A HOME GOING.

The second departure from earth's pilgrim life to glory is that of Minnie G. Naffziger, Bloomfield, Ia. Through the kindness of a student we are enabled to make the following statements:

Minnie G. Naffziger passed away after much suffering at her home in Bloomfield, Iowa, January 9th, 1911, at the age of 35 years and 24 days. She had aimed to make her life work that of a missionary among the poorer classes of our great cities.

The newspaper clipping sent us says: "She united with the M. E. church of Bloomfield during the pastorate of Dr. C. L. Staff-

ord and ever after lived an earnest, consistent, Christian life. During the last few months of her earthly life she kept her Bible close at hand and at the last was prepared and ready to meet her Lord and Master. She was a loyal worker in the Epworth League, and was also a teacher in the Sunday school."

We may also quote a few lines written by those who knew her best:

"Minnie was a great sufferer but bore it all patiently, and ever kept the faith that was so precious to her. * * * We know that all was well with her and near the close of her life she expressed the desire many times that the Lord might take her."

It was a joy and a blessing to have her for a while in the Bible Training School. Those around her learned to know and love her in the Lord. May the Lord make the memory of her life a continued blessing.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We deem it a matter of privilege as well as of responsibility to be connected with the important work of the Lord done at the Bible Training School. It is a privilege because it affords an opportunity to help carry on the Lord's work, it is a matter of responsibility because, unless we get the Lord's mind we make mistakes which will be detrimental to the work and will bring dishonor to the Lord.

It has been a pleasure to meet in several committee sessions with our dear Brother Schultz, the Superintendent of the school. We have received additional insight into the working of the school and, we trust, have been a real help in counsel and co-operation with those at the head of the work. During the past year there has been a strong faculty of able men and women to instruct in the truths of the Word and other subjects of prime importance to Bible students. Also a number of missionaries were brought before our student-body, much to our joy and satisfaction.

The courses of instruction have been of a most helpful and instructive nature. Such studies as Missions, The Lord's Return, and other prophetic and doctrinal subjects are

certainly of importance in these closing days of the dispensation.

The attendance has been encouraging. A set of wide-awake, progressive students are being prepared for great usefulness in the Lord's service. It is, however, the desire of this committee as well as that of the superintendents that pastors and leaders in the Lord's work encourage many more of the young people of our Christian communities to turn their face toward the Bible Training School. Again as many might at the same time be served with these important truths which are being taught there in a practical and thorough manner. The present student-body shows that the inter-denominational character of the school is approved of, in that students from various denominations come to Fort Wayne for Bible instruction. May it be even more so in the future.

The prospects for the future are hopeful. A class of 14 will complete the course at the close of the spring term. These, with the others who have completed the course, make a body of well-equipped workers for the Lord. For next year we are even now hoping for great things.

The Bible Training School has in these few years done much for the Christian youth of the Association and of our land. It is represented through its student-body in the leading foreign countries, and in many states of the Union. The labors of ex-students are being blessed of God, and the blessing of the Lord is thus spread in an ever-increasing ratio. We suggest that former teachers and all friends of the work make it a definite matter of prayer, that God would greatly bless and carefully direct our dear Superintendents and their co-laborers in all the work of the School and that we, the Executive Committee, may be of such help in counsel and otherwise, as will greatly help carry out God's plan concerning this institution.

OUR STEREOPTICON.

Among the many new arrivals who came during the winter term to dwell in our midst was one very active little body whom we welcomed with open arms because of her amiability and desire to please everyone.

She is not beautiful, as regards natural appearances, but one only needs to be in her presence a short time to discover her true worth. Even a strong light, instead of decreasing, only enhances the beauty of her character, for it is there we get a glimpse of her true life and purpose.

She is blessed with an extraordinary amount of artistic ability and with the aid of various interpreters and a large curtain has been able to present her view on different subjects with vivid reality.

On January 12th she made her first public appearance, at which time she was introduced to the audience as Miss Stereopticon, who would give a series of lectures on various themes during the ensuing months of winter and spring.

We found her a very interesting personage that evening as she brought before our physical and mental vision "How we got our Bible." We were carried in imagination through the many stages of the formation of the written Word of God; from the ancient scroll, through the numerous translations, to our present-day Bible; and as we watched and listened, our hearts kindled anew with love for the One who was so interested in lost mankind as to protect all through the long years the Word which He had uttered through the prophets and apostles, that we, by receiving that Word might know and believe on the Only Begotten Son of God.

Several weeks later our little friend appeared again, this time in a character sketch of Joseph, with different members of the student-body as her mouth-piece, and in an interesting way the different phases of Joseph's life were given.

Toward the close of the winter we had presented to us a review of Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress." The interpreter on this occasion, as on the introductory evening, was our superintendent, Mr. D. Y. Schultz, who, in a very interesting and instructive manner, told the story of the Christian Pilgrim whose desire to see the Celestial City enabled him, by the grace of God, to overcome all obstacles and walk through this present world with dangers and temptations on every hand as one set apart, his eyes fixed steadfastly on the city afar off, whose builder and maker is God. Though at times he confronted difficulties that appeared almost unsurmountable, yet Christ who was dwelling within him was victorious and faith, at the entrance to the Holy City, the heavenly Jerusalem, looked back over the rough and rocky way with praise and thanksgiving for all the way the Master had led. The Castle of Doubt, with its awful inhabitant, Giant Despair, lurking within its walls; the Valley of Humiliation; the lions and the steep and thorny path only served as stepping stones to the higher life—a "life hid with Christ in God." This was the material which constructed the steps leading directly to the City of the

Redeemed, and Christian realized it and walked straight forward, never once desiring to turn back to the City of Destruction. The world had lost its charm for him for "His heart was fixed, trusting in God."

That same evening pictures were given of "The Ninety and Nine," while the school sang that old yet ever new and inspiring hymn,

"There were ninety and nine that safely lay,
In the shelter of the fold,
But one was out on the hills away,
Far off from the gates of gold."

A surprise was enjoyed and much appreciated by the students that evening, when on the great curtain on the platform we saw the likeness of many loved faces—students of former years—some of whom are shining for Him in dark heathen lands.

During the first week of March, Mr. Funk of the Training Institute of Nyack, N. Y., was with us, and of course, immediately upon his arrival he was called into service by Miss Stereopticon for several missionary addresses.

On Thursday evening the great field of India was considered, and its conditions made real to us by the one who had so recently journeyed through that country gathering valuable missionary information.

The following evening, March 3, an imaginary trip to the Holy Land was much enjoyed. In company with Mr. Funk and our enthusiastic little new-comer we landed at the seaport city of Joppa and journeyed through the country to Jerusalem, that city around which so many sacred memories cluster. It was here our Lord was crucified and buried. And it was here that He arose, triumphant over the grave, the third day. These all came back to us as we visited the Mount of Olives, the lonely hill where the three crosses stood on that memorable day, the temple and other hallowed spots where Jesus was wont to walk and talk unto His disciples.

Before closing the program for the evening "The Holy City" was given and Mr. Ezra Rupp, our music instructor, accompanied the pictures with the wonderful song under the same title. As one by one the scenes changed before us and earthly views were lost sight of by visions of the heavenly realm, our spirits soared far beyond the skies and rested in that "house not made with hands," where they "had no need of the sun, neither of the moon, to shine in it; for the glory of God did lighten it, and the Lamb is the light thereof." Our hearts went up in thanksgiving for the mansions which Christ has gone to prepare and prayers of "Even so

come, Lord Jesus," ascended to the throne on high.

The entertainments, all of which have been instructive and pleasing, were much appreciated by all privileged to enjoy them, and Miss Stereopticon has won favor with all who became acquainted with her and her vivid imagination.

THE SENIORS OF 1911.

The Senior class of 1911 numbers fourteen, coming from seven different states, as follows: Three from Indiana, four from Ohio, two each from Illinois and Kansas, and one each from Michigan, Kentucky and California.

The age of conversion forms a valuable study: one was converted very young; another just before ten; one each at eleven, fourteen, sixteen, eighteen, and twenty; two at twelve and four at fifteen. It will be seen that over 70 per cent. were converted before the age of sixteen. The great lesson to be drawn from this fact is that we should expect, pray and work for the salvation of souls early in life; not only for their own sake, but also for the sake of others, as the majority of Christian workers come from early conversions.

The means that led to conversion may be observed with profit. The fruitful results of revival meetings is to be deduced from the fact that at least eight were brought to the Lord in revival seasons. The value of personal work is most evident. If all those having a part in helping these fourteen come to the Lord could now see them together, all deeply interested in the study of the Word and consecrated to the Lord, what a joy it would be to them, what an inexpressible delight!

In answer to the question as to the means that led to conversion there were mentioned parent, pastor, Sunday School teacher, Christian employer, friend and personal worker; also prayer, God's Word and S. S. and church influence. One can not think of these agencies and the accomplished results without seeing loom up great, very great, possibilities of winning souls, souls that in turn become soul winners.

The remarks asked for as to any step of faith or Christian experience subsequent to conversion are full of suggestions that lead to much thinking. Two speak of unsatisfactory years coming between their first coming to the Lord and their return from their backslidden condition. The great majority mention a time of yielding to the Lord in consecration and about the same number tes-

tify to having definitely received the Holy Spirit, several of these shortly after conversion. A few have passed through severe illness and mention the healing hand of the Lord. A precious deliverance from doubt is stated by another.

The secret of these lives is to some extent disclosed in the above dealings of the Lord with them. It is not strange that having yielded themselves to the Lord and received the Holy Spirit into their consecrated lives that they should have found a love for the Bible, come to the Bible Training School, with a view to going forth and living for and serving the Lord as witnesses unto His great salvation.

That the Bible Training School is interdenominational in its spirit and aim, is seen from the fact of the numerous denominations and smaller divisions of the Christian church which are represented; and from the further fact that there has existed the sweetest harmony on both doctrinal and experimental or practical lines. Essentials are emphasized; non-essentials are left to the training and convictions of the various individuals.

The Missionary Church Association is represented by two; the Methodist Episcopal church, by four; the German M. E. church, by one; the Methodist Protestant church, by one; and six represent five different divisions of the Mennonite people.

As to their coming to the Bible School a great many providences could be related that would make the most inspiring reading matter. Several had special difficulties to overcome even on part of those who should have been helpful. The lack of means on part of a number moved them to go to God in prayer and find Him faithful to supply their needs. Some received encouragement from parents and one was led to come through a letter written by one at the time in the school. "Where there is a will there is a way," might in a general way be applied to the above as a means of coming to school, and yet, it was really the Lord that gave His dear children training in prayer and followed it up with help and blessing in the answer thereof.

A great amount of Christian service has been done by them, the majority of them having taken active part in Sunday School work and Young People's meetings. Several have been doing Mission and Personal Work, House-to-house visitation, holding Gospel meetings, etc.

The following was written by them in response to the request, "A sentence or two expressing your estimate of the value of Bible study and training:"—

"It seems to me that I am just beginning

to realize the value of systematic Bible study and training. I believe it is the foundation for a life-long joy and benefit in the study of the Bible."

* * * * *

"I have received a deeper knowledge of His Word; and by means of His precious Word, which the teachers so faithfully explained to us, and also by means of prayer I have learned to know and trust Him more than ever before."

* * * * *

"The value of Bible study and training is inestimable. It has meant so much to me in every way. Through it we have been better established in the Truth, have learned to know our Saviour better, and to give the Word of Truth to others."

* * * * *

"One has the help of men who have studied God's Word and served Him for years and may thereby be led to see truths which otherwise would take much time to acquire. A quicker and better preparation for service is obtained than by studying alone."

* * * * *

"You may well believe that a study of the Bible and a training as is given here, will not be regretted by any one, after having spent a year or two in such a school as this. The value is not seen in how much you have to pay, but in how much you get for the time spent. It is a time spent for the glory of God."

* * * * *

"I consider Bible study and training invaluable to the believer. It is one of the most important, if not the most important thing, in our lives; for it is through the Word that the Spirit reveals Christ to us. As we know the Word, can we become established and grounded in it. The study of the Bible helps us to see and appreciate the work we have in Christ and also to know our purpose in our lives."

"To know Jesus Christ in His atonement and, through Him, to know God and eternal life. Since the Bible is a revelation of God and the divine plan by which we may know Him, Bible study and training under the illumination and guidance of the Holy Spirit is invaluable. Therefore, I value the two years spent in Bible School the most profitable years of my life thus far."

* * * * *

"Bible study is the source of great joy and blessing to the believer and teaches us to know how to rightly divide the Word of Truth. It is indispensable to the Christian worker in dealing with people's souls, because it reveals Christ as the Saviour of all who believe. With the liq

the Holy Spirit to shine upon the Word, it becomes an open book to all who study and feed upon it. The believer who omits the study of the Word makes very little progress in his Christian life."

* * * * *

"Through the study of God's Word under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the things of Christ are revealed unto us. Under the teaching of faithful instructors, one receives the key with which to unlock the truth, which not only becomes a source of blessing to us, but to many others through us. We are living in an age when much false teaching a few years in a Bible School where the be able to give out the truth, one can readily see the necessity of a thorough study of the Word."

* * * * *

"To my mind the value of Bible study and training such as is received by spending is given out. In order to meet this, and deeper truths which are stored in God's Word are taught, cannot be conceived of by the natural mind. To say the least, it is the thing of greatest importance, especially to the believer in Christ; for it is the means of deepening the spiritual life of the individual; and a knowledge of the Word, with the Holy Spirit as instructor either directly or through His human channels, is the only means to do effectual service for our Lord and Master."

* * * * *

"The value of Bible study cannot be overestimated. It is of necessity that we as believers know the truth in order that we may grow in grace and knowledge, and that we may be better prepared to meet the 'fiery darts of the wicked,' and to help our fellow men. The Bible is the Book of books. It is 'the source of all knowledge.' In it are many rich treasures for all who would have them. The Bible is a marvellous book, a wonderful book; but its Author is much greater, and it is as we study the Word that we become acquainted with Him 'whom to know is life eternal.'"

"In my estimation Bible study and training is a very essential thing in the Christian life. It is only as we study the Word of God and become acquainted with its deep truths that we are established in the Lord and are able to go forth as true soldiers of Jesus Christ, to battle with the powers of darkness around us. Then more than all this, to know the Bible and all the depths of teaching contained in it, is to know God better; it is to see God better in all His grandeur and glory, and seeing Him thus, love Him more and serve Him better. I

praise God for the Bible School and what it has meant to me."

"We can never over estimate the value of Bible study and training. Words can not express the value, benefit and blessings that have come to me through a systematic study of the Word, as we get it here. Here I have learned to know God as I never knew Him before; and I have learned to love my Bible, in fact, it has become a new book to me. I believe that the lack of Bible knowledge and training is the cause of failure in many Christian lives. I shall always praise the Lord for permitting me to take a course in Bible study, and I shall never regret the time spent at this school."

"I could not express in my own words the value of Bible study and training. After having been privileged to spend almost two years in Bible School, where the precious truths have been opened up daily, in the light of the full gospel. Why Are Bible Training Schools Needed?
