Dr. Timothy Warner Submits Resignation

At the fall meeting of the governing board, Monday, November 19, Dr. Warner submitted his resignation as president of Fort Wayne Bible College.

In his letter Dr. Warner stated as the effective date of his resignation "December 31, 1980, or at any prior date at which mutually agreeable transfer of office may be effected."

Coming to the college as dean of men in 1953, Dr. Warner has, except for three years of missionary service in Sierra Leone, served here in various capacities since that time. Subsequent to holding the position as dean of men, he has been dean of students, faculty member, chairman of the department of missions, and academic dean. He was appointed the fourth president of the college in 1971.

Stating his continued interest in seeing the college prosper as a significant institu-

tion of higher education in the Fort Wayne community, Dr. Warner said, "I assure you that there will be no slackening of pace during the remaining months in office. Every effort will be made to see the programs and purposes of the college move forward according to plan."

The governing board accepted Dr. Warner's resignation, expressing appreciation for his years of dedicated service. A search committee will be appointed immediately in order that a new president be secured as quickly as possible.

J. E. Ramseyer served as president of FWBC from 1912 to 1944. He was followed by Dr. S. A. Witmer, whose term of service was from 1945 to 1957. Dr. Jared F. Gerig was appointed president 1958 and served until he retired in 1971.

New Academic Programs

FWBC is in the process of adding several new academic majors and minors to its curricular offerings. Business administration and social work will be offered as four-year degree programs. Youth ministries, camping, Christian counseling, broadcasting, creative writing, drama, and secretarial science are being introduced as academic minor programs. Most of these new offerings will be available to students for the fall 1980 semester.

These programs will all be offered from a perspective consistent with the Bible college philosophy and mission statement. This means, simply stated, that the college views as its primary purpose the training of men and women for service in church and parachurch vocations. All of the new majors and minors are being offered in response to the repeated calls for them by various service organizations.

The Bible college is also in the process of rearranging the curriculum into a total program of majors and minors. In addition to the new programs, most current academic major offerings will also be available as minors. Dr. Warner, Dr. Hovee, Dr. Jacobsen, Mr. Strubhar, and their wives attended the thirty-third annual meeting of the American Association of Bible Colleges. Three days of meetings were held October 25 - 27 in Arlington Heights, Illinois. Dr. Warner, current vice-president and president-elect of the AABC presided over several sessions.

Once again, Fort Wayne Bible College participated in the Allen-Wells Chapter American Red Cross Blood Drive. This year's donor goal was 100. With 160 participating, we reached 160% of our goal! The students, faculty, and staff did a commendable job and set a fine example for the Fort Wayne community. Lenora Cushing, resident advisor of Bethany dorm, and Jonathon Spyker, vice-president of Student Association, attended the Red Cross recognition luncheon as FWBC's representatives.

The Allen County Election Board used FWBC facilities for the city election on November 6. Precinct workers spent two days at the polls which were set up in the library. Approximately 475 voters cast their ballots at the college.

A 23 minute slide/tape presentation has been added to the FWBC library orientation/instruction program. It is designed for use with a self-guided library tour and will be initiated this fall for incoming students. Other library news - - - Doris Grimes, assistant librarian, recently completed a master of science degree in library science at Indiana University.

David Meece and The Sharretts presented a joint concert at Fort Wayne Bible College in November. Over 500 people attended this Student Association sponsored event.

in brief

WBCL and Fort Wayne Bible College have extended a warm welcome to the radio stations's newest employee - - Phil Richard. Phil brings with him a wide variety of radio experience, including stints at missionary radio station 4VEH in Haiti and several Christian and secular stations stateside. Phil was most recently employed as news director at WJOR, South Haven, Michigan. He currently mans the 4 to 11 p.m. shift at WBCL, with a heavy emphasis on news coverage.

Plans are still in the making for a new 500-foot tower for WBCL, but station manager Jim Schweickart reports the project probably won't get off the ground as soon as originally thought. Final details are presently being worked out for the acquisition of land along Hillegas Road near Interstate 69. If all goes well, the tower could be up sometime this summer - possibly in June or July, pending FAA and FCC approval. WBCL asks that you continue to make this a matter of prayer before the Lord. Much work still needs to be done as they seek to extend the ministry of the station.

"Whatever Happened to the Human Race?" a series of five films by Dr. Francis Schaeffer and Dr. Everett C. Koop is being shown at the college during January and February. FWBC is one of the first to sponsor these significant films in the Fort Wayne area. The films examine the practices of euthanasia, abortion, infanticide and other crucial human rights issues. Discussion sessions led by FWBC professors and local Christian physicians follow each showing. The films are being sponsored by the Student Association as a part of the college's 75th anniversary celebration.

FWBC correspondence school personnel, Donna Lutton and Barb Artherhults, attended the Christian Correspondence Schools Conference in Chicago this fall. They returned with new information and ideas that will be applicable to the correspondence department here at FWBC. Donna also reported that she enjoyed her first plane trip! Other news from correspondence - - - the department is pleased to welcome Carolyn Weider to their secretarial staff.

Dr. Jacobsen to Return to Japan



Dr. Morris Jacobsen, vice president for academic affairs, will be leaving the college at the end of this school year to resume missionary service in Japan.

Dr. Jacobsen returned to the U.S. at the end of 1971 for an emergency health furlough, due to the critical illness of his wife, Kathleen. She was called home to be with the Lord in January of 1978. The following June Dr. Jacobsen was appointed vice president for academic affairs.

Last March Dr. Jacobsen and a fellow missionary to Japan, Elizabeth Osmundson, were married. After much prayer the Jacobsens have determined that God is directing them back to Japan. They plan to return the latter part of next summer, providing their support needs are met.

President's

perspective

Dr. Timothy Warner has served as President of Fort Wayne Bible College for the past seven years. Except for a three year period spent as a missionary to Sierra Leone, Africa, Dr. Warner has been on the faculty of the college since 1953. He has been widely recognized as an outstanding leader in education.

PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

The very first catalog of the Fort Wayne Bible Training School dated 1905 stated that the purpose of the new institution was "to prepare and equip as speedily as practically possible those who might be called 'eleventh hour laborers' in order to meet the Gospel emergency of these closing days of this present age."

Seventy-five years later we are still equipping "eleventh hour laborers" for work in the harvest. There are some differences, however. If it was the eleventh hour in 1905, it is more like 11:45 now, and the urgency of the task is heightened.

The original statement said the equipping was to be done "as speedily as possible." Just as farming has become "agribusiness" and demands much more of the farm operator than was true in the days of the horse drawn plow, so the ministries of the church have become more complex and extensive and demand more training on the part of one who ministers.

So, our program has gone from 2 to 4 years, and an increasing number of graduates are pursuing graduate programs. Our curriculum has been enlarged to match growing needs in the church. Several new programs of study are being added next year.

It took great vision, faith, and commitment to start the college. It takes those same qualities to keep it going in 1980. The leaders of the church were not alone in this commitment, however. Many people contributed to the fledgling institution in many different ways. There was contributed labor on the new building, produce from farms and gardens, canned goods for the dining department, and money to pay the bills.

In this 75th anniversary year we are grateful for a growing group of people who share a similar commitment to this ministry - - people who feel the urgency of the eleventh hour, who see the size of the harvest yet to be reaped, and who understand the need for trained harvesters.

I'm sorry that more of you are not able to spend some time on the campus and sense the fine spirit among the students. Many things have changed in the 75 years since the first students came to Fort Wayne for training, but the commitment to the Lord and to His service on the part of the students and the commitment of the college to their preparation remain the same



JENNIFER ANDERSON - - Kingston. Jamaica. Jennifer is attending the Bible College this year through the exchange program between FWBC and Jamaica Theological Seminary. She became a Christian at 17 through the influence of her grandmother. Jennifer developed an interest in missions and served for a year as a missionary to Haiti. After completing her year here, she plans to return to Jamaica for midwifery training at the university. She hopes to go back to Haiti when finished with her training. Jennifer says she is enjoying her time at FWBC. "The Lord has provided for me totally. The people I have met have been very friendly; I appreciate that." When asked what the major adjustments were in coming to the United States, she said, "The biggest differences are the food and the weather . . . I had only seen snow on TV. but I enjoy new experiences!" Jennifer is taking six classes at FWBC, three in the area of missions.

MARY GINGERICH -- Kitchener, Ontario, Canada. Mary first heard about FWBC while working as a nurse in Florida, where she attended Faith Missionary Church in St. Petersburg. After attending last year's Youth Conference her interest increased. She enrolled as a junior this past fall. A registered nurse, Mary came to the U.S. from Canada to pursue her career in nursing. "I'm learning a lot here at the Bible College . . . the teachers are tops." Brought up in a Mennonite family, Mary made a personal committment to the Lord when she was 13. She is now interested in missionary nursing. She visited Haiti with a team from Overseas Missionary Service and is considering the possibility of service in that country.

ARNOLD HANSRAJH - - Durban, South Africa. Arnold is a first year preseminary major. Reared in a Christian home, he made a committment to Christian service in 1975 after hearing Nicky Cruz speak in South Africa. Arnold considered going into law, but took a job in a bank shortly after completing his secondary education. Christian co-workers had a positive influence in his life. At their invitation he attended a meeting of the Full-Gospel Businessmen's Fellowship. There, the Lord used the speaker, a former Moslem, to speak to Arnold's heart. "The Holy Spirit began to work telling me I had the truth and should do something with it. I shrugged it off for a time, but the call of God became incessant. Isaiah 42 through 45 then confirmed the Lord's calling in my life." Arnold plans to complete his education here, go on to seminary, and take a pastorate - - possibly back in South Africa. getting used to the "quietness" of Fort Wayne as compared to the highly urban atmosphere of Durban.

MITSURU KATO - - Okayama, Japan. Mitsuru is a graduate of Okayama University with a degree in music. Because of the limited availability of church music training in Japan, she decided to further her education in the U.S. at Fort Wayne Bible College. This is her second year at FWBC. The daughter of a pastor, Mitsuru accepted Christ when she was 14. Following graduation next year, she plans to return to Japan to put her church music training into practice. "There is very little special music or choirs in the Japanese churches. I would like to work in those areas." Mitsuru plays the piano, organ, and violin. She is active in the FWBC music department and is a member of "Reflection," one of the college's two traveling music ensembles. She is enjoying her time at FWBC. "It's a big change from Okayama University . . . I like the prayer in the classrooms here." Mitsuru has been "adopted" by an American family, an experience she greatly appreciates. The Pressler family of Montpelier, Ohio, takes sincere interest in her and gives her a home away from home during holidays.

ALBERTA LUBBERTS -- Waterloo, Ontario, Canada. Alberta, a registered nurse, came to the U.S. to pursue her career at a time when Canada had a surplus of medical personnel. Like Mary Gingerich, she moved to Florida and began hearing about Fort Wayne Bible College while attending Faith Missionary Church. Alberta enrolled as a junior at FWBC this past fall. She is currently taking courses in missions and Bible. She is also serving as a campus nurse. A oneweek trip to Haiti with O.M.S. whetted Alberta's appetite for missions. She hopes to eventually serve as a missionary nurse overseas.

THEODORA PAPADOPOULOU --Limassol, Cyprus. Dora came to the U.S. and Fort Wayne Bible College a year ago last January. She is an elementary education major and hopes to go on to study psychology. Dora is interested in a career in counseling young people. Reared in a Christian family, she dedicated her life to the Lord at an early age. She heard of FWBC through Steve Roussos, a FWBC student and MK from Cyprus. Her first semester was difficult, she says, because of the language barrier and homesickness. But she is now enjoying the U.S. and FWBC very much. Her younger brother and sister are already planning to come to FWBC for their college educations, as well.

JEAN ANDRE SONNAL - - Borel, Haiti. Andre is a second-year pastoral studies major at FWBC. He accepted Christ at a missionary meeting for children in the early 1960's, but no follow-up ministry was available at that time. When the First Church of God was started in Haiti in 1967, Andre began to grow in the Lord and dedicated his life to Christian service the following year. He attended a Christian secondary school in Haiti. The Church of God mission board in Findley, Ohio, then played a major role in enabling him to attend FWBC. Andre says FWBC has contributed much to his spiritual growth and maturation. He especially appreciates the concern and love of fellow students and the faculty. "I found what I was looking for at FWBC." Andre plans to return to Haiti after completing his education. He hopes to work with Church of God missions in starting a ministry to the mountain people of his country.

BURTON TROTT -- Devonshire,
Bermuda. Burton is in his first year as a
pre-seminary Biblical studies major at
FWBC. He came to the U.S. several
years ago and received an associate degree
in marketing management from Owens
Technical College in Harrisburg, Ohio.
While living in Ohio, he visited Atlanta,
Georgia. During his visit, he attended
Bill Gothard's Basic Youth Conflicts
seminars and accepted Christ as his
Savior. Desiring to study the Bible, he be-

gan to look for a college. Burton saw an ad for FWBC in Campus Life magazine. He decided to visit the campus, and then decided to stay. He says he really appreciates the professors at FWBC."...

Burton plans to stay in the U.S. and pursue a career in Christian counseling.

Advancement or Development?

If you are a faithful reader of **Pulse**, you may at some time have wondered about the terminology used to designate the department charged with resource development for the college.

Someone might well ask, "Why not just call it fund-raising and be done with it?" The answer to that is that there is considerably more involved in it than that. Perhaps the more accurate term would be friend-raising. That comes closer to being the real objective because we are interested in the kind of prayer support as well as financial support that a host of friends can provide. Friends helping friends is part of the ideal.

It is more than that, however. It is concerned with providing the resources, of whatever kind, which will make possible the achieving of college objectives. This includes students, staff, buildings, equipment and money. And it certainly includes various types of spiritual resources which come from alumni, supporting churches, and other praying Christian friends.

What do you call all of this? It is providing for the development of the college, and this term is the most common among institutions supported by voluntary giving. Some feel that speaking of advancement has a more positive ring to it; so this term is used to refer to the same thing.

Whether we say "development" or "advancement," you will know we are speaking of the same thing, and we trust that you will rejoice in the development and advancement of God's work here at the college.

'A Very Present Help'

Field representatives Ward and Brenda Lewis and their family have been troubled by a series of difficulties over the past year including a fire in their home, illness, and a very recent near-tragedy which Brenda related as follows:

January 8th our family began suffering headaches and dizziness, but thought it was a virus. We went to bed as usual and then Wednesday morning woke up with the same feelings. Ward left for work and I decided to take our five-year-old and lie down, as I felt sleepy. Ward returned in about ten minutes because he had forgotten something he needed in the basement. Upon entering the basement he smelled a gas leak. I called the gas company and they came and diagnosed the problem as carbon monoxide fumes. The gas man and furnace man both said it was a miracle that we were alive. Praise be to God!

Through their trials the Lewises have seen remarkable evidence of the Lord's care. Faithful Christian friends have also supported them in prayer and assistance in times of need.

Legacies Received by the College

The college will be the recipient of several legacies during this school year. While final amounts will not be known until payment is actually made, it is anticipated that they will all be in the \$25,000 to \$30,000 range.

While these are not large legacies, they demonstrate how careful stewardship in estate planning enables a person to give more generously in death than in life.

None of the persons involved would have been considered wealthy. One couple had been missionaries, one was a single woman, and one a single man.

They all practiced personal stewardship of their incomes during their lives, and are now demonstrating stewardship of their capital resources. Property which was needed while they were living can now be put to use in God's work.

If you have not planned this area of your stewardship, don't put it off. A note to the college will bring you further helpful information about making a will and planning an estate.

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
