member, student, Resident Adviser and current Student Adviser)
3. take two psychological tests
4. take a test which measures ability to use the Bible in counseling

5. complete a summer training packet (involves Scripture memorization, Bible studies and the reading of books)
6. return early next fall for a 2½ day training retreat away from campus.

Most students agree that the training received and the ministry involved in being an SA is worth the effort. And you can rest assured that quality upper-class students have been selected and trained to help your young people receive the most from dorm life at Fort Wayne Bible College. No wonder living on campus is considered such an important part of the college experience.

Color It Quality

Many things contribute to offering quality education. One such aspect was brought to my attention recently while teaching at both FWBC and another much larger Christian college.

As an instructor in Christian Education, I often use visual aids, such as projectors and screens. I have learned to appreciate the audiovisual department at FWBC.

From the efficient system of equipment requisition to the set up and testing of that equipment - whether it is a 16mm film, an opaque projector, or sound equipment - I know I can count on its being there ready for my use.

At the other college not only is the equipment limited and often antiquated, but each professor is responsible to secure his own on a very inefficient "first-come, first-served" basis.

I also wish to "sing the praises" of the capable FWBC library staff. The Instructional Materials Center provides both teacher and student an almost unlimited supply of curricular resources, visual aids, and supplementary materials and equipment. Some colleges twice the size of FWBC do not have one-half these resources. Staff, constituency, and God each need to be thanked and appreciated for helping FWBC offer "quality education." And a rose each to Grant Hoatson, Director of Instructional Services, and Rose Ann Nickel, Director of the Instructional Materials Center.

FWBC Students Spend Summer Exporting Sunshine

When FWBC students say they're spending the summer abroad...chances are they're not going just to soak up sunshine and local culture. They may be building a church, bandaging a wound, dribbling a basketball, or delivering a sermon.

This summer, eight Fort Wayne Bible College students are dedicating their time and talents to short-term missionary service. Although most of the students didn't leave until June, their work began months ago with letter-writing, speaking engagements and part-time jobs. Each student was responsible for raising his own support and securing a passport.

Dan Burkey - of Howe, Indiana, will be in Ecuador working with Missionary Church representative, Paul Erdel. He will be helping with construction work and the teaching ministry. A pastoral ministries major, Dan was graduated from FWBC in May.

Carol Deemer - of Traverse City, Michigan, will have an opportunity to put her missionary nursing major into practice in Bolivia. She will be spending six weeks

assisting missionary nurses as a member of the Gospel Missions Summer Career Corps. Carol will be a senior at FWBC this Fall.

Karen Gerig - of Allentown, Pennsylvania, is bound for the Dominican Republic to work with the Missionary Church. A Christian education major in her third year at FWBC, Karen will be helping with VBS, camp, and office work.

Mark Hostetler - of Fort Wayne, is going to Ecuador, Peru, and Paraguay with Sports Ambassadors. He'll be playing basketball and sharing with the nationals through singing, preaching and one-to-one interaction. Mark is a missions major and will be a sophomore this fall.

Ann Krenrick - of Loudenville, Ohio, will serve with Alliance Youth Corps. A senior, majoring in Christian education and missions, she will be teaching VBS and working in the Inter-Missions business office.

Greg Lehr - of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, is switching from the role of student to the role of teacher for the summer. He'll be serving with the Language Institute for (con't. on page 7)

Practice (plus performance) Makes Perfect

Developing solo performance skills is a process many of us have faced at one time or another. Solo performance means feeling vulnerable, fulfilled, or frustrated—plus a lot of hard work. The Department of Music strives to serve not only the music majors and minors, but the entire student body, by offering a wide range of private lessons.

Students enrolled in the bachelor of music program are asked to give both junior and senior recitals. Besides these recitals, periodic general student recitals give opportunity for all students who are studying privately to perform.

In addition to these, students are given opportunities to perform in the performance class, studio recitals, and applied evaluations. Performance Class meets ten or twelve times during the semester for students to listen to each other perform on an informal basis. For these performances music does not have to be memorized; in fact sections of music can be played to work out the bugs in order for students to get used to the pressure of other people listening. A studio recital is a recital called by an individual instructor and usually attended by his or her students who perform for one another. The applied evaluation is conducted at the end of every semester by the music faculty for the purpose of hearing and evaluating (non-graded) the progress of each of the students on their major performing instrument.

The development of musicianship and technique is a constant challenge. Through these performance opportunities, our students enlarge their understanding and experience. PULSE readers are welcome to attend these events without charge.

Students Who Play Hooky

Fort Wayne Bible College has nearly 2,000 students who rarely set foot on campus or in a classroom...but they're not playing hooky. These students behind the scenes are learning and growing through the courses offered by the Department of Correspondence Studies. And, the department is growing and developing along with the students!

A NEW EMPLOYEE, Deb Lehman, is working for the department this summer. Deb is a senior at FWBC and will be graduated next winter with a bachelor of music degree.

A NEW LOOK offers correspondence students more attractive syllabi, since courses are now being printed instead of mimeographed.

A NEW RECORD was broken in the month of May. It was the highest income month ever in the history of the correspondence department.

And, although statistics and improvements are a definite sign of growth, the greatest encouragement is still student input. The following are excerpts of letters from two correspondence students--

FROM A PRISONER — *"I looked for two years before I found you people at FWBC and I will pay for the tuition on all the classes when I am able because I have truly appreciated the opportunity you have given me in Christian kindness...the first I ever encountered, I might add."*

FROM A MISSIONARY — *"Praise the Lord for the vision FWBC has to help his servants upgrade and improve their ministries. I have benefited and been stimulated in the studies which were very relevant to my ministries here in Kenya. May the Lord continue to bless you and the school in the very important ministry of teaching others to teach the Word of God."*
