## Bostrom Is New President Of Fort Wayne Bible College

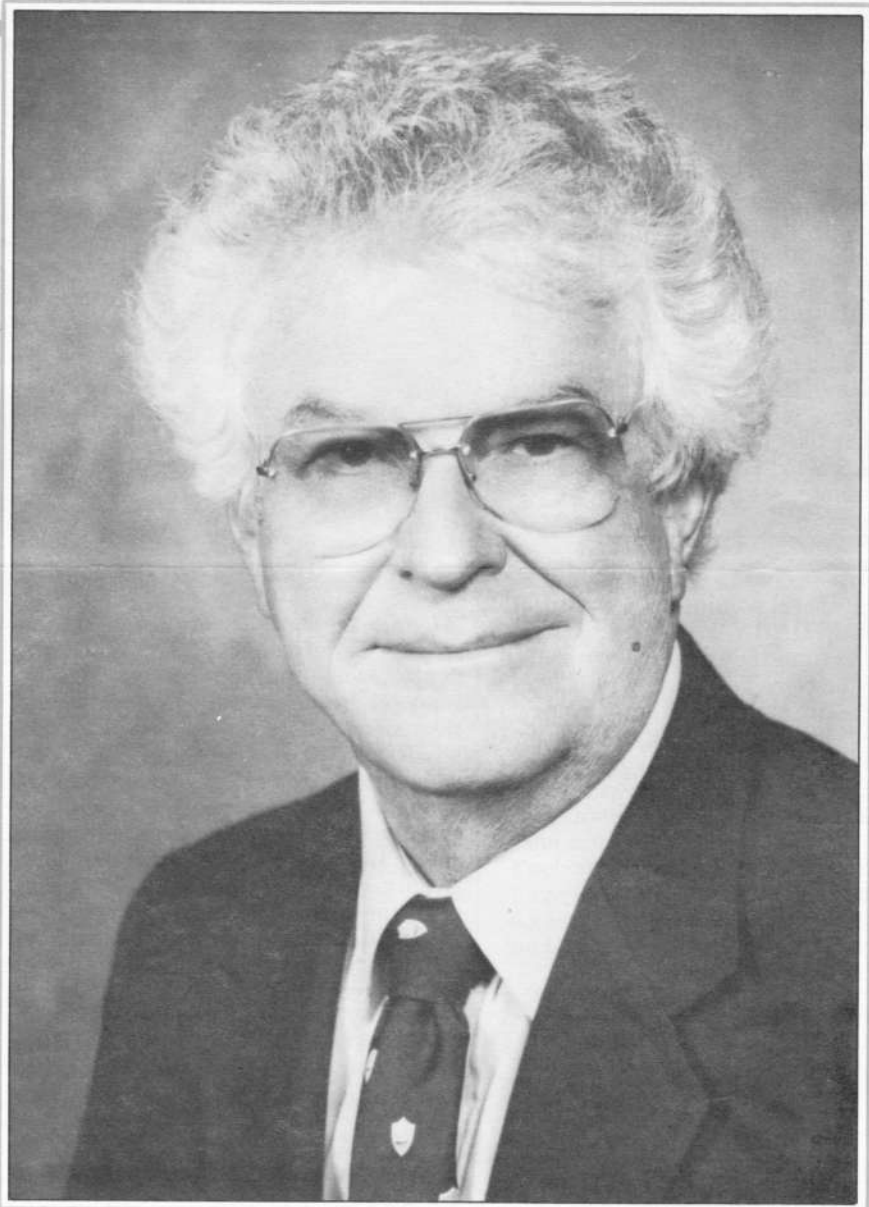
- Will Succeed Dr. Timothy M. Warner
- Becomes Fifth President in College's 75 Year History

Dr. Harvey R. Bostrom has been appointed president of Fort Wayne Bible College, becoming only the fifth president of the Fort Wayne-based school in its 75 year history. He succeeds Dr. Timothy Warner who has continued in that post since his resignation in November, 1979. Dr. Warner has accepted a position as Director, School of World Missions and Evangelism at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, Deerfield, Illinois. Dr. Bostrom's appointment is effective August 1.

Dr. Bostrom joins FWBC from Trinity College, Deerfield, IL, where, since 1976, he has been vice president for development and public relations. A native of Chicago, he holds a B.S. degree in economics and business from Wheaton College, Wheaton, IL; a Diploma in Missions from Nyack College, Nyack, NY; Master of Arts in Christian Education from Wheaton; and a Ph.D. in High Education Administration from New York University.

His nomination as president was put forward by the Governing Board of the college at a special meeting on June 11. Ratification of the nomination was taken recently by the General Board of the Missionary Church, Inc.

An administrator as well as teacher, Dr. Bostrom, during his tenure at Trinity College, also served as a development consultant for Timber-Lee Christian Center, East Troy, WS. Prior experience includes the position of vice



president of administration at Trinity College and Trinity Seminary from 1972-75; a part-time faculty member from 1970-72; and full-time faculty member from 1967-70 in the Bible Department.

From 1965-67, Dr. Bostrom operated Health Care Centers, Clearwater, Florida and, from 1960-65, was on the Wheaton College faculty. He completed his doctoral studies at New York Uni-

versity in 1960 following 13 years of service as a missionary to Ecuador. Dr. Bostrom began his ministry as a pastor for the Christian and Missionary Alliance in a church in Asheville, NC.

Fort Wayne Bible College is a fully accredited, four-year college specializing in the preparation of men and women for Christian service careers. Founded in 1904, the college is currently celebrating its 75th anniversary.

# The News In Brief

The American Association of Bible Colleges, in a 1979-80 statistical report on enrollment in its 68-member colleges, reports an enrollment increase of .56% over last year with an 8.2% increase in size of freshman classes. There was a slight drop (.5%) in the proportion of male students to an average of 54.5%. The number of graduate students enrolled in Bible colleges jumped by 33% over last year. For schools under 250 students, the amount spent per student by college averaged \$4,276 for the year. For schools having enrollments over 500, the average amount was \$4,023.

Curt Alexander is the newest staff member with Fort Wayne Bible College radio station WBCL. Curt joins the staff from the U.S. Army where he recently completed a tour of duty in Hawaii. ## Right Down Our Alley



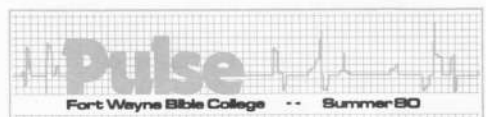

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## President's Perspective

*Dr. Timothy Warner has served as President of Fort Wayne Bible College for the past seven years. Except for a three year period spent as a missionary to Sierra Leone, Africa, Dr. Warner has been on the faculty of the college since 1953. He has been widely recognized as an outstanding leader in education.*

For 23 years my life and ministry have been invested in the students at Fort Wayne Bible College. The dividends of this investment are found in the lives and ministries of those whose lives I have touched. Nothing gives one greater fulfillment than to have former students tell you of the influence on them of your life and teaching. Such reports often indicate that such influence comes at times and in ways not usually thought of as ministry.

No one is more aware of personal weaknesses, however, than I am, and I have often wished that my example of godliness had been more accurate and that my teaching had been deeper and clearer.

Whatever my personal involvement may have been or may not have been, I am convinced that this type of Christian higher education is one of the most strategic ministries of the church. It is at this time in life that adult attitudes are being established and adult goals formulated. It is here that role models of significant life investment are being adopted.

To put it simply, it is here that the future leaders of the church are being developed. Most of us can easily think of young people who have adopted the philosophy of life learned from professors in secular institutions. We also know of once Christian institutions which today offer students, few, if any, examples of the servant spirit of the Christian.

Lest we take Fort Wayne Bible College for granted, think what it would be like if such a school did not exist for today's young people. Think of the consequences for the future of the church.

My parting appeal to you is to renew your commitment to this vital ministry. To pray more diligently for the faculty and staff who are the daily models of life and service for the students and to provide for the support of the college through your stewardship planning of both your current income and of your estate.

Thank you for your support during my tenure at the college. May it be even stronger for my successor.

## The 72nd In The 75th: 92 Graduate From FWBC

With a graphic word picture painted by the commencement speaker about the world into which they are going in service to Christ, 92 Fort Wayne Bible College graduates received diplomas at the college's 72nd annual commencement, May 10.

The speaker, Dr. Louis L. King, president of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, warned the graduates that "Christian service will involve invasion of territory long held by our spiritual enemy and will call for a marshalling of all available resources if they were to enjoy the fruits of conquest." "It will demand a commitment which includes a readiness to glorify God through suffering and death if necessary," he said. Quoting from Romans 12:1, Dr. King said that Paul's admonition that we present our bodies as a living sacrifice must find practical expression in our commitment even as the Apostle stated it in his letter to the Philippians. "It is my eager expectation and my hope that . . . Christ will be honored in my body, whether by life or by death." "That level of commitment," Dr. King said, "will certainly lead to conquest."

Other highlights of the commencement included the awarding of honorary degrees to the Reverend J. A. Ringenberg, a former president of FWBC, and to Ira Gerig, Professor of Music. The degrees were conferred by Dr. Timothy M. Warner, president and the graduates were inducted into the Alumni Association by Alumni Director, The Rev. Howard Dunlap.

## Second Largest Graduating Class

This year the second largest number of candidates for graduation in the history of the college received diplomas. A total of 92 were graduated, and of this group, 80 received the Bachelor degrees, and 17 the Associate of Arts. Pastoral Ministries led the group with a total of 23, and Christian Education followed with 17. Thirty-three are members of the Missionary Church while 13 are members of the C & M.A. There are 22 different denominations represented by the candidates.

For 75 years young men have come to Fort Wayne Bible College to study God's Word in preparation for the ministry. Literally hundreds of pulpits around the world have been filled by FWBC alumni. Today's pastoral students enjoy the benefits of a wide course selection, sophisticated audio-visual labs, and top-quality degree program which gives them superior preparation for graduate study. But, in addition to the never changing truths of Scripture, the pastoral students of yesterday and today have another thing in common . . . the opportunity for "on-the-job" training in the local church.

Attending classes, writing papers, studying texts, preparing for exams — a busy schedule for any student. Many FWBC students also have part or full-time jobs, Christian service projects, and family responsibilities. Few students have ever been heard to complain of having too little to do! One church member commented, "He (the student pastor) is the first pastor we have had in a long time who seems to care about us."

**CHARLES BLANCK** — hometown: Eden, New York. A senior at FWBC, Chuck is pastoring the Phenix United Methodist Church in Phenix, Indiana. Chuck says his ministry in the church is teaching him that "God is unlimited in His power and resources in people's lives when we let Him work through us." Following graduation this spring, he plans to serve in some area of the ministry and perhaps go on to seminary. Chuck's wife, Michelle, works at Fort Wayne Bible College as secretary to Dr. Warner.

**DAN COLE** — hometown: Hicksville, Ohio. Dan is pastoring the South Scipio United Brethren Church near Antwerp, Ohio. The church has an average of 80 and is centrally located between four towns. A senior at FWBC, Dan has cut back his course load to better manage

The honorary degrees are only the third and fourth ever awarded by the Bible College in its 75-year history.

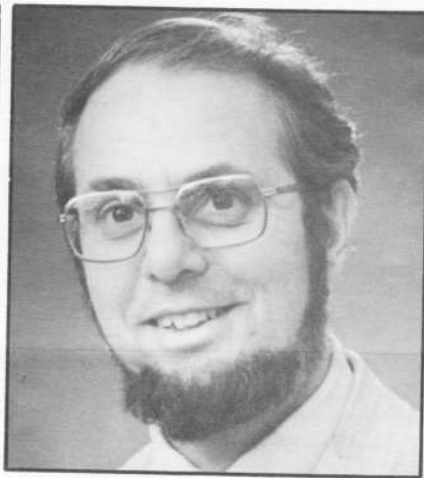

Keith is currently financial adviser to the Evangelical Mennonite Church Christian Service Foundation and a member of the Fort Wayne Estate Planning Council.

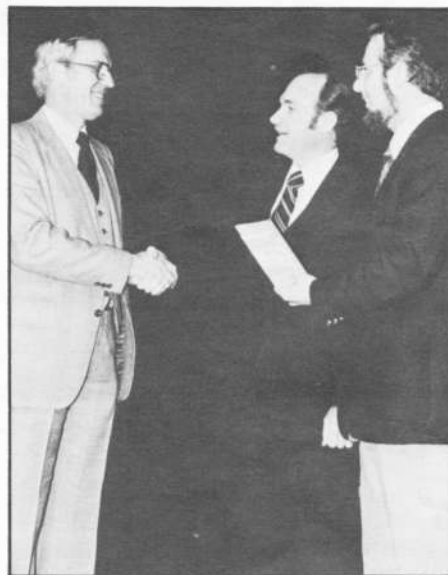
