"An Urgency Within"

"For I know the plans I have for you... to give you a future and a hope." (Jeremiah 29:11). Harold Max Hughes didn't plan to go to college at the age of forty-three. He didn't plan to be a missionary to the Philippines, either. But the Lord had plans for him far beyond anything he had ever considered.

This year Max is a student at Fort Wayne Bible College, studying for an Associate of Arts degree in missions. He is an ambitious, dedicated student; but his commitment goes deeper than the books, classes, or even the degree. He is working toward a specific goal and calling. After three months of evangelistic work in the Philippines this summer, Max says, "This is the burden of my heart...the Lord is returning soon. There is an urgency within me to get back to the Philippines because I saw what the Lord is doing there, what's to be done, and what we must do now."

Max hasn't always had this "urgency within." Only during this past year has God's plan unfolded, leading him to the Bible College and into missionary service. But God had been working in his life for many years. Twice, as a teenager, he went forward at youth meetings. The minister, however, failed to explain the plan of salvation and Max was too embarrassed to ask questions. "It wasn't until I was 25 years old the Lord saved me. I was working in a factory in Kokomo...I don't know what the date was or the day...but I can show you the place and tell you the time. I started to take some film to the darkroom and just in the matter of a step, the Lord convicted me of my sin...I realized I was a sinner and He saved me. The Bible says the Lord will come in the twinkling of an eye, well, He saved me just that quickly, too ... and I'm sure of it."

In time, Max entered the pastorate and served in several Indiana churches. But the Lord had additional plans for his ministry. A sequence of events turned his life around, opening new doors of service. The lingering illness and subsequent death of his wife brought Max into contact with Grace Tingson, a Philippino nurse at University Hospital in Indianapolis. Touched by her kindness during his wife's illness. he later invited her to dinner. "...and we've been going to dinner together ever since," explains Max. He and Grace have now been married for five years and have a three-year-old son, Shaun, in addition to Max's daughter, Cindy (14), and son, Allen (23).

Grace is the daughter of Greg Tingson, founder and president of Asian Christian Outreach (ASCO). ASCO is an interdenominational mission that concentrates on evangelism, church planting, and community concern in the Philippines and other Asian countries. Grace spent most of her life in the Philippines and now is able to help Max make the cultural adjustments for missionary service. "Along with her work as a registered nurse, Grace has a very strong supportive ministry encouraging me. She was the one, along with the Lord, who encouraged me to come to school...something I never would have considered a few years ago."

When Max completes his schooling, the Hughes will go back to the Philippines. Greg Tingson will come to the U.S. for a time of refreshment at Fuller Seminary. "My heart is in evangelism and the crusades," says Max. "Some villages have never had a crusade and have no protestant church. But one thing has really encouraged me...the Christian young people, and some of the older ones, are taking the burden away from the American missionaries. They're evangelizing their own people...sending missionaries to other Asian countries where we can't get in. I feel a compulsion of the Holy Spirit to do all I can to further the cause of Christ there and to finish my education here as soon as I can."

In spite of Max's apparent eagerness to leave Fort Wayne Bible College, he is glad to be here. He realizes it is an important part of God's plan for his ministry. The Hughes visited FWBC before going to the Philippines this summer. "We were impressed with what we saw, with what we felt. Here was a place the Lord was honored and education was really stressed in a spiritual Christian atmosphere. While we were in the Philippines, the Lord constantly reaffirmed that this was where we were to be and that I was to come back here to finish my education."

Max had some previous college education, but most of his training came from practical experience. "I wouldn't trade my practical experience. I've worked under some tremendous men of God...but sometimes I look at myself and feel so inadequate. The Lord has proven that when we give His Word in its simplicity, He honors this . . . we saw that in the Philippines. . . but now I feel a need to better prepare myself to serve the Lord."

A full-time class load, a job as bus driver for the Fort Wayne Public Schools, and missionary deputation keep Max busy. And he admits the studies are more difficult after so many years away from school. Although he advocates education at any age, Max is quick to encourage the young people. "I would challenge Christian young people to get their education now, even if they're not certain what they want to get into...even if they have just a basic feel for Christian service. Don't put it off. I can't emphasize that enough. I'm experiencing what putting off can do... it's hard."

While he may have put off his college education, the Lord is still fulfilling His plan for Max's life. And, while studies and college life can often be more difficult for the older student, Max has several advantages. His dedication and sureness of purpose, his goal of missions service, and his commitment to Christ more than balance the scales. Realizing God's plan for his life, studying to "show himself approved," and answering to that "urgency within," Max will be able to share God's plan with others... assuring them, too, of a future and a hope.

That man is of most use to the world who gives himself most freely to God for God's use.



President's

perspective

Dr. Timothy Warner has served as President of Fort Wayne Bible College for the past seven years. Except for a three year period spent as a missionary to Sierra Leone, Africa, Dr. Warner has been on the faculty of the college since 1953. He has been widely recognized as an outstanding leader in education.

They are very human though, and they need your prayer support as they seek to keep up with daily schedules and the pressure of academic work. Rejoice with us that such fine young people are still making themselves available to the Lord for His service.

The faculty came together for two days of retreat before the students arrived, and those days were also characterized by expectancy and warmth as we shared times of devotion, discussion, business, and fun together. They brought a wide variety of summer experiences to enrich our fellowship and to enrich their teaching.

Summer slump ... what's that? WBCL encouraged listeners to pray for him and his family, and to send cards to Shannon in the hospital. The Lord heard the prayers of WBCL listeners, FWBC faculty and staff members, and other friends of the Gangwers. Shannon was able to have the required operations sooner than expected and was released from the hospital after only two weeks. During his hospital stay the WBCL staff and FWBC Communications Department staff visited Shannon and presented him with an electronic football game. At latest report he is doing well, and is also on his way to becoming an electronic football pro!


Jim Hurtsellers, a 17-year-old part-time employee of WBCL, fell from a bridge in Fort Wayne's Foster Park on August 20. He sustained five broken bones in his back and a puncture in the lower back causing internal injuries. Doctors gave Jim little hope of ever walking again. WBCL and Fort Wayne Bible College



immediately called for the prayer support of listeners and friends. Personal friends of the Hurtsellers visited the hospital and prayed with Jim. Less than two weeks after the accident, Jim telephoned WBCL, and listeners were able

to hear the firsthand report of what the doctors called a miracle. Jim is walking again and was released from the hospital just 11 days after the accident. Because of the Hurtsellers' family situation. WBCL also started a fund to defray Jim's hospital bills. Betty Hurtsellers, Jim's mother, has suffered four heart attacks in the past two years and is currently unemployed. Mr. Hurtsellers is deceased. WBCL listeners, friends, FWBC faculty, staff and administration have contributed \$4,028 to date. Jim is now home. He is recovering well, but will be wearing a back brace for the next year.

The State of the Doctorates

Over forty percent of the FWBC faculty either have or are in the process of completing doctoral degrees. Six professors are currently pursuing doctorates. Their progress ranges from halfway there to pushing the last mile of completing that awesome final project - - - the dissertation. The work is hard, the hours long, the schedule hectic. But there's probably nothing to match the feeling of satisfaction and accomplishment when the tasks are completed and the victory won! Daryl Cartmel, associate professor of missions, is writing his dissertation on cross-cultural relationships in the church for a doctor of missiology degree from the School of World Missions, Fuller Theological Seminary. Daryl was on sabbatical in 1977 and has completed his classwork and examinations. He hopes to finish all degree work by next summer. Sterling Demond, assistant professor of Christian education, is working toward a doctor of ministries degree related to pastoral ministry and college teaching in that field. He will receive his degree from Luther Rice Seminary in Jacksonville, Florida. He is involved in teaching and preaching ministries, administration work. extension course work, and the writing of his dissertation on "Principles of Preaching." Sterling hopes to complete his studies by January of 1980.

Ted Nickel, associate professor of education, has completed his residency requirements for a Ph.D. in higher education from Walden University. He is now working on his dissertation, entitled "An Evaluation of Field Work Experience for Teacher Education Students in an Urban Youth Training Program." He plans to finish his thesis by the end of this school year.

Jay Platte, associate professor of music, is pursuing a doctor of arts degree in music with emphases in conducting and (continued on page 6)

(continued from page 5) music education in higher education. He began his studies in the summer of 1978. Jay plans to complete his class work by the end of the summer of 1980 and his dissertation by the end of the '80 - '81 school year. He will take a part-year sabbatical second semester of this school year to fulfill residency requirements at Ball State University. Ira Gerig will assume some of Jay's responsibilities as music department chairman and will also direct Chorale second semester. Robert Strubhar, associate professor of pastoral ministry, is completing a doctor of ministry degree from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School. He has been studying for his doctorate since July of 1977 and will conclude his work this December. His studies have included course work, a major project, and eight "mini-projects" based on seminars. Alice Joy Weddle, assistant professor of elementary education, is on full sabbatical this year. She is presently fulfilling residency requirements at Ball State University for a doctor of education degree in reading, with cognates in elementary education and special education. She hopes to complete her course work by the end of next summer and her dissertation sometime in 1981. Alice Joy currently has a fellowship at Ball State and is teaching reading and study skills to college students.

It takes more than a sharp mind to get a doctoral degree. On top of studies, papers, projects, and exams, candidates must also juggle their work load, family responsibilities, and other obligations. But, along with the work come many rewards. Each candidate has expressed a new realization of God's faithfulness and a new appreciation of family and friends. Family support is a special blessing. The support of fellow faculty and staff members is also greatly valued as it enables them to pursue new goals for God's glory and the betterment of Fort Wayne Bible College.

Passing Through



Although vacationing students, faculty and staff members were greatly missed during the summer, at least no cobwebs gathered in their absence. It was a good summer at Fort Wayne Bible College as we had the privilege of accomodating fellow Christians and friends who were passing through.

In July, the Elliott Baptist Church Youth Choir was "just passing through" on summer tour and bedded down for one night on campus. LIGHT, an eleven member contemporary Christian music ensemble, made BC home base for a week in August as they held concerts in the Fort Wayne area. And, for three days in August, the entire campus rang with the enthusiasm of over 80 kids, sponsors, and assorted fans who came for the Missionary Church International Bible Quiz Finals. Eleven teams from the U.S. and Canada were on hand. Most stayed in Lexington dorm and ate their meals in the campus cafeteria (giving the cafeteria staff a chance to warm-up for the school year). Classrooms in Witmer Hall were used for the competition.

The college facilities were also used for special concerts and speakers. The Continentals, an internationally acclaimed Christian recording group, held an outdoor concert in July. The concert was held on the lawn behind Witmer Hall and was sponsored by First Missionary Church. In August, local congressman Dan Quayle spoke to over 100 people who attended a "town meeting" held in Founders Auditorium. Wycliffe Associates also utilized the BC facilities in August for a planning committee meeting which was held in Witmer Hall.

Creation-Evolution Debate

STANDING ROOM ONLY

Those who came expecting a Bible-thumping sermon on creation or an ironclad, irrefutable case for evolution were in for a surprise. But, whatever their expectations, over 500 spectators filled the fellowship hall of First Missionary Church for the creation-evolution debate sponsored by Fort Wayne Bible College in July. The audience spilled into the aisles and hallways. Some stood for the duration of the three-hour debate.

Dr. Duane Gish, biochemist and assistant director of the Institute for Creation Research in San Diego, California, presented the creationist view. His presentation was based on scientific rather than Scriptural evidences. This approach proved effective in demonstrating the compatability of science and Scripture without the aid of "religious" idioms or interpretations.

Dr. Vincent D'Orazio, a physical chemist with Johnson Wax Company of Racine, Wisconsin, presented the case for evolution. Although undoubtedly an intelligent man and respected scientist, Dr. D'Orazio's presentation was unorganized and frequently discursive. It was a poor match for Gish's polished address which included a slide presentation, well-documented quotes, and scientific data.

Dr. D'Orazio's weak presentation placed Dr. Gish and creationism in a particularly favorable light, destroying what balance there might have been between the two positions. Dr. D'Orazio's spirits were high, in spite of his difficulties. He claimed to enjoy the confrontations (this was not his first debate with Dr. Gish) and urged the audience to arrange additional debates in their communities.

Whatever the shortcomings of the debate, a great deal of interesting and educational information was presented by both sides. The following quotes were taken directly from the debate:



ON EVOLUTION — Dr. D'Orazio - - We never get to the point where we're 100% certain about any particular scientific concept because there is always more to know, always more to learn. We don't say that the theory of evolution is complete. But our level of confidence is quite high.

I don't have the answers as to how matter or energy came into existence, no one does. I don't think we'll ever have the answer because what you have to do is take nothing and turn it into something...and who can conceive of that on a scientific basis?

Dr. Gish-- Evolution is the theory that the universe and all it contains arose from the same beginning. . . molecule to man, or what I like to call fish to Gish. Everyone must have some world view and creationism is no more a science or a religion than is evolutionism.

Evolution is the dogma of athiesm, agnosticism and humanism.

It is 20th century mythology.

Evolutionists believe in evolution not because of the evidence, but in spite of the evidence.

If these people had a case they'd just lay out the facts and let the facts speak for themselves.



ON CREATION - Dr. D'Orazio - -

The creation model is based on fallacious, distorted science.

I'm going to question the Bible, but I'm going to question it scientifically and not on a religious basis. I have great respect for the Bible. I'm not going to say I'm a Christian, but I have reverence and respect for the Bible as I do many other books.

One thing about the creation modeleverything has to fit. You can't show one exception, it has to be perfect. There has been a perversion of science by creationists to make it fit.

On the third day we had plants formed, on the fourth day we had the sun, the moon and the stars. Explain to me how we could have plants when we know that plants can grow only by photosynthesis.

Dr. Gish -- The natural universe could not have created itself, there are natural laws that say it cannot happen.

The world was brought into being by direct fiat acts of creation by a creator.

When we look at all the natural lawsthe laws of thermodynamics, the laws of probability, all of the facts of genetics and when we look at the actual historical record, the fossil record, we see that the facts contradict the idea of a naturalistic, mechanistic origin of our universe and the things it contains. I believe that the only scientific statement that we can make about the origin of these things is, "In the beginning God created..."

We're more than the mechanistic product of a mindless universe. We do have a creator God. ■

Jared F. Gerig — 50 Years of Faithful Service and Still Going Strong



It has been said that faith bears three fruits - - - vision, venture, and victory.
Dr. Jared F. Gerig's fifty years of faithful service has produced a bountiful harvest wherever the Lord has led.
Today, Fort Wayne Bible College still reaps the benefits of his ministry.

From 1958 to 1971 Dr. Gerig served as president of the Bible College. His administration was one of great vision, new ventures, and victories in the name of the Lord. During his presidency, student enrollment grew from 345 to 602. The faculty grew from 15 to 41 members and 33 new staff members were added. Lehman Memorial Library, Lexington dormitory, and Witmer Hall were constructed. Schultz Hall and Bethany Hall were remodeled. New departments and offices were created. The Department of Correspondence Studies grew from 8 courses with 50 enrollees to 80 courses with over 820 enrollees.

Dr. Gerig's ties with FWBC can be traced back to his own student days. Born and reared in the Fort Wayne area, he attended the college in the 1920's and graduated in 1929. His wife, Mildred (Eicher '28) is also a graduate. The Gerigs were married in 1929 and in the same year began a pastoral ministry at a small church in Auburn, Indiana. Since then, Dr. Gerig has pastored churches in Indiana, Ohio, California, and Arizona. Over the years, he continued his education at Malone College, Cleveland State University, Arizona State University, and the University of California. He also holds an honorary doctorate from Wheaton College.

From 1945 to 1950 Jared Gerig served as dean of Fort Wayne Bible College, and from 1950 to 1952 as dean of Azusa Pacific College. In 1952 he was elected president of the Missionary Church Association. He

held this office until 1958 when he became president of FWBC. During his administration at the Bible College he also served two years as president of the National Association of Evangelicals. Other positions held include: vice president of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, editor of "The Missionary Worker," and visiting professor at the American Institute of Holy Land Studies in Jerusalem. Dr. Gerig has also spoken and traveled extensively in 35 countries and has, with his wife, led four tours to the Holy Land. Mildred Gerig has played a large part in their ministry through the years.

The Gerigs have three children: Gwendolyn Riewald; Dr. Wesley Gerig ('51), chairman of the FWBC department of Biblical studies; Reverend William D. Gerig ('61), former missionary to West Africa and current assistant overseas director of the Missionary Church.

In 1971 Dr. Jared Gerig resigned from the presidency of FWBC and was appointed chancellor. Since that time close ties have been maintained between the Gerig's and the FWBC family. After his resignation, Dr. Gerig returned to the pastoral ministry. He served as pastor of the Van Nuys Missionary Church in California for several years.

In 1976, the Gerigs moved to Arizona with intentions of retiring. They now reside in Glencroft, a retirement community in Glendale, Arizona... but are far from retired. The Grace Bible Church of Sun City called Dr. Gerig to the pastorate once again. They have been serving there since 1978. Jared Gerig's ministry is still going strong and bearing the fruits of faithfulness.



principal of Jamaica Theological

have served under the Missionary Church
in Jamaica for 25 years.

Fort Wayne Bible College continues to be an important influence in their lives,

as they influence the lives of others through their ministry in Jamaica.

They serve with TEAM in France and are involved in evangelism and church planting in the greater Paris area. Their ministry also includes counseling, teaching theological education extension courses, children's clubs, women's meetings, and youth groups.

Prior to their ministry in France, the Petersons served for seven years in the former Belgian Congo (now Zaire) until expelled in 1960. They have been in France since 1962.
